Dhaka most polluted city in the world

Says Taposh

Dhaka is the most polluted city in the world, and air pollution is the main cause for respiratory issues, said Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC) Mayor Sheikh Fazle Noor Taposh yesterday.

"We are aware of it. We are working to get rid of the problem," said the mayor while addressing the first National NCD Conference at a Dhaka hotel.

Yesterday was the second day of the three-day event.

He said DSCC is working to reduce non-communicable diseases and improve



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the corporation's basic amenities like parks and playgrounds to achieve sustainable development goals.

"We do not have sufficient walkways, parks and playgrounds. We have to ensure them now. We are preparing a 30-year master plan in this regard, so that we can increase these facilities by 2050," said Taposh.

"To prevent non-communicable diseases like diabetes, cancer and high pressure, we have to improve facilities to reduce mortality rate," mayor Taposh added.

Taposh said they have already taken initiatives to establish more parks, widen footpaths and create walkways.

38 days of fresh air in 6 years

Study on Dhaka finds; says nighttime air carries more risk

Residents of the capital have inhaled clean air for only 38 days in the last six years, found a study, highlighting the gravity of the air pollution that over two crore people of the city are exposed to every day.

The alarming figures came up in a study conducted by Stamford University's Center for Atmospheric Pollution Studies from 2016 to 2021.

For the last six years, the average AQI (Air Quality Index) scores in Dhaka was 219, which falls in the category of extremely unhealthy, the report said. The permissible limit of clean air is AQI 0-50.

Dust generated from development work contributes 30 percent to air pollution, while about 29 percent of due to industries and brick kilns.

Ambient air pollution accounts for an estimated 4.2 million deaths globally per year. They die from stroke, heart disease, lung cancer as well as acute and chronic respiratory diseases.

The report, released yesterday, also stated that nights in Dhaka provide little relief from the pollution. "It was found that nighttime is riskier for residents than daytime, as the air quality nosedives at night due to multiple factors."

The reasons include trucks carrying construction materials and inter-district buses entering the city at night, city corporation workers sweeping the roads during that time, and the dip in temperature that allows dust to hang in the air for a longer time.

From 2020-21, air pollution has increased by 9.8 percent, the report stated, adding that it was mainly due to economic activities getting back on track after Covid-19 restrictions were relaxed.

Professor Ahmed Kamruzzaman Majumder, chairperson of Stamford University's environmental science department, who led the study, told The Daily Star that Dhaka's air starts deteriorating from 4:00pm, and pollution peaks around 2:00am.

"The air quality is better after 2:00am till 6:00am. Then it dips again from 6:00am to 9:00am, as office and school-goers hit the streets," he said at a press conference organised by Bangladesh Poribesh Andolon (Bapa) in the city yesterday.

Taking part in the discussion, Bapa General Secretary Sharif Jamil said Dhaka's AQI was above 300 on 37 days of the last six years, which is seriously hazardous for people.

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- » In the last six years, Dhaka residents inhaled clean air for only 38 days
- » Dust from development work highest polluter
- » Average Air Quality Index score 219, which is extremely unhealthy
- » AQI was above 300 on 37 days of the last six years

"Under Environment Conservation Act-1995, when air quality deteriorates to such a level, the department of environment [DoE] must issue a warning to residents about this health hazards. We never saw any such notice or warning from it, which indicates their sheer negligence," he said.

He also alleged that foreign companies that are executing the country's mega projects do not comply with environmental guidelines, disregarding people's health.

The Daily Star called Ashraf Uddin, director general of DoE, and Md Asadul Haque, director (Dhaka metropolitan) of DoE for their comments. They did not receive the calls nor replied to texts.

The High Court on November 24 last year issued nine instructions to DoE, two city corporations and BRTA to make sure that waste-carrying vehicles, construction materials and construction sites are covered with tarpaulin, and that water is sprinkled on streets.

According to a World Bank study, air pollution kills 10,000 people in Dhaka alone every year, while 1,53,000 people die across the country.

How could you violate PM's directive?

Atiqul asks BR director general over allowing construction on canal

Dhaka North City Corporation (DNCC) Mayor Md Atiqul Islam yesterday asked Bangladesh Railway's director-general how they allotted a waterbody for the construction of a five-star hotel and shopping complex, violating the prime minister's direction.

The mayor asked the question to DG Dharendra Nath Mazumder over phone, while conducting a drive to recover a waterbody at Kuril Biswa Road.

"Check and cancel the allotment. We are demolishing the structures," he told the DG.

Afterwards, DNCC officials demolished a large signboard of Millennium Holdings Limited set up on the waterbody.

The mayor also made a phone call to the railways minister in this regard earlier, during which the minister assured of taking appropriate steps.

"This waterbody has been playing a vital role to save Nikunja residents from waterlogging for a

Dare not skip 'guest room meeting'

Made to stare at bright light by 'BCL members', DU student passes out

A first-year mass communication student at Dhaka University was allegedly bullied and mentally tortured by a few seniors in the guest room of Bijoy Ekattor Hall on Wednesday night.

A probe body was formed yesterday by the hall authority after the student submitted a written complaint to the provost's office, as confirmed to this correspondent by Prof Abdul Bashir, provost of Bijoy Ekattor hall.

According to Akhtarul Islam's complaint, he was summoned to the guest room around 10:00pm by five-six second-year students. He was made to stare at a bright light for over 10 minutes.

Akhtarul's alleged ordeal continued till the accused asked him to leave the guest room after he started feeling unwell. He became unconscious upon reaching his dorm room and had to be rushed

to Dhaka Medical College Hospital for treatment.

His only fault was that he could not attend the last "guest room meeting" as his father was unwell, he said.

The accused are Kamruzzaman Raju of sociology; Saiful Islam of international relations; Hridoy Ahmed Kajal of history; Yamin Islam of social welfare and research; Saiful Islam Rohan of public administration; and Omar Faruk Shuvo of psychology.

Akhtarul and the witnesses said all of them are BCL activists of the DU unit.

However, Omar Faruk Shuvo denied the allegations and termed the accusations "false and baseless".

Sources said the accused belong to a BCL faction led by its activists Abu Yunus and Rabiul Islam Rana.

"Our organisation doesn't support any such inhuman acts. Strict steps will be

11-yr-old dies falling down building stairs

An 11-year-old boy died after falling down stairs of a building in the capital on Wednesday night.

The deceased is Md Roman, son of Jahangir of Charfashion upazila in Bhola district. He was a student of Class IV.

Police said Roman was playing with other children on the stairs of the building in Hazaribagh Bou Bazar area. Around 8pm, he lost balance while catching a ball and fell down the stairs.

Roman was rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital where he was declared dead around 9:30pm, said Inspector Bachchu Mia, in-charge of the hospital police outpost. The building staircase was filled with rainwater, he added.
