Railway goes for additional revenue stream

Signs contract with private company to build mall, hotel in the port city

Bangladesh Railway yesterday signed a contract with a local private company to construct a shopping mall and a hotel/guest house in Chattogram, with the aim to increase its income.

The project will be implemented under Public-Private Partnership basis on 0.452 acre of railway land near Chattogram Railway Station. This is the second project of BR to be implemented under PPP.

Ahsan Jabir, BR's additional chief engineer (bridge), and Anwar Hossain, director of Chattogram-based developer Epic Properties Ltd, signed the contract at Rail

The government has plans to implement 30 percent of the development projects under PPP, said Railways Minister Nurul Islam Sujan at the programme.

This is also the second PPP project to reach this stage. As per the contract, the private partner will develop at least 40,000 square feet of land within the next four years, investing Tk 45.24 crore. The plan includes a 15-storey building for the shopping mall, hotel, movie theatre, and convention and recreation centre.

The partner would hand over 10,000 square feet of developed land to BR. The land will be handed over after 40 years, during which the private partner would pay a certain amount to BR from the project operations.

approved the project in 2013. Later, BR selected the company in 2019 through international bidding.

However, the signing got delayed due to the pandemic. BR's Director General Dhirendra Nath Mazumder said the railway's operation cost exceeds its income. "It is difficult for the government to provide continuous

support. So, we are implementing the PPP," he added. Rail secretary Humayun Kabir said BR is currently working on 12 PPP projects. Contracts have been signed for two of them. Earlier in March 2020, BR signed a contract with United Enterprises and Co Ltd, to establish a 500-bed hospital and 100-seat medical college in Chattogram. As per the contract, the company has to operationalise at least a 250-bed hospital within the next three years, while an additional 250 beds will be added within next two years.

However, it came to a halt as various organisations demanded a shift of the site from Railway Building area for environmental concerns.

Asked, the minister said they cannot cancel the contract without the PM's approval as they signed it following all relevant procedures.

"The contract is still valid," he added.

'He made law easier for people'

Mizanur Rahman Khan remembered

Mizanur Rahman Khan, joint editor of Prothom Alo, left his footprint through his immense patience and tireless work in upholding justice and rights in the country throughout his career.

Speakers made the remarks at a memorial meeting organised by Humanity Foundation at Jatiya Press Club, marking the first death anniversary of the prominent law analyst and journalist yesterday.

Md Abdul Matin, a former justice of the SC's Appellate Division, said Mizanur's contribution in the field of law will be remembered.

Mizanur proved that law-related concerns are not only for practitioners but for people as well, said Dr Salehuddin Ahmed, former governor of Bangladesh Bank. The noted journalist died of cardiac arrest on January 11 last year at a private hospital in the capital. He was 53.

Humanity Foundation's chairperson advocate Muhammad Shafiqur Rahman, journalist Farooq Wasif, DU Prof Asif Nazrul, Press Club GS Ilias Khan, advocates Khurshid Alam Khan and Syeda Rizwana Hasan also spoke at the event.
