

Sust students resume their protests

The students of Shahjalal University of Science and Technology have resumed their protest with an open discussion.

The programme took place on the campus's Muktamancha around 7:00pm yesterday, following the end of their hunger strike that began on January 19 demanding the vice chancellor's resignation.

At the discussion, the students expressed their opinions on what kind of institution they wanted Sust to be.

On Wednesday, they withdrew their barricades from the university's main gate, the vice-chancellor's residence and from all academic and administrative buildings.

As the barricades were removed, administrative work also resumed on the campus after 11 days.

On January 19 around 10:20am, 28 Sust students ended their hunger strike after 163 hours following the requests of former professors Muhammed Zafar Iqbal and Yasmeen Haque.

Of the 28, only two remained under treatment at Jalalabad Ragib Rabeya Medical College Hospital till yesterday. For other students, their families took responsibility for their treatment at home and in different hospitals.

A spokesperson of the protest said they handed over a five-point demand upon Prof Zafar Iqbal's request on Wednesday.

The demands are removal of Sust VC along with Students Welfare Adviser and the proctorial body; granting bail to the five detained alumni who donated money to the protestors and were sued on Tuesday; initiatives to keep all residential halls open at the moment; the withdrawal of the case that was filed against unidentified students; and to bear all medical expenses of students who were injured in the police attack and of those who were on the hunger strike.

Viaduct links two ends of capital

Metro rail project sees major accomplishment as entire 20.1km structure visible with last segment installed

The main structure of the country's first metro rail project was completed yesterday with the installation of the last segment of the viaduct, which now connects two ends of the capital — Uttara and Motijheel.

At 11:14am, the last segment was installed between piers 582 and 583 near the Jatiya Press Club, completing the entire 20.1-km viaduct on which the rail lines would be laid.

MAN Siddique, managing director of Dhaka Mass Transit Company Limited (DMTCL), the implementing agency of the project, announced the completion of viaduct installation through an online press conference.

It took around 10 minutes to install the last girder, where national flags were attached, and officials and staffers both in the field and those attending the press conference applauded enthusiastically to celebrate the achievement.

Formally known as the Mass Rapid Transit Line 6 or MRT Line-6, the elevated rail line is being constructed between Uttara Phase 3 and Motijheel.

Commercial operation in the Uttara-Agargaon section will start on December

16 — the country's Victory Day — this year. The full section will be operational by December 2023, as per the DMTCL announcement.

Once operational, the metro rail will be able to transport 60,000 people per hour and reduce travel time from Uttara to Motijheel from about two hours to only 40 minutes.

The original cost of the project was Tk 21,985 crore but project authorities last year sought a further Tk 11,487 crore for additional work, including extension of the line up to Kamalapur and building spacious footpaths outside the stations for convenient entry and exit of passengers.

If the proposal for additional funds is approved, the cost of the fast-track project would be Tk 33,472 crore and deadline would be December 2025, one and a half years longer than the original one.

Asked about the cost escalation proposal, MAN Siddique said they would take measures for ensuring comfortable exit and entry of the passengers from the stations.

"We don't want to create anymore problem for Dhaka city," he said.

They will build several station plazas,

transit-oriented hubs (TODs) and expand the line to Kamalapur. So, a majority of the additional money would be used for land acquisition, he said.

Besides, the higher exchange rate of the US dollar and the rise of value-added tax and customs duties are the other major reasons behind the cost escalation, Siddique said.

Replying to a question, MAN Siddique said foreign consultants had earlier recommended keeping additional space at the station entrances for passengers' convenience.

"But we decided to build MRT first and address the issues. Now, construction of the MRT is at the last stage so we are now addressing the matter. We have time to address it [expanding space for entry and exit]," he said.

Siddique was secretary of Road Transport and Highways Division from November 2011 to October 2017, the period when the project was approved and a detailed design was drawn.

Replying to another question, he said they hoped to withdraw all barriers on roads in Agargaon-Mirpur area, except for station areas, by April this year to reduce people's suffering.

EC bill passed, snubbing all concerns

The Jatiya Sangsad passed the bill giving a legal shield to the CECs and other commissioners appointed through search committees in the past.

Ahead of the general elections in 2014 and 2018, president picked CECs and other commissioners in 2012 and 2017 following recommendations by search committees.

As per the new law, the six-member search committee, to be headed by a judge of the Supreme Court's Appellate Division, will recommend names to the president for the EC appointments.

The judge will be nominated by the chief justice.

The five other members will include a High Court judge, to be nominated by the CJ, the comptroller and auditor general, the chairman of Bangladesh Public Service Commission and two distinguished citizens nominated by the president. Of the two, one will be female.

