

HINDU LAW HC seeks experts' opinions on inheritance

The High Court yesterday decided to take opinions from some jurists and researchers on the rules of a customary law that deprives Hindu women of inheriting their deceased fathers' properties.

Supreme Court lawyers AM Amin Uddin, Prabir Neogi, Subrata Chowdhury, Md Qumrul Haque Siddique and Tapan Chakrabarty; General Secretary of Bangladesh Hindu Law Reform Council Pulack Ghatak; and a few others have been asked to place their opinions on the issue before the HC as amici curiae (friends of the court).

While hearing a writ petition, the HC bench of Justice Mamnoon Rahman and Justice Khandaker Diliruzzaman also allowed five rights organisations to become an additional party to this case so that they too could place their opinions.

The rights organisations are Bangladesh Legal Aid and Services Trust (BLAST), Ain O Salish Kendra (ASK), Manusher Jonno Foundation (MJF), Bangladesh Mahila Parishad (BMP) and Nari Pakkho.

The HC bench also sent the case to the chief justice to constitute a larger bench for hearing and disposing of the matter.

The writ petitioner's lawyer Khairul Alam Chowdhury told The Daily Star that a larger bench of the HC, which will be constituted by Chief Justice Hasan Foez Siddique, will fix a date for hearing the matter.

The larger bench will hear expert opinions from the amici curiae on the issue and that details of the HC order will be known after its written text is released, he said.

Lawyer Sharmin Akhter appeared for the rights organisations during the virtual hearing.

The HC bench on February 14 issued a rule

JUSTICE FOR ROHINGYA ICC prosecutor for collective efforts

Prosecutor of the International Criminal Court Karim AA Khan QC has laid emphasis on a collective responsibility which can actually help them move beyond talking about justice to delivering it for the Rohingyas.

"We have to work together to achieve justice. That is what required," Khan told reporters at a media briefing at a city hotel, noting that justice is an absolutely essential prerequisite for indicating people and rights.

Expressing satisfaction over the support he received from Bangladesh so far, the ICC prosecutor said he looks forward to working with all in Bangladesh, international community and the Rohingyas so that they can actually move forward.

The ICC Office of the prosecutor is investigating alleged crimes against the Rohingya within the Court's jurisdiction.

The ICC prosecutor, earlier, had a meeting with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina and thanked her for her steadfast support for international criminal justice and her continued leadership in quest of accountability.

During his weeklong visit to Bangladesh, Khan also had a meeting with Foreign Secretary Masud Bin Momen and met Rohingyas and other

stakeholders.

In his meeting with female survivors in Kutupalong camp of Cox Bazar, Khan heard their stories, hopes for justice and talked how they can work together with the ICC to hold accountable those who committed international

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crimes against them.

In November 2019, ICC Judges granted a request to open a full investigation into alleged atrocities committed against the Rohingya within the jurisdiction of the Court.

This authorisation to open an investigation is seen as a "significant development" for the pursuit of justice and the establishment of the truth, in particular for the victims of alleged crimes of this situation.

Over 12 crore now received first doses

Nearly 71 percent of the country's population aged over 12 have now got at least one dose of a Covid vaccine with around 1.12 crore people receiving their first jab on Saturday.

Thanks to the special campaign that began on Saturday across the country, over 12 crore people have now received their first shot.

The extended special campaign ends today. Originally intended for one day, the campaign was extended as hundreds of people thronged vaccination booths.

The health directorate reported 864 new cases and nine deaths from Covid-19 yesterday.



Staring down

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Earlier this month, the GACA informed Biman top officials that the carrier won't be able to operate any flights to the kingdom from February 7 for failing to ensure a single general sales agent from January, said Biman insiders.

Biman then turned to Bangladesh ambassador to Saudi Arabia Mohammad Javed Patwary to convince the GACA to allow Biman another week, the sources added.

Patwary said he observed serious mismanagement in Biman.

In a letter to M Mahbub Ali, the state minister for civil aviation in Bangladesh, Patwary said Biman management could not respond properly to GACA's repeated reminders.

"Biman is well aware of the problem of moving from one GSA [general sales agent] to another. They should have had good planning. [But] in the absence of this practice, Biman officials in the foreign country are in an embarrassing situation," the ambassador wrote.

Termining the situation "horribly", the

ambassador said, "Biman officials go to the embassy with various issues and ask for the embassy's help at the eleventh hour when little can be done."

Contacted on February 24, Patwary said, "We are working to find a way out."

Biman Managing Director and CEO Abu Saleh Mostafa Kamal said the company had two general sales agents for operating flights to and from Dammam, Medina, Jeddah, and Riyadh.

"We have appointed Elaf Travel and Tourism Company as the new GSA on January 1 following the GACA instructions," said Abu Saleh.

He said they could not complete other related work, including settling arrears of the previous general sales agents and transferring iqama of Biman employees.

"We have sought time from the GACA to complete all these tasks," said the Biman MD.

The necessary work will be done very soon, he said.

Over 6,000 people, mostly migrant workers, leave Dhaka for the gulf country every week flying Biman.

Putin puts nuke forces on alert

The EU yesterday announced swingeing new sanctions against Russia, closing its airspace to Russian aircraft and banning Russian state media outlets broadcasting in the bloc.

A day after Berlin said it would send anti-tank weapons and Stinger missiles to Ukraine, German Chancellor Olaf

Scholz said the world was in a "new era" and warned of further sanctions.

Machine gun fire and explosions were heard in Kharkiv earlier yesterday and AFP later saw the wreckage of a Russian armoured vehicle smouldering and several others abandoned.

