TRANSFORMER THEFT

Irrigation in Boro fields faces setback

Irrigation in 2,500 hectares of land in Nilphamari is facing setback in the ongoing Boro season as transformer theft has become rampant which may lead to production fall.

The dry season paddy needs massive irrigation using power-run shallow pumps or deep tube wells but criminals continued stealing transformers, much to the worry of farmers in the district.

According to sources, total 124 transformers have been stolen in Nilphamari this year. Of them, 42 have been owned by Barind Multipurpose Development Authority (BMDA) and 26 by Bangladesh Agriculture Development Corporation (BADC) respectively to irrigate with deep tube wells while individuals own 56 to operate shallow pumps.

Due to this, irrigation to 2,500 hectares of land faces uncertainty as each deep tube well can cover 30 hectares and shallow pump five hectares.

In mid-December, thieves stole two transformers of the deep tube well owned by farmers' association at Uttar Gobindapur village in Nilphamari Sadar upzila under BADC at early stage of transplanted rice.

Monzurul Islam, manager of the association, said as per rule of Rural Electrification Board (REB), farmers should pay for replacement of stolen transformers as each 10 kva transformer costs Tk 65 thousand.

"We couldn't transplant Boro saplings in time as power connection restored two months later in mid-February. It happened as we failed to pay in time but finally REB considered our case and allowed payment in installments," he added.

Project stakeholder farmer Babul Roy said, "Due to late plantation, production in each bigha may drastically fall to 12-15 maunds as usual yield of Boro is averagely 25-28 maunds."

"We got replacement of stolen transformer only after 12 days but by this time saplings turned reddish for want of irrigation water as it was

their growing stage," said farmer Ershad Ali of Ranachandi Abiler Bazaar Farmers' Association in Kishoreganj upzila under BMDA, adding that their transformer was stolen in January.

Farmers' Association managers Aminur Huq Shah of Tupamari village in Sadar and Kamrul Islam Sona of Chilahati village in Domar upzila said farmers lodged complaints to local police stations seeking recovery of stolen transformers but got no result.

BMDA's Zonal Engineer in Nilphamari Alamgir Md Ruhul Islam said, "Transformer stealing causes concern. I have requested police to take action in this regard."

"For sake of food production, we instantly replace stolen transformers with new ones by allowing farmers to pay small amount as first installment and the rest even after Boro harvest," said General Manager of REB Sultan Nasimul Huq.

Officer-in-Charge of Sadar Police Station Abdur Rouf said they were raiding different areas to arrest the criminals.

Rival forces in South Sudan clash again

Fresh fighting erupted Friday between government and opposition forces in South Sudan just days after both sides pledged to uphold a ceasefire and try to save a teetering peace deal.

The clashes in oil-rich Unity State were the latest in recent weeks between forces allied to President Salva Kiir and those loyal to his deputy, veteran opposition leader Riek Machar.

The pair rule in a power-sharing government which was brokered in the aftermath of a civil war that left nearly 400,000 people dead before a peace agreement paused the bloodshed in 2018.

Costly cart before horse

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Aviation expert ATM Nazrul Islam said Biman needs to assess whether there are enough Dhaka-Toronto passengers.

Around 1 lakh Bangladeshis live in Canada, but they do not fly to Bangladesh as often as the migrants do from countries in Asia, he added.

"Biman previously operated flights to Frankfurt, New York, Yangon, and other destinations. But those routes were abandoned because Biman did not have proper planning and feasibility studies done," said Nazrul Islam.

WON'T SUSTAIN

Not many Bangladeshis are likely to choose Biman, paying an additional \$200-300 on tickets to fly directly, Nazrul said.

About half the individuals on the maiden flight on March 26 were officials of Biman, the civil aviation ministry, and the Civil Aviation Authority of Bangladesh. Biman's Planning Director Mahbub Jahan Khan said it cost the state-owned company Tk 4 crore.

Hours before the Dreamliner left Dhaka on March 26, Biman said its assessment showed direct flights to Toronto would be commercially viable.

Biman officials said a feasibility study was done. The study said the plane would not be able to carry more than 130 people to be able to fly directly to Toronto without needing to refuel.

But sources at the airlines said Biman had assessed the viability of the direct flights through "secondary sources".

Currently, Biman has four Boeing 777-300ERs, four 787-8s, two 787-9s, six 737-800s, and five De Havilland Canada Dash-8 Q400s. The 777s and 787s are long-range aircraft and the 737s are short to medium-range planes while the Dash-8s are short-haul aircraft.

Will the highways be ready?

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RHD PLANS

AKM Manir Hossain Pathan, chief engineer of the RHD, yesterday met his top officials and project directors and gave some directives to keep the highways ready.

Talking to this correspondent, he said the authorities concerned were asked to complete all road maintenance works.

The original deadline to complete the works was April 15, but as some divisions could not catch up, they were asked to complete the works by April 20 maximum, meeting sources said.

One major concern for those going to the north-western districts is the ongoing expansion works

of 190km Elenga Rangpur highway, which has been witnessing regular congestion in recent times.

The situation may worsen once the pressure of vehicles increases, commuters said.

Waliur Rahman, project director of the expansion work, said they have prepared a plan to divert all vehicles from Elenga to a bypass-road that goes through the Elenga municipality towards Bangabandhu bridge.

The vehicles towards Dhaka would be diverted to the Bhuapur road from the east end of the bridge to avert congestion. They have made necessary renovations on the bypass roads for this, he added.

However, police will take

a decision in this regard considering the situation, he told this correspondent.

He added they will also open the two existing lanes of the under-construction Nalka bridge before April 25 and keep them functional, while another two lanes are being added. "This will have a positive impact."

They will also open a four-lane bridge at Chandrakona and expand the narrow corners at Hatikamrul intersection.

However, traffic movement may be a problem in Gobindaganj town as the project authorities could not start the works of a flyover there, he added.

The RHD is also making plans to make the Dhaka-Gazipur highway functional ahead of Eid.
