COVID RESPONSE FUNDS

Over the last two years, the government has been able to utilise only around 15 percent of Tk 8,150 crore allocated for two Covid-19

The World Bank, Asian Development Bank and the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank in 2020 committed \$800 million (Tk 6,970 crore approximately) to support Bangladesh in testing and treating Covid-19 cases, purchasing vaccine and strengthening its ill-

The remainder of the cost is borne by the government.

The funds have to be utilised by the end of June 2023, according to the government's annual development plan.

The funds were committed at a time when the country's health sector was in urgent need of medical equipment to contain the

Putting unelected people at helm undermines constitution: experts

The government's decision to dissolve zila parishads has received widespread criticisms with experts saying that the appointment of unelected individuals at the helm of the 130-year-old local government body contradicted the constitution.

It is unfortunate that the government chose to appoint administrators instead of holding zila parishad polls, experts said.

It remains to be seen whether the government picks the administrators from the ruling party or the bureaucracy.

Meanwhile, local Awami League leaders, including the ones who lost their zila parishad chairmanship on Sunday, are now lobbying for administrator posts, AL insiders said yesterday.

On Sunday night, the Local Government Division of the LGRD ministry in circular announced the dissolution of zila parishads of 61 districts. Until the administrators are appointed, as per the newly-amended law, the Chief Executive Officers of the zila parishads will oversee the administrative and financial matters.

With this, the chairmen and members of the zila parishads lost their

LGRD Minister Tajul Islam in a statement yesterday said the Election Commission could not hold elections to all the union parishads on time due to the pandemic.

"As the union parishad chairmen and mayors and members of the

municipality are the voters in zila parishad polls, the election to the local government body [zila parishads] could not take place.'

Amid strong opposition from the BNP and Jatiya Party MPs, the "Zila Parishad (Amendment) Bill" was passed in parliament with a provision to appoint a suitable individual or an official as the administrator after the five-year tenure of the district-level local government body ends.

The administrator will be in office

until a new administration is formed. However, the term of the administrator will not be over 180 days and an individual can't be the administrator more than once.

The dormant zila parishads were revived through the first zila parishad polls on December 28, 2016.

Amid boycotts by the BNP and the JP, the ruling Awami Leaguebacked candidates became chairmen in 25 districts, AL leaders running as independents won in 13, and AL leaders won unopposed in 21. Polls were held in two other districts later.

EC must earn people's trust Journos say during talks

The Election Commission should take steps to restore people's trust in it and reform the electronic voting system for holding a free, fair and participatory election, senior journalists said yesterday.

Speaking at a dialogue with the EC, they also suggested that the commission should introduce Voter Verified Paper Audit Trail (VVPAT) system with the EVM machine through which a voter would be able to get feedback after having a printed slip. This would help the commission earn the people's confidence.

The VVPAT system gives instant feedback to the voter showing that the vote polled has in fact been allotted against the candidate chosen.

Yesterday, the EC held talks with senior journalists of the electronic media and online news outlets at the conference room of its Sher-e-Bangla Nagar office in the capital.

The commission is now holding dialogues with various professional groups and politicians for recommendations on how to hold free and fair elections. Masud Kamal, head of

Russia bombards cities

Seven Ukrainians killed in Lviv; Luhansk governor urges people to evacuate

Russia said yesterday it had hit hundreds of military targets in Ukraine overnight, destroying command posts with air-launched missiles, while authorities in the western city of Lviv, which has escaped heavy bombardment, said

a missile attack killed seven. The Russian defence ministry said in a statement it had destroyed 16 Ukrainian military facilities in the Kharkiv, Zaporizhzhia, Donetsk and Dnipropetrovsk regions and in the port of Mykolayiv, in the south

and east of the country. It added that the Russian air force had launched strikes against 108 areas where Ukrainian forces were concentrated and Russian

artillery struck 315 Ukrainian military targets overnight.

Driven back by Ukrainian resistance in the north, the Russian military has refocused its ground offensive in the two eastern provinces known as the Donbas. while launching long-distance strikes at other targets, including the capital, Kyiv.

It is now trying to take full control of the Ukrainian port city of Mariupol, which has been besieged for weeks and which would be a huge strategic prize, linking territory held by pro-Russian separatists in the east with the Crimea region Moscow

annexed in 2014. Ukrainian authorities said missiles struck military facilities

and a car tire service point in Lviv, which is just 60 km from the Polish border. Lviv mayor Andriy Sadoviy said seven people were killed and 11 were wounded. The blast shattered windows of a hotel housing Ukrainians evacuated from elsewhere in the country, he added.

Russia denies targeting civilians and rejects what Ukraine says is evidence of atrocities, saying Ukraine has staged them to undermine peace talks.

Ukrainian Prime Minister Denys Shmyhal said troops in the pulverised port of Mariupol were still fighting on Sunday, despite a Russian demand to surrender.

"The city still has not fallen," he told ABC's This Week programme, SEE PAGE 6 COL 5
