#### 'People are the source of power'

President urges all to participate in govt activities to make democracy more effective

President Abdul Hamid yesterday told parliament that democracy needs to be made more effective by establishing transparency and accountable good governance by ensuring proper participation of people in all government activities.

He said this while addressing the first session of the New Year in parliament as the 16th session of the 11th parliament began yesterday.

In his brief written speech, he said the government's expenditure has increased due to huge increase of development activities over the past one-and-a-half decade. "Therefore, caution should be

maintained in all matters related to the project to prevent misuse of government funds," he added. The full text of his speech was

tabled in parliament. Earlier, the House went into the sitting around 4:00pm.

Hamid in his speech said the people are the source of all power and the centre of all their hope is the Jatiya Sangsad. "As people's representative, public interest should be given priority over everything else," he said.

"I strongly urge people, irrespective of party affiliation, class and profession, to take concerted action on fundamental issues like democracy, rule of law and development."

### 'Warning, not punishment'

#### Says agri minister about sanctions on Rab after meeting with US ambassador

The US sanctions on Rab and seven of its current and former officials were not meant to punish Bangladesh but to warn on human rights, Agriculture Minister Abdur Razzaque said referring to his meeting with outgoing US Ambassador Earl R Miller yesterday.

"I had a meeting with him [Earl Miller] for quite some time. He said the US sanctions on the law enforcers were not aimed at punishing Bangladesh, but to warn us," he told reporters at the ministry.

Summarising the discussion details with Miller, Razzaque said the US is attaching high importance on human rights and they perceive that the law enforcers in Bangladesh have violated human rights in some cases and that those need corrections. They hope that Bangladesh will make the corrections.

In response to Miller's observations, the minister said it was regretful that the US has put Bangladesh on the same category of North Korea and Myanmar.

"I said the human rights situation in Bangladesh good. No human rights violations have happened here," Abdur Razzaque said. However, law enforcement agencies may have made mistakes in some cases, and 190

# Ekushey Boi Mela postponed till Feb 14

Creative Publishers Association of Bangladesh, said there should be no compromise with the Covid-19 situation as the numbers are increasing every day.


