‘We see more opportunity, less challenge’
South Korean envoy on bilateral collaboration

The current global geopolitical situation is creating more opportunities rather than challenges for South Korea and Bangladesh for closer collaboration due to their deep relationship, said Ambassador Lee Jang-keun yesterday.

“The companies have realised the risks from geopolitical confrontations and the necessity of diversifying their investment and partners. Bangladesh is becoming an increasingly attractive partner for Korean companies,” he said while addressing a seminar on 50 years of Bangladesh-South Korea relations at the Foreign Service Academy.

The foreign affairs ministry, South Korean Embassy in Dhaka and the Dhaka University’s East Asia Study Centre organised the event.

Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen was present as chief guest, while Lee Jang-keun and Bangladesh Ambassador to Korea Delwar Hossain were special guests. Dhaka University International Relations Prof Dr Delwar Hossain chaired the event.

Lee Jang-keun said Bangladesh and Korea produced many successful

Railway authorities have directed its vendor that handles online-ticketing services to deploy a new app before Eid-ul-Azha to improve the service, which often faces criticism.

They also asked the Shohoz-led joint venture firm to further improve their system to provide smooth services during huge rush, especially ahead of Eid.

Officials of Bangladesh Railway (BR) were also asked to start preparing for the next Eid, to be celebrated in early July.

All these directives were given at a meeting held yesterday to evaluate BR and its vendor’s performance centring Eid.

Railways Minister Nurul Islam Sujan presided over the lengthy meeting held at Rail Bhaban. Top officials of the ministry, BR and the vendor firm participated.

The Daily Star came to know about the development after talking to at least three meeting participants.

The journey home and return via train went quite smoothly this Eid.

However, like previous years, hundreds of people thronged Kamalapur and other railway stations to buy train tickets in advance ahead of Eid. Many spent sleepless nights to buy tickets, while others complained about the online-ticketing service.

The new vendor took charge of BR’s ticketing service in March, but the app that was previously used remained non-functional, as it

was operated by the previous vendor.

Currently, the online-ticketing service only has a website.

In this situation, the railways minister asked Shohoz to deploy the app as soon as possible.

Officials of the vendor said they are developing the app and taking time to avoid any problem once it comes into action.

In reply, the minister asked them to place the app before authorities within the middle of next month to check different aspects.

The incident of an employee of the vendor being arrested ahead of Eid for selling train tickets in black market was also raised at the meeting.

When it was mentioned that the arrestee also worked for the previous vendor, the current vendor was asked why it is hiring employees of the previous vendor.

The previous vendor did not hand over documents and data properly, and that is why it was forced to hire them, said an official of the new vendor.

Some other problems regarding online-ticketing services were also discussed at the meeting, and authorities asked the new vendor to update its service further, participants said.

The issue of huge crowds at Kamalapur Railway Station was also discussed, and it was decided that more spots and counters are to be introduced.

Some officials also said as they have to take

‘Ensure timely interview’
Students urge govt regarding US visa

Over 300 students who obtained scholarships and got admitted to different universities in the US urged the government to take necessary steps to ensure their visa interview slots on time.

A six-member student delegation yesterday submitted a memorandum to the foreign minister at his office.

A member of the delegation told this correspondent that they met Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen at noon.

The minister assured them that he would write to the authorities concerned soon.

Another delegate said a large number of applicants got interview slots in late 2022 and early 2023 while they have to join their programmes by this July.

“We are not able to reschedule the slots due to a recent policy change by the US embassy,” he said.

The delay has pushed around 2,000 students of the Fall 2022 session into uncertainty regarding joining their programmes on time.

The memorandum read that a significant portion of the students have received financial aid from the universities in the form of merit scholarships, research, and teaching assistantships and they are fearful that they will have to forfeit such hard-earned awards.

NATIONAL BUDGET
Allocate 8pc for health sector
Say speakers

At least 8 percent of the national budget in 2022-23 fiscal should be allocated for the health sector, putting primary healthcare in the heart, speakers at a pre-budget webinar recommended yesterday.

Bangladesh Health Watch, Brac James P Grant School of Public Health of Brac University, and Unnayan Somonnoy organised the dialogue.

Dr Atiur Rahman, former governor of Bangladesh Bank and president of Unnayan Somonnoy, presented the keynote at the event.

“Majority of healthcare seekers go to healthcare centres for primary health care. So, allocation for this segment should be as much as 30 percent of the total health budget,” he said.

Currently, around 25 percent of health budget is spent for primary health care, while 39 percent for secondary health care and 36 percent for tertiary health care.

He said the budget size of 2022-23 fiscal is forecasted to be Tk 6,78,000 crore, which is 15.4 percent of the GDP, while it is 17.5 percent of the GDP in current fiscal.

He opined that if the government allocation for medicine is increased by three-fold, the health expenditures borne by patients can be decreased to 58 percent from 68.5 percent currently.

Dr Zafrullah Chowdhury, founder of Gonosasthaya Kendra, said investing Tk 10 crore in each union health sub-centre can bring a

Provide them with language skills training
Say speakers on female migrant workers

Female migrant workers should be provided with sufficient skills training, including learning the host country’s language for their empowerment and safety in receiving countries, said speakers at a workshop yesterday.

They said strong network among civil society groups in Bangladesh and the receiving end can also play a vital role in ensuring their safety.

International Food Policy Research Institute organised the workshop on “Strengthening Institutions for Empowering Female Migrants in Bangladesh” at a city hotel.

Nomita Halder, managing director of PKSF, said to provide language training to aspirant migrants, returnee migrants who have good knowledge on host countries’ language could be employed as trainers.

Nomita, a former secretary of the expatriates’ ministry, said such issues should be addressed in government policy intervention.

Disseminating findings of a study report, Nazmun N Ratna of Lincoln University, New Zealand, said female migrant workers are vulnerable to job loss, reduced pay and health issues. Besides, abuse of female migrant workers may be under-reported, she said.

They should also be provided with accurate information regarding their jobs and environment in host countries, said Prof Sadeka Halim, a sociologist and teacher at Dhaka University’s sociology department.

Sumaiya Islam, executive director of Nari Sramik Kendra, said female migrant workers in Saudi Arabia could be provided with hostel facility for safety. She stressed for recognising middlemen in migration channel to hold them accountable for fraudulence.

Using expats to smuggle gold

At least 40kg gold seized, 7 held at Dhaka airport in one month

In the name of sending gifts to dear ones, several syndicates have been using expatriates to smuggle gold into Bangladesh.

The criminals pack gold bars inside electronics like charger fans, cameras or phones, and then ask the expatriates to carry them to Bangladesh, telling them that the packages are for relatives.

These consignments are coming to the country mostly from Saudi Arabia, Dubai and Qatar.

Expatriates mostly take the packages out of Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport (HSIA) by themselves, but in a couple of cases, airport and airline staffers were found to be involved.

of the last month, investigators claimed to have come up with the findings.

In the last month, around seven people were arrested and at least 40 kg of gold were seized from HSIA, according to officials of airport customs.

On Wednesday night, officials of Dhaka Custom House arrested an expatriate -- Md Shafiqul Islam -- with 20 gold bars weighing over 2.5 kg and worth around Tk 2 crore.

Shafiqul had come to Bangladesh from Saudi Arabia.

Md Riazul Islam, deputy commissioner of Dhaka Customs House, confirmed the development to The Daily Star yesterday.

He said Shafiqul had brought a charger fan with him, and after