The committee can propose two names to the president for the post of CEC. It can also recommend two persons against each of the commissioner's post.

The government move to enact the law came nearly 50 years after the constitution prescribed enacting a specific law for forming the EC.

It came when almost all political parties demanded a specific law in this regard during a dialogue with

President Abdul Hamid.

The president initiated the dialogue with registered political parties, seeking suggestions on forming an independent, neutral and credible EC. The talks continued from December 20 to January 17.

A total 25 political parties participated in the dialogue while seven rejected it terming it meaningless.

Civil society platforms too demanded enactment of an EC law.

The tenure of the current commission, led by CEC KM Nurul Huda, expires next month.

On multiple occasions last month, the law minister said there was no way to pass a new law for constituting the EC in such a short time.

He also said a law so crucial for the people cannot be passed overnight.

But the government has been able to have it passed in parliament.

The law will come into force with the president's approval.

Even if the president approves it immediately, the search committee will have to finalise its recommendations in a hurry.

If the president forms the search committee on Sunday, the committee will get only 11 working days before the tenure of the EC expires on February 14.

WHAT MPS SAID
Several opposition MPs,

including Jatiya Party's Fakhru Imam and Mujibul Haque Chunu, BNP's Rumeen Farhana and Harunur Rashid, mentioned that article 48 of the constitution says the president shall act in accordance with the advice of the prime minister except for appointing the PM and the chief justice.

Harunur strongly opposed the bill saying it was a ploy by the government to execute its new strategy for the next national election.

Lambasting the law minister, Rumeen said there would have been transparency had one representative each from the Awami League, the main opposition party, and the third-largest party (the BNP) were in the search committee.

She said that according to the proposed law, the EC would be formed as per the will of the government and the prime minister, and that EC will not be independent. It will be the ministry of election affairs of the government, she said.

JP's Shameem Haider Patwary said the proposed law says the president would appoint the CEC and other ECs, which contradicts Article 48.

"Therefore, everything, including the formation of the search committee and appointment of the chief election commissioner and other election commissioners, would be done as per the will of the prime minister."

Workers Party President Rashed Khan Menon proposed sending the names of the people picked by the search committee to the business advisory committee of parliament. He said this would be inclusive.

Law minister Anisul Haq refuted the MPs' criticism.

On the allegation that two ECs formed through search committees were given amnesty by the proposed law, he said no one was given indemnity.

"Indemnity and legal coverage are not the same thing."

A discussion of the Left Democratic Alliance yesterday criticised the government for enacting the EC law. It said the aim of the law was to form a subservient EC.

Participating in the discussion on the thanksgiving motion on the president's speech, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina said accepting 22 different amendments on the law, brought by the opposition parties, meant that the proposed law was initiated by the BNP and all opposition parties in parliament.

"They told today [yesterday] that they don't know about the bill. But most of the amendments brought by all the opposition parties including Jatiya Party, BNP, Workers Party, Jasad and Gonoforum, were accepted. Therefore, it seems, it is the proposed law of the opposition," she added.

8 injured in Ctg polls violence

At least eight people were injured in a clash between the followers of two rival chairman candidates at Khagaria Union Parishad polls in Chattogram's Satkania upazila yesterday.

According to police and locals, supporters of Awami League candidate Akter Hossain and independent candidate Jasim Uddin swapped on one another with guns and sharp weapons in Jorar Kul area around 11:30am.

On information, police rushed to the spot but both the confronting groups managed to flee the scene, said locals.

Sub-registrar office assistant jailed

A Kusthia court sent a female office assistant of Kusthia's Daulatpur upazila sub-registrar (land) office to jail yesterday.

The office assistant — Jannatul Ferdous Munni — was arrested with Tk 31,200 in cash on Wednesday night. She allegedly collected the money by taking bribes.

She was placed before District and Session Judge Abu Taher yesterday, said Al-Mujahid Mithu, lawyer of Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC), Kusthia.

Kusthia ACC Assistant Director Neel Kamal Pal filed a case against the woman under 161 of the Anti-corruption law of 1947.

Woman becomes voter for 2nd time, sued

A woman in Patuakhali's Bauful upazila has been sued for becoming a voter for the second time using a fake name and age.

Bauful Upazila Election Officer Arifur Rahman filed the case against Lucky Akhter.

Lucky changed her name to Samia and became a separate voter in 2017. She also received a government job at the family planning department using her fake documents.

Confirming the matter, Al Mamun, officer-in-charge of Bauful Police Station, said legal actions would be taken against the woman after proper investigation.

UP member, 2 others sent to jail for beating youths
