Power from Payra, Rampal to Dhaka delayed

Electricity transmission from newly built Payra and Rampal plants to Dhaka's Aminbazar has to wait for at least 7-8 months, as construction of a high voltage 400 kV double-circuit power transmission line is yet to be completed.

Bangladesh Power Development Board (BPDB) incurred a huge financial loss owing to the delay, according to sources.

According to official sources, Power Grid Company of Bangladesh (PGCB) had undertaken the 164.6 km-long Aminbazar-Maowa-Mongla transmission line project earlier in 2016, at a cost of Tk 2,505.37 crore.

As per a revised schedule, the project was supposed to be completed by December 2021, but got delayed because of the ongoing Padma Bridge construction.

"Foundation of only two towers out of seven has been completed by Bangladesh Bridge Authority," said Golam Kibria, PGCB managing director.

"We hope to get the rest done by April 2022. PGCB will require another 5-6 months to complete the installation," he added.

A PGCB official said that BPDB has to pay a penalty of Tk 130 crore per month to the Payra power plant for failing to transmit electricity.

GRAFT ALLEGATIONS AGAINST JU VC

Probe incomplete after two years

Jahangirnagar University Vice Chancellor Prof Farzana Islam is going to complete her tenure for the second term on March 2, 2022. However, several allegations against her and JU BCL unit remain unresolved even after two years.

Dr Farzana is the first female VC in the country. But her tenure is marked with allegations of tender manipulation, bribery, and embezzlement of funds, which were raised in 2019. The VC has kept denying the allegations since then, and no proper investigation was done on the matter.

Durneet Biruddhe Jahangirnagar (Jahangirnagar against corruption), a platform of JU teachers and students, has urged President Abdul Hamid to form a probe committee and submitted a written complaint to the chancellor. They also submitted a list of corruption allegations and evidence to University Grants Commission (UGC) and the education ministry, according to Professor Rayhan Rhyne, convenor of the platform.

Earlier, UGC formed a three-member committee to probe into all the allegations, Md Golam Dastagir, senior assistant director of UGC's public university management department, confirmed to this correspondent.

"UGC member Prof Muhammed Alamgir was appointed as convenor of the committee, while another member, Dr Dil Afroza Khanam, was appointed as a member. I was appointed as the member secretary," said Dastagir.

When asked about the investigation's progress, Dastagir said, "The allegations are yet to be probed. We failed to complete it, as we couldn't perform on-spot investigation due to the pandemic."

"It's a long process. We have to take interviews and investigate the documents provided to us."

abroad," he said when asked about the submission of the probe report.

Contacted, Prof Alamgir said, "I don't know anything about this, as I'm no longer affiliated with the committee. Golam Dastagir is in charge now." However, neither of them could tell the exact date of forming the committee, how long they have been investigating or the deadline of probe report submission.

"The authorities' silence work as certificates to carry on with the corruption. There has been no transparency. We didn't even know about the committee," said Rakibul Rony, president of Bangladesh Student Union's JU chapter.

Dr Laek Sazzad Andellah, president of JU Teachers' Association, said, "I think the probe committee doesn't see anything serious with the issues. Maybe that's why two years have passed and we still don't know of any progress."

People will no longer fall into AL's trap
Says BNP on search committee

Criticising the search committee to form the next Election Commission, BNP yesterday said the country's people will no longer fall into Awami League's trap.

"They [government] destroyed democracy and the electoral system. They asked why we did not give names to the search committee. It's not the first deception. It's an extreme deception with people," said BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir.

Fakhrul made the remarks while addressing a programme at BNP chairperson's Gulshan office.

"Like the previous election commissions, they formed this EC in the same way to stay in power," said the BNP leader.

"I want to clearly say that the country's people will no longer put their foot in Awami League's trap. People will destroy all of their [AL's] plans to abolish democracy," he said.

"People will create a national unity to resist these horrible anti-democratic and anti-liberation forces and establish rule through holding a fair election under a neutral election-time government," added Fakhrul.

Telecom operators to send their messages in Bangla

To commemorate the Language Movement, telecom operators are set to send all promotional and system-generated text messages and notifications in Bangla from tomorrow.

Bangladesh Telecommunication Regulatory Commission (BTRC) will launch the service to mark International Mother Language Day, the day when people fought for Bangla's recognition and sacrificed their lives on February 21, 1952.

This feature will be beneficial for a vast number

- ⌚ Service to launch tomorrow

This means that banks or other institutions can still send messages in either English or Bangla. However, if any foreign or local customer wants to get their SMS in English exclusively, there will be an option for them.

According to Brig Gen (retd) SM Farhad, secretary general of Association of Mobile Telecom Operators of Bangladesh, mobile operators were finalising the initiative.

According to industry insiders, most operators worldwide send out messages in the native language of the country they operate in.

3 placed on remand, one sent to jail

Lalbagh Police Station on Thursday, accusing the four.

According to the case statement, the victim (20) was introduced to Shuvo six months back. Around a month ago, she went to her village in Patuakhali. Shuvo promised to marry her and told her to come to Dhaka over phone.

She arrived at Sadarghat from Patuakhali on February 12. Shuvo received her from there, took her to Dina's house in Lalbagh and raped her.

On February 14, she was shifted to Al Amin's house in Mugga, where Shuvo, Al Amin and Sabuj raped her again.

Earlier, the victim told police that she was confined, drugged and raped multiple times between February 12 and 16.

She was dumped at Dhaka University's TSC on February 16, from where she was rescued by a pedestrian and admitted to Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

The victim's father filed the case with
