'People are the source of power'

President urges all to participate in govt activities to make democracy more effective

President Abdul Hamid yesterday told parliament that democracy needs to be made more effective by establishing transparency and accountable good governance by ensuring proper participation of people in all government activities.

He said this while addressing the first session of the New Year in parliament as the 16th session of the 11th parliament began yesterday.

In his brief written speech, he said the government's expenditure has increased due to huge increase of development activities over the past one-and-a-half decade.

"Therefore, caution should be maintained in all matters related to the project to prevent misuse of government funds," he added.



The full text of his speech was tabled in parliament. Earlier, the House went into the sitting around 4:00pm.

Hamid in his speech said the people are the source of all power and the centre of all their hope is the Jatiya Sangsad. "As people's representative, public interest should be given priority over everything else," he said.

"I strongly urge people, irrespective of party affiliation, class and profession, to take concerted action on fundamental issues like democracy, rule of law and development."

'Warning, not punishment' Says agri minister about sanctions on Rab after meeting with US ambassador

The US sanctions on Rab and seven of its current and former officials were not meant to punish Bangladesh but to warn on human rights, Agriculture Minister Abdur Razzaque said referring to his meeting with outgoing US Ambassador Earl R Miller yesterday.

"I had a meeting with him [Earl Miller] for quite some time. He said the US sanctions on the law enforcers were not aimed at punishing Bangladesh, but to warn us," he told reporters at the ministry.

Summarising the discussion details with Miller, Razzaque said the US is attaching high importance on human rights and they perceive that the law enforcers in Bangladesh have violated human rights in some cases and that those need corrections. They hope that Bangladesh will make the corrections.

In response to Miller's observations, the minister said it was regretful that the US has put Bangladesh on the same category of North Korea and Myanmar.

"I said the human rights situation in Bangladesh is good. No human rights violations have happened here," Abdur Razzaque said. However, law enforcement agencies may have made mistakes in some cases, and 190 SEE PAGE 4 COL 5

Ekushey Boi Mela postponed

Due to an ongoing spike in Covid-19 infections, the Amar Ekushey Boi Mela -- which was set to begin on February 1 -- has been postponed for two weeks. If the cases are under control, the biggest cultural event in Bangladesh may start in the third week of February.

However, in that case, compliance with hygiene guidelines will be strictly ensured.

State Minister for Culture KM Khalid told The Daily Star that due to the recent spike in cases, the fair has been postponed till February 14.

"People's lives are more important than any event. However, preparations for the fair will continue," he said.

A meeting was held at the ministry yesterday before the official announcement of postponing the fair. There were also discussions regarding how the book fair can be organised when the Covid

'Children first'

HC observes in full-text verdict on custody battle staff correspondent

The High Court in the full text of a verdict has observed that children's welfare should be considered first, and law should not be applied in relevant cases without their welfare and wellbeing.

"Thus, in respect to the applicability of the 'Comity of Courts' it is our considered view that the child's welfare and wellbeing should be considered first and the above proposition of law should not be applied in each and every case mechanically without considering the wellbeing and welfare of the minors," said the HC bench of Justice M Enayetur Rahim (now a judge of the Appellate Division) and Justice Md Mostafizur Rahman.

The full text was released yesterday as the HC bench delivered the verdict on November 21 last year in a case regarding the custody of children Nakano Jasmine Malika (11) and Nakano Laila Lina (9), who were brought from Japan to Bangladesh in February last year. In the verdict, the HC directed that they will remain with their father Bangladesh-born US citizen Imran Sharif

NEW YEAR CELEBRATIONS HC directive to stop use of fireworks sought

A Supreme Court lawyer yesterday filed a writ petition with the High Court seeking its directive on the government to stop use of explosive substances including lanterns and fireworks during new year celebrations.

Advocate Mizanur Rahman submitted the petition to the office concerned of the HC. It also requested the government to give compensation to the family of Umair, a six-month old child at Mirpur in Dhaka, who reportedly died after being frightened at the sound of fireworks at night on December 31 last year.

Citing the petition, Mizanur told The Daily Star that he prayed to the HC to pass necessary directives so that new years are celebrated without any accident.

Over 2cr people using renewable energy: Nasrul

State Minister for Power, Energy and Mineral Resources Nasrul Hamid has said the government is exploring options like rooftop and floating solar power plants as alternatives to land-based ones due to scarcity of land.

He said it is not possible to set up land-based large scale solar plants as land is being used for agriculture and other necessary purposes.

The state minister made the remarks while presiding over the virtually held "Member Interventions" session of the 12th assembly of the International Renewable Energy Agency (IRENA) on Saturday evening.
