NO WORK, NO PLAY

Shahbagh Shishu Park remains closed; no progress on modernisation for over 3.5 years

Shahbagh Shishu Park has remained closed since January 2019, as the authorities are working to modernise it. But no progress has been made on the modernisation project for the last three and a half years.

Seven Eid holidays have passed by, but the park, which has been a prominent centre of recreation for families over the years, has been unable to serve anyone during the holidays.

The Department of Public Works, which owns the park's land, is currently working on an underground car parking inside the park under the Ministry of Liberation War Affairs.

It will take another two years to complete the construction, after which Dhaka South City Corporation's (DSCC) mechanical department will work on the park's modernisation under a separate project. According to officials, it will take another three years to relaunch the

In January 2019, DSCC announced its closure by hanging a notice in front of the park, stating that it will be closed to public to avoid any unwanted accidents during the modernisation and development work, implemented by the Ministry of Liberation War Affairs.

According to the work order of the ministry project, the construction of Swadhinata Stambha (Phase 3) was supposed to start in January 2016 and be completed by 2019. Shishu Park was also supposed to be open, with new underground parking and infrastructures, around the same time.

However, construction inside the park



has not yet begun, even after around 41 months, due to some complications regarding budget allocation.

Besides, the deadline for the construction of Swadhinata Stambha has been extended several times, with the latest deadline being June 2022. As of yet, about 40 percent of the work remains, for which the ministry is preparing to extend the project till June

According to the project stakeholders, for DSCC to modernise the park with new rides, the corporation was supposed to be allocated Tk 65 crore out of the total budget of Tk 265 crore for the

Swadhinata Stambha project.

However, DSCC had an objection to this proposed allocation from the beginning. DSCC informed the ministry that to replace the old and risky set of rides in the park, a higher allocation was required. A year and a half ago, the ministry asked DSCC to modernise the park under a new project. Later, DSCC prepared a proposal with a budget of Tk 616 crore and sent it to the LGED

According to LGED engineers, the DSCC project has not yet been approved. If approved, it would still take another three years to reopen the park. There is

no possibility of opening it before 2025.

Meanwhile, city experts said the closure is depriving an entire generation of children of healthier modes of entertainment, hindering their physical and mental development.

"Dhaka has very limited space for children, and Shishu Park is one of them. The fact that it will be closed for almost half a decade is completely unacceptable. What's more concerning is that even the stakeholders don't have clear information regarding its reopening," said Adil Mohammed Khan, executive director of Institute for

Commission in London yesterday. His namaz-e-ianaza will be held on Friday after Juma prayers at the Brick Lane Mosque in

After that, Gaffar Chowdhury's body will be taken to Shaheed Altaf Ali Park, where people from all walks of life will turn up to pay their last respects to him.





DSHE QUESTION LEAK SCANDAL

Field agents were active to sell leaked questions

Say detectives after analysing communication between arrestees, examinees

A cashier and book-centre staffer of two government colleges in Dhaka have worked as field agents to find examinees who would purchase the leaked questions of Directorate of Secondary and Higher Education's (DSHE) recruitment test.

Detectives claimed to have received the information after analysing communication details between those who have been arrested and a number of examinees who took part in

Amid these developments, DSHE authority

cancelled the test on Thursday.

An emergency release, signed by Prof Md Shahedul Khabir Chowdhury, director (college and administration wing) of DSHE, mentioned that the recruitment test for the post of "office assistant/computer operator" has been cancelled for unavoidable reasons.

Investigators have also seized two phones, from which they found the details of the examinees. Detectives are now trying to extract information from them, said officials.

Meanwhile, school teacher Saiful Islam, from whose device the test answers were leaked on May 13, was sent to jail after a one-

day remand.

A high official involved with the interrogation told this newspaper that Saiful informed that an education-cadre official of DSHE helped the syndicate with the leak.

"We're now working on collecting evidence against the official, who joined service after the 31st BCS exam," said the official, requesting anonymity.

Meanwhile, detectives are now interrogating three arrestees -- Md Rashedul Islam, teacher of Patuakhali Government College, as well as Md Nowsadul Islam and Ahsanul Habib, both office assistants at DSHE -- on a two-day police remand.

From the arrestees, detectives got a bank account number, which was given to an examinee to send money for the answers. "We're verifying the account details and

transaction," said another DB high official. Shahadat Hossain Sumon, additional deputy commissioner of DB, told The Daily

Star on Wednesday that the answers, which were sent to the examinee's WhatsApp, was written by someone on paper, and then a picture of it was sent. "We'll be going for a forensic test to check whose handwriting it was. We'll match it

with the five arrestees' writing," said the official. "We have got some names of the syndicate members, and our drive is ongoing to arrest them." Earlier, detectives arrested Md Sumon Jomadder from Eden College during the recruitment test, and Saiful Islam, an assistant teacher of mathematics at Khepupara Girls Secondary School.

A case was filed with Lalbagh Police Station centring the incident, and detectives started investigating.
