7 held over mugging of 2 Indian students in Dhaka

Detectives have arrested seven alleged robbers on charge of mugging two Indian students a week ago.

They were arrested in separate drives from the capital and Keraniganj on Friday, Mahbub Alam, joint commissioner (DB-south) of Dhaka Metropolitan Police, told a press briefing at DMP media centre yesterday.

The arrestees are ringleader Abdullah Al Yousuf Ahmed Ashique, Fakrul Islam Faku, Almas, Suman, Shaheen, Babu and Shafiqul Islam.

Yousuf, the mastermind of the gang, has eight cases filed against him with different police stations, the DB official said.

During primary interrogations, detectives found that the gang goes out to rob people once a week, carrying out at least four to five muggings at a

stretch. They hide the number plates of the vehicles they use to make it hard to trace them.

They strike early in the morning, when the roads are empty. They catch their targets at places without police patrol, the official said.

## 'It's relevant to this day'

#### Gyantapas Abdur Razzaq's PhD thesis 'Political Parties in India' launched as a book

"It didn't read like a thesis. It read like a book," reminisced Prof Rounaq Jahan while speaking of Gyantapas Abdur Razzaq's PhD thesis "Political Parties

She said this while talking at the thesis' launch, as a book, at the capital's Bengal Shilpalay yesterday. Marking the launch, Gyantapas Abdur Razzaq Foundation and University Press Limited (UPL) also held a discussion on the book.

**Professor** Razzaq has not shown a single unnecessary statistic in his book.





A student of Prof Razzaq at Dhaka University, Prof Rounag was the one who first discovered the thesis, prepared in 1950.

"Publishing this book is a matter of great pride for us," UPL managing director Mahrukh Mohiuddin said in her opening remarks. "It will be of interest not only to political scientists, but also to historians and experts of our political and academic sphere."

In her foreword for the UPL edition -- edited by Ahrar Ahmed, professor emeritus at Black Hills Štate University, US and director general of Gyantapas Abdur Razzaq Foundation -- Prof Jahan offers a synopsis of the basic arguments presented in the thesis.

# Left behind, left uncared for

Woes of migrant workers' families mostly unaddressed

Since her husband migrated to Saudi Arabia as a worker in 2018, Kulsum Begum (not her real name) has been looking after their family back home in

Apart from arranging food and healthcare, the 30-year-old needs to take care of the education of her ninth-grader daughter and fifth-grader son with the money her husband sends home, albeit irregularly.

"It's no easy job. I have to remain stressed all the time," said Kulsum.

What makes the mother more worried is the money -- Tk 3 lakh -- her husband borrowed from a local lender before his migration. She could not pay any instalment yet because the money she gets from her husband is not enough to run her family, let alone paying off the debt.

"Sometimes I seek support from my parents who live nearby," she said.

Like Kulsum, many left-behind family members, especially females, are facing such problems in absence of their male members, but this issue remains largely unaddressed in the government

There has not been much research on the social cost of migration in Bangladesh, but a research book published in 2020 by Refugee and Migratory Movements Research Unit (RMMRU) shed some light on the issue.

Titled "Social Cost of Migration: Left-behind Children, Husbands and Wives in Bangladesh", the book said although economic gains of migration are enjoyed by the nation at large as well as by the migrant households as a unit, the "social costs of migration" are mostly borne by the individual household members.

As perceived social cost of migration, about 70 percent of left-behind wives expressed their agony of staying without husbands, while 67 percent are overburdened with additional responsibilities, said

The book is based on research conducted in 2014, 2017 and 2018. The study included 831 left-behind wives and 1,784 children in different migration-prone districts.

At least 45 percent wives dealt with psychological, physical or sexual issues, while 30 percent of them, being single mothers, are overburdened with problems of raising their

About 40 percent wives complained about "social scrutiny" as they are often "judged" by their

### Another zebra dies at Gazipur safari park

One more zebra has died at Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Safari Park in Gazipur, the 10th over the last month.

Following the death of nine zebras between January 2 and 24, two more fell ill. One of them died around 11:00am yesterday, said Tabir Rahman, in-charge of the park and also assistant conservator of forests (ACF).

After condition of the two animals worsened, park authorities had communicated the matter to wildlife experts and members of a medical board, including former curator of Dhaka Zoo Prof ABM Shahidullah, he said.

The zebra died before they could arrive, he

An autopsy was performed, and a six-member probe body were looking into the matter, he also

There were 70 animals, including the zebras, in the park's African Safari section, which spreads over 60 acres. Park sources said the number of animals there

increased threefold since its opening, but the space remained the same.

Meanwhile, park authorities were working on following experts' recommendations put forward after the deaths of nine zebras. The recommendations included changing animals' drinking water regularly, providing them with food on clean trays, vaccination, and giving them

Five of the nine zebras died from diseases. while four died after fighting with each other, they added.

Hares Mia, a subinspector of Demra Police Station, said they are investigating the murder.

The body was sent for autopsy.
