Palestinians bid farewell to slain Al Jazeera journo

Thousands of people packed Jerusalem's tense Old City yesterday for the burial of veteran Al Jazeera reporter Shireen Abu Akleh, after Israeli police stormed the start of the funeral procession.

Israel and the Palestinians have traded blame over the fatal shooting of the Palestinian-American on Wednesday during an Israeli raid in the occupied West Bank.

The interim findings of an Israeli army investigation could not determine who fired the bullet that killed Abu Akleh, the military said. But an army statement noted a soldier could have fired the bullet that killed the 51-year old journalist, in what Al Jazeera called a deliberate "killing in cold blood".

TV images showed Abu Akleh's coffin nearly falling to the ground as Israeli police grabbed Palestinian flags from the crowd around the procession outside Saint Joseph's hospital in Israeli-annexed east Jerusalem.

Thousands of mourners attended the funeral at a church in Jerusalem's Old City in the afternoon. Grief over her killing spilled beyond Palestinian territories, with protests erupting in Turkey, Sudan and elsewhere.

The United States, European Union and United Nations have backed calls for a full investigation into Abu Akleh's killing. The Palestinian Authority has rejected holding a joint probe with the Jewish state.

On Thursday, Israel advanced plans for 4,427 housing units for Jewish settlers in the occupied West Bank, an Israeli non-governmental organisation said. The Civil Administration's high planning committee gave final approval to 2,791 units and initial endorsement for another 1,636 units, said Peace Now.

COUNTERING CHINA Biden pledges \$150m to Asean

US President Joe Biden opened a gathering of Southeast Asian leaders with a promise to spend \$150 million on their infrastructure, security, pandemic preparedness and other efforts aimed at countering the influence of rival China.

On Thursday, Biden started a two-day summit with the 10-nation Association of Southeast Asian Nations (Asean) in Washington with a dinner for the leaders at the White House ahead of talks at the State Department.

While Russia's invasion of Ukraine is on the agenda, Biden's administration hopes the efforts will show the countries that the US remains focused on the Indo-Pacific and the long-term challenge of China, which it views at the country's main competitor.

In November alone, China pledged \$1.5 billion in development assistance to Asean over three years to fight Covid and fuel economic recovery.

The summit marks the first time that Asean's leaders gather as a group at the White House and their first meeting hosted by a US president since 2016.

Fighting rages in Donbas

Ukrainian forces destroy parts of Russian armoured column; another naval ship hit in the Black Sea

Ukrainian forces destroyed parts of a Russian armoured column as it tried to cross a river in the Donbas region, video from Ukraine's military showed yesterday, as Moscow appeared to be refocusing its assault in the east after a new pushback by Kyiv.

Ukraine has driven Russian troops away from the second-largest city of Kharkiv in the fastest advance since Kremlin forces pulled away from Kyiv and the northeast over a month ago, although Moscow is still bombarding villages north of Kharkiv.

The city, which had been under fierce bombardment, has been quiet for at least two weeks and Reuters journalists have confirmed Ukraine now controls territory stretching to the Siverskyi Donets River, around 40 km to the ea

Russia, which denies targeting civilians, said its forces had shot down a Ukrainian Su-27 aircraft in the Kharkiv region and disabled the Kremenchuk oil refinery in central Ukraine.

It was not immediately possible to verify the reports.

Southeast of Kharkiv, Britain said Ukraine had stopped Russian forces crossing the Siverskyi Donets river west of Severodonetsk. Footage released by Ukrainian Airborne Forces Command appeared to show several burnt out military vehicles near segments of a partially submerged bridge and many other damaged or abandoned vehicles, including tanks, nearby.

Reuters could not immediately verify the report, or when or where the clash took place.

The British defence ministry said Russia was investing significant military effort near Severodonetsk and Izium, and trying to break through towards Sloviansk and Kramatorsk to complete their takeover of Ukraine's industrial Donbas region.

Russian-backed separatists said they had taken the Zarya chemical plant in Rubizne near Severodonetsk.

The Kremlin calls its Feb 24 invasion of Ukraine a "special military operation" to demilitarise a neighbour threatening its security. Ukraine says it poses no threat to Russia and that the deaths of thousands of civilians and destruction of cities and towns show that Russia is waging a war of aggression.

In the southern port of Mariupol, Russian forces intensified ardment of the Azovetal steelworks, the last bastion of Ukrainian defenders in a city almost completely controlled

by Russia after a siege of more than two months. Reuters video showed explosions and thick smoke on Thursday and Ukrainian fighters released footage showing gunbattles.

Renewed fighting around Snake Island in recent days could help Ukraine resume grain exports vital to world supplies, some of which are now being shipped by rail.

Ukraine said it had damaged a Russian navy logistics ship near Snake Island, a small but strategic outpost that Ukrainian military intelligence said allows control of civilian shipping. Russia's defence ministry did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

WOMEN RIGHTS G7 condemns Taliban over growing curbs

The Group of Seven industrialised nations condemned the growing restrictions placed on women and girls by the Taliban in Afghanistan, accusing the hardline Islamist group of isolating the country.

"We call on the Taliban to urgently take steps to lift restrictions on women and girls," the foreign ministers of Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Britain and the United States said in a statement.

When the Taliban seized power in Afghanistan last year, they promised a softer rule than during their first stint in power from 1996 to 2001, which was marked by human rights abuses.

But they have increasingly restricted the rights of Afghans, particularly girls and women, who have been prevented from returning to secondary schools and many government jobs.

Women across the country have been banned from travelling alone, and last week the authorities ordered them to cover up completely in public, ideally with a burga.

Iran nuke talks have 'reopened'

Stalled negotiations over Iran's nuclear programme have been unblocked after fresh talks in Tehran, EU foreign policy chief Josep Borrell said yesterday, adding that he believed a final deal was within reach. Borrell said a mission by EU envoy Enrique Mora this week to help revive the 2015 nuclear pact between Iran and world powers had gone "better than expected". "The negotiations had stalled and now they have been reopened," Borrell told reporters on the sidelines of a G7 meeting in Germany. "There is a perspective of reaching a final agreement."

North Korea reports first Covid-19 death

At least one person confirmed to have Covid-19 has died in North Korea and hundreds of thousands have shown fever symptoms, state media said vesterday. offering hints at

the potentially dire scale of country's first confirmed outbreak of the pandemic. About 187,800 people are being treated in isolation after a fever of unidentified origin has "explosively spread nationwide" since late April, the official KCNA news agency reported. At least six people with fever symptoms have died, with one of those cases confirmed to have contracted the Omicron variant of the virus, KCNA said.
