PhD thesis 'Political Parties in India' launched as a book

"It didn't read like a thesis. It read like a book," reminisced Prof Rounaq Jahan while speaking of Gyantapas Abdur Razzaq's PhD thesis "Political Parties in India"

She said this while talking at the thesis' launch, as a book, at the capital's Bengal Shilpalay yesterday. Marking the launch, Gyantapas Abdur Razzaq Foundation and University Press Limited (UPL) also held a discussion on the book.

Professor Razzaq has not shown a single unnecessary statistic in his book.

Left behind, left uncared for

Woes of migrant workers' families mostly unaddressed

Since her husband migrated to Saudi Arabia as a worker in 2018, Kulsum Begum (not her real name) has been looking after their family back home in Tangail.

Apart from arranging food and healthcare, the 30-year-old needs to take care of the education of her ninth-grader daughter and fifth-grader son with the money her husband sends home, albeit irregularly.

"It's no easy job. I have to remain stressed all the time," said Kulsum.

What makes the mother more worried is the money -- Tk 3 lakh -- her husband borrowed from a local lender before his migration. She could not pay any instalment yet because the money she gets from her husband is not enough to run her family, let alone paying off the debt.

"Sometimes I seek support from my parents who live nearby," she said. Like Kulsum, many left-behind family members,

especially females, are facing such problems in absence of their male members, but this issue remains largely unaddressed in the government policy.

Most migrants on boat were Bangladeshis Says Bangladesh embassy in Rome following

Some 273 out of 287 migrants recently found on a boat in the Mediterranean have primarily been identified as Bangladeshis, according to the Bangladesh embassy in Rome.

The migrants were heading to Italy. However, the embassy was yet to ascertain identities of seven individuals, reportedly Bangladeshis, who died of hypothermia while crossing the sea from Libya.

Arfanul Haque, labour welfare counsellor at the embassy, yesterday said their priority is to find out details of the deceased and send the bodies home.

Following their rescue, the Bangladeshis were taken into custody of Italian authorities at different centres, Arfanul said over phone, adding

"Publishing this book is a matter of great pride for us," UPL managing director Mahrukh Mohiuddin said in her opening remarks. "It will be of interest not only to political scientists, but also to historians and experts of our political and academic sphere."

In her foreword for the UPL edition -- edited by Ahrar Ahmed, professor emeritus at Black Hills State University, US and director general of Gyantapas Abdur Razzaq Foundation -- Prof Jahan offers a synopsis of the basic arguments presented in the thesis.

There has not been much research on the social cost of migration in Bangladesh, but a research book published in 2020 by Refugee and Migratory Movements Research Unit (RMMRU) shed some light on the issue.

Titled "Social Cost of Migration: Left-behind Children, Husbands and Wives in Bangladesh", the book said although economic gains of migration are enjoyed by the nation at large as well as by the migrant households as a unit, the "social costs of migration" are mostly borne by the individual household members.

As perceived social cost of migration, about 70 percent of left-behind wives expressed their agony of staying without husbands, while 67 percent are overburdened with additional responsibilities, said the book.

Thirty-five percent go through psychological stress and regularly encounter social perception that they are "leading a comfortable life by spending their husbands' hard-earned money", it said.

The book is based on research conducted in 2014, 2017 and 2018. The study included 831 left-behind wives and 1,784 children in different migration-prone districts.

At least 45 percent wives dealt with psychological, physical or sexual issues, while 30 percent of them, being single mothers, are overburdened with problems of raising their children.

About 40 percent wives complained about "social scrutiny" as they are often "judged" by their SEE PAGE 4 COL 2 that Bangladeshi authorities already talked with some of the survivors.

Decisions regarding their fate will be as per Italian laws, he said. There might be some minors but no female migrants were among those rescued, he further said. The boat also carried Egyptians, according to the embassy.

On getting information on January 25, the embassy has been in constant contact with relevant Italian authorities, reads a press release issued by the embassy on Friday.

Trucker stabbed to death

A truck driver was stabbed to death in Dhaka's Demra early yesterday.

The deceased is Saiful Islam (30) of Mendipur Uttarpara.

Unknown persons stabbed him when he was transporting sand from Sarulia to Kamarbhog area around 3:00am. A truck driver found him lying in a pool of blood beside the road and informed police, said Nayeem Molla, another trucker.

Saiful was declared dead at Dhaka Medical College Hospital around 6:00am.

Deceased's uncle Mostaq Ahmed said they suspected that Saiful was stabbed by muggers as mugging takes place in the area often.

Hares Mia, a subinspector of Demra Police Station, said they are investigating the murder. The body was sent for

autopsy.
