#### Sust students resume their protests

The students of Shahialal University of Science and Technology have resumed their protest with an open discussion.

The programme took place on the campus's Muktamancha around 7:00pm yesterday, following the end of their hunger strike that began on January 19 demanding the vice chancellor's resignation.

At the discussion, the students expressed their opinions on what kind of institution they wanted Sust to be.

On Wednesday, they withdrew their barricades from the university's main gate, the vice chancellor's residence and from all academic and administrative buildings.

As the barricades were removed, administrative work also resumed on the campus after 11 days.

On January 19 around 10:20am, 28 Sust students ended their hunger strike after 163 hours following the requests of former professors Muhammed Zafar Iqbal and Yasmeen Haque.

Of the 28, only two remained under treatment at Jalalabad Ragib-Rabeya Medical College Hospital till yesterday. For other students, their families took responsibility for their treatment at home and in different hospitals.

A spokesperson of the protest said they handed over a five-point demand upon Prof Zafar Iqbal's request on Wednesday.

The demands are removal of Sust VC along with Students Welfare Adviser and the proctorial body; granting bail to the five detained alumni who donated money to the protestors and were sued on Tuesday; initiatives to keep all residential halls open at the moment; the withdrawal of the case that was filed against unidentified students; and to bear all medical expenses of students who were injured in the police and of thos attack

# Viaduct links two ends of capital

Metro rail project sees major accomplishment as entire 20.1km structure visible with last segment installed

The main structure of the country's first metro rail project was completed yesterday with the installation of the last segment of the viaduct, which now connects two ends of the capital -- Uttara and Motijheel.

At 11:14am, the last segment was installed between piers 582 and 583 near the Jatiya Press Club, completing the entire 20.1-km viaduct on which the rail lines would be laid.

MAN Siddique, managing director of Dhaka Mass Transit Company Limited (DMTCL), the implementing agency of the project, announced the completion of viaduct installation through an online press conference.

It took around 10 minutes to install the last girder, where national flags were attached, and officials and staffers both in the field and those attending the press conference applauded enthusiastically to celebrate the achievement.

Formally known as the Mass Rapid Transit Line 6 or MRT Line-6, the elevated rail line is being constructed between Uttara Phase 3 and Motijheel.

Commercial operation in the Uttara Agargaon section will start on December

16 -- the country's Victory Day -- this year. The full section will be operational by December 2023, as per the DMTCL announcement.

Once operational, the metro rail will be able to transport 60,000 people per hour and reduce travel time from Uttara to Motijheel from about two hours to only 40 minutes.

The original cost of the project was Tk 21,985 crore but project authorities last year sought a further Tk 11,487 crore for additional work, including extension of the line up to Kamalapur and building spacious footpaths outside the stations for convenient entry and exit of passengers.

If the proposal for additional funds is approved, the cost of the fast-track project would be Tk 33,472 crore and deadline would be December 2025, one and a half years longer than the original one.

Asked about the cost escalation proposal, MAN Siddique said they would take measures for ensuring comfortable exit and entry of the passengers from the stations.

"We don't want to create anymore

transit-oriented hubs (TODs) and expand the line to Kamalapur. So, a majority of the additional money would be used for land acquisition, he said.

Besides, the higher exchange rate of the US dollar and the rise of value-added tax and customs duties are the other major reasons behind the cost escalation, Siddique said.

Replying to a question, MAN Siddique said foreign consultants had earlier recommended keeping additional space at the station entrances for passengers' convenience.

"But we decided to build MRT first and address the issues. Now, construction of the MRT is at the last stage so we are now addressing the matter. We have time to address it [expanding space for entry and exit]," he said.

Siddique was secretary of Road Transport and Highways Division from November 2011 to October 2017, the period when the project was approved and a detailed design was drawn.

money by taking bribes. She was placed before District and Session Judge Abu Taher vesterday, said Al-Mujahid Mithu, lawyer of Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC), Kushtia.

Kushtia ACC Assistant Director Neel Kamal Pal filed a case against the woman under 161 of the Anti-corruption law of 1947.

#### Woman becomes voter for 2nd time, sued

Confirming the matter, Al Mamun, officer-incharge of Baufal Police Station, said legal actions would be taken against the woman after proper investigation.

## EC bill passed, snubbing all concerns

The Jatiya Sangsad passed the bill giving a legal shield to the CECs and other commissioners appointed through search committees in the past.

Ahead of the general elections in 2014 and 2018, president picked CECs and other commissioners in 2012 and 2017 following recommendations by search committees.

As per the new law, the six-member search committee, to be headed by a judge of the Supreme Court's Appellate Division, will recommend names to the president for the EC appointments.

The judge will be nominated by the chief justice.

The five other members will include a High Court judge, to be nominated by the CJ, the comptroller and auditor general, the chairman of Bangladesh Public Service Commission and two distinguished citizens nominated by the president. Of the two, one will be female.

propose two names to the president for the post of CEC. It can also recommend two persons against each of the commissioner's post.

to enact the law came nearly 50 years after the constitution prescribed enacting a specific law for forming the EC.

approval. Even if the president approves it immediately, the search committee will have to finalise its recommendations in a

hurry. If the president forms the search committee on Sunday, the committee will get only 11 working days before the tenure of the EC expires on February 14