Moscow also claimed it was "entirely" besieging the southern Ukrainian

city of Kherson and the city of Berdyansk in the southeast.

Ukraine yesterday lodged a complaint against Russia at the International Court of Justice in The Hague to get it to halt its invasion.

Ukrainian officials also said that a gas pipeline in eastern Kharkiv and an oil depot near the capital Kyiv were targeted by Russian

forces overnight.

In Kyiv, many residents spent another night in shelters or cellars as Ukrainian forces said they were fighting off Russian "sabotage groups", but yesterday was relatively calm compared to previous days.

Western sources said the intensity of the resistance seems to have surprised Moscow.

'How can I leave?'

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Soon after Russian President Vladimir Putin declared war on Ukraine on Thursday, hundreds of thousands of foreigners and Ukrainians began pouring into the border areas to flee to neighbouring Poland, Romania, Slovakia, Hungary and Moldova.

The road leading to the Ukraine-Poland border saw huge gridlock, with many facing fuel and food shortages.

"People from the surrounding communities are cooking and supplying food to those stuck on the road. These Ukrainians are so kind hearted. You cannot believe the emotional scenes unless you see for yourself."

The Ukrainian men are giving car keys to their wives and staying back to fight the Russians, said Ahmed, whose wife and son had gone to Bangladesh to visit a few weeks back and have decided to stay put for now.

"The Ukrainians are fully united now -- they

are doing their best to protect their country," he said, adding that many civilian Ukrainians are joining the military and has been able to resist the Russians in many places. He knows some Ukrainians of Bangladeshi origin joining the fight.

Some of the 2,500 Bangladeshis in Ukraine have decided to stay back.

So far, about 400 Bangladeshis have reached Poland, with many hundreds waiting to cross the border.

Of those who have reached Poland, 46 are in temporary shelter arranged by the Bangladesh Embassy in Warsaw, said the foreign ministry in a statement. The rest of them are living in their own arrangement.

The Bangladesh Embassy in Poland is working to rescue and relocate 28 Bangladeshi nationals through the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) in Ukraine and also working to evacuate those who are in jail or detained through the International Organisation for Migration, Ukraine.

Besides, 15 Bangladeshi students have arrived in Hungary and seven entered Romania. The Bangladesh embassies respectively are looking after them.

In a statement yesterday, the Bangladesh Embassy in Poland said it has already taken an initiative to repatriate the Bangladeshis who reached Poland from Ukraine.

It also asked them to send their passport numbers, mobile numbers and address via WhatsApp to embassy official Touhid Imam at +4915778676376 or e-mail at service.warsaw@mofa.gov.bd immediately.

Also, the embassy said those stranded in Ukraine should send their names, mobile numbers and full address to the same WhatsApp number.

"Please stay wherever you are. Considering the situation, the ICRC will contact and rescue you and reach you to the border," the embassy said.

Two teams of the Bangladesh embassy are working at the Ukraine-

Bangladesh border to provide consular services.

Bangladeshi ship with 29 on board stuck in Ukraine

A commercial ship of Bangladesh and its 29 crews remained stranded at the outer anchorage of a Ukrainian port because of Ukraine-Russia conflict.

The crew members, all Bangladeshis, are safe, said Captain Mujibur Rahman, general manager of Bangladesh Shipping Corporation.

Bangladesh Shipping Corporation owns the 180-metre long bulk carrier MV Banglar Samridhhi that reached the outer anchorage of Ukrainian port Olvia on February 23.

"As the situation deteriorated, we cancelled the plan of loading the cargo from the port and asked the ship master to leave the port immediately and reach international waters," said Captain Rahman.

But it took some time to get the port clearance and by then all operations at the port stopped due to Russian invasion, he added.

Jamalpur man sent to jail over rape

A Jamalpur court yesterday sent a man to jail on charges of raping a minor girl in the district's Melandah upazila early yesterday.

The accused is Bilash Uddin, 20, of the same upazila, said police.

The victim's mother filed a case with Melandah Police Station Saturday night.

According to the case statement, the girl used to go to Bilash's place to take tuitions. Taking the chance, Bilash raped her multiple times promising marriage.

Later, as she became pregnant, Bilash refused to get married and avoided her family.

Teacher arrested over rape of eight-year old

An eight-year-old girl in the capital's Kafrul area was sexually abused allegedly by a 65-year-old man yesterday.

The child, a third-grader of a local school, was admitted to the One-Stop Crisis Centre at Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

Shawkat Hossain, the tutor, sexually abused the child when he came to teach her at her home around 10:00pm, said police.

"My child came to me crying shortly after the house tutor arrived. She was bleeding and she told me everything," mother of the victim said.

Police detained Shawkat following the incident. Filing of a case is underway, Hafizur Rahman, officer-in-charge of Kafrul Police Station, said.

Nations approve major UN report on climate impacts

Nearly 200 nations approved a major UN climate change report detailing the accelerating impacts of global warming yesterday, at the end of a sometimes fraught two-week meeting overshadowed by Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) confirmed that debates had concluded over the report's crucial "Summary for Policymakers", a 40-page overview distilling the thousands of pages of scientific research, which has been reviewed line-by-line and will be made public on February 28.

Species extinction, ecosystem collapse, mosquito-borne disease, deadly heat, water shortages, and reduced crop yields are already measurably worse due to global heating.

Just in the last year, the world has seen a cascade of unprecedented floods, heatwaves and wildfires across four continents.

All these impacts will accelerate in the coming decades even if the carbon pollution driving climate change is rapidly brought to heel, the report is expected to warn, according to an early draft seen by AFP in 2021.

It will also underscore the urgent need for "adaptation" -- a term that refers to preparations for devastating consequences that can no longer be avoided.
