## Put an end to red-tapism

#### Planning minister urges officials, as businesses call for conducive trade environment

Businesses yesterday called for policy assistance, policy continuity and corporate tax cuts in the upcoming budget for fiscal 2022-23 to help them thrive in the post pandemic world.

"We want policy assistance -- please give us the same opportunities as the foreign investors," said Mostofa Kamal, chairman of Meghna Group of Industries at ne dialogue, at the dialogue organised by the Dhaka Chamber of Commerce (DCCI), Bangla daily Samakal and TV channel Channel 24.

The foreign investors make profits and repatriate the sum to their home countries.

"But those of us who invest here for the long-term, we face barriers from the regulatory bodies and many government offices. They treat us negatively instead of receiving us positively," he added.

Md. Shafiul Islam Mohiuddin, a former president of the Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industries, acknowledged harassment faced by businesses at the hands of the regulatory bodies.

"Authoritarian attitude should be changed and policy consistency is very important for a smooth business environment," he said, adding that all players from the sector are treated the same way when just is found to be

### Opposition MPs blast provision to appoint administrators in local govt bodies; Pourashava bill passed

The opposition MPs yesterday opposed the provision to appoint administrators in local government bodies, saying the provision is unconstitutional. The provision is part of the Local Government

(pourashava) (Amendment) Bill, 2022, which was passed in the House after taking voice votes. The bill aims to ensure local government polls

every five years and allows the appointment of a government official or a "suitable person" as an administrator in an expired municipality. Why would an

explanation of the reasons for the appointment of the administrator. This amendment is being made to remove the representatives and replace them with the ruling party

In response, LGRD Minister Md. Tazul Islam, who placed the bill, said it was logical to make provision for the appointment of administrators.

Some chairmen had stayed in office for more than five years and up to even 15-16 years, taking the scope of a clause in the existing law that stated that the present chairman will remain in the chair until the next election.

To stop this practice, the government has made this amendment to the 2009 law, he said. With the passing of the bill, pourashava

> chairmen will be barred from staying in office for more than five years.

After the five-year term, the government would be able to appoint an administrator either from the government services with administrative experience or any other eligible person, according to the new law.

The appointed administrator will remain in the post for a maximum of six months and elections have to be

held by this time. It also changed the name of pourashava member to poura executive officer.

Furthermore, it was decided that the proposed law includes another clause that if any pourashava fails to pay the salaries and the other wages of its officers and employees for 12 months, then the government may abolish its status as a

### Ward councillor assaults school headmaster

A ward councillor assaulted a secondary school headmaster for not allowing him to keep construction materials on Lahini Secondary School grounds in Kushtia municipality yesterday

According to sources, the municipality, under the direction of Asadur Rahman Asha, councillor of Ward-21, has been constructing a road next to the school near the Kushtia-Rajbari Highway.

While it kept several construction materials on the school premises, the municipality had also been using its electricity for construction purposes during school hours and was recently barred from using its water pipes.

When Headmaster Nazrul Islam asked Asha to take away the construction materials and not use the school's electricity and water, Asha stormed into his office with some men and assaulted him. They also vandalised the room.

Seeing their headmaster harassed, the students immediately began protesting and put up a barricade on the highway near the school, demanding the councillor's punishment. Locals also joined the protest that lasted from 11:00am

Matiar Rahman Majnu, president of the school's managing committee and also the current panel chairman of Kushtia municipality, said a councillor cannot assault someone.

### Sense of direction better in ruraldwellers: study

People who grew up in the country have a better sense of direction and navigational skills than those raised in cities, a study

said Wednesday.

To find out

how childhood environment influences navigation ability. scientists looked at how almost 400,000 people from 38 countries played a mobile video game designed

for neuroscience

research. Players of the "Sea Hero Quest" game had to navigate a boat to find checkpoints on a map, according to the study

published in the Nature journal. "We found that growing up outside of cities appears to be good for the development of navigational abilities, and this seems to be influenced by the lack of complexity of many street networks in cities," said lead researcher Hugo Spiers of University College London.

### Sinha faces yet another graft case

The Anti-Corruption Commission yesterday filed a case against former chief justice SK Sinha and his brother Ananta Sinha for laundering about Tk 2.35 crore (\$280,000).

Anower Prodhan, ACC's deputy director (Gulshan), filed the case with its integrated district office-1.

According to the case statement, a "burger shop" in Canada's Toronto deposited around Tk 1.65 crore to a US bank account owned by Ananta on different dates between April and June 2018.

Another Tk 50 lakh was deposited in the same account from an Indonesian company during the same period.
