

Khaleda gets permanent bail in Cumilla arson case

The High Court has granted permanent bail to BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia in the Cumilla arson case.

The bench of Justice Justice Jahangir Hossain Selim and Justice SM Mozibur Rahman passed the order after hearing a rule on Monday.

Police filed the case with Chauddagram Police Station on January 24, 2015, following an antigovernment agitation.

In 2019, the HC had granted ad-interim bail to the BNP chief and issued the rule asking the state why she should not be granted permanent bail in this case.

Khaleda's lawyer Kayser Kamal said she is accused in 37 criminal cases and on bail in 35 of them. She is

convicted in two more cases. The BNP chairperson will get bail and acquittal in all 37 cases if the law can take its course and if any external interference is not made in the case proceedings, he added.

Deputy Attorney General Sarwar Hossain Bappy said the HC granted permanent bail to Khaleda as she did not misuse her ad-interim bail.

Khaleda landed in jail on February 8, 2017, after being sentenced to five years imprisonment by a special court in Dhaka in the Zia Orphanage Trust graft case.

On October 30 the following year, the HC enhanced her punishment to 10 years after dismissing her appeal in the case.

The former prime minister was convicted by another special court in Dhaka in the Zia Charitable Trust corruption case on October 29, 2018. She was sentenced to seven years' rigorous imprisonment by the court.

Khaleda was freed from jail on March 25, 2020, after the government suspended her jail sentence for six

Russia moves to encircle Ukraine troops

20 countries offer new arms packages for Kyiv

Russian forces were launching an all-out assault to encircle Ukrainian troops in twin cities straddling a river in eastern Ukraine yesterday, a battle which could determine the success or failure of Moscow's main campaign in the east.

Exactly three months after Russian President Vladimir Putin invaded Ukraine, authorities in its second-largest city Kharkiv re-opened the underground metro, where thousands of civilians had sheltered for months under relentless bombardment.

The reopening was evidence of Ukraine's biggest military success over the past few weeks: pushing Russian forces largely out of artillery range of Kharkiv, as they did from the capital Kyiv in March.

But the decisive battles of the war's latest phase are still raging further south, where Moscow is attempting to seize the Donbas region of two eastern provinces, Donetsk and Luhansk, and trap Ukrainian forces in a pocket on the main eastern

The easternmost part of the Ukrainian-held Donbas pocket, the city

of Sievierodonetsk on the east bank of the Siverskiy Donets river and its twin Lysychansk on the west bank, have become the pivotal battlefield there, with Russian forces advancing from three directions to encircle them.

"The enemy has focused its efforts on carrying out an offensive in order to encircle Lysychansk and Sievierodonetsk," said Serhiy Gaidai, governor of Luhansk province, where the two cities are among the last territory still held by Ukraine.

Further west in Slovyansk, air raid sirens wailed yesterday morning but streets were still busy, with a market full, children riding bikes and a street musician playing violin by a supermarket, reports Reuters.

Gaidai said Ukrainian forces had driven the Russians out of the village of Toshkivka just south of Sievierodonetsk. Russian-backed separatists said they had taken control of Svitlodarsk, south of Bakhmut.

Comments by senior Russian officials vesterday suggested plans for a drawnout conflict ahead. Defence Minister Sergei Shoigu said Russia was deliberately advancing slowly to avoid civilian casualties.

The Donbas fighting follows Russia's biggest victory in months: the surrender last week of Ukraine's garrison in the port of Mariupol after nearly three months of siege in which Kyiv believes tens of thousands of civilians have died.

Petro Andryushchenko, an aide to Mariupol's Ukrainian mayor now operating outside the Russian-held city, said the dead were still being found in the rubble.

US Secretary of Defense Lloyd Austin, in a meeting of allies, announced on Monday that some 20 countries offered new security assistance packages for Ukraine to battle Russian forces.

In Russia, foreign ministry announced that it was imposing an entry ban on 154 members of the UK parliament's House of Lords in retaliation for sanctions against Russian senators over Ukraine, reports AFP.

At the World Economic Forum in Davos yesterday, Spanish Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez said Sweden and Finland, which have applied to join Nato, will attend the transatlantic alliance's summit in Madrid next month.

Spain will speed up its parliamentary procedure to give its backing for the entry of the two nations in the alliance, he said.

Body of IU teacher's wife recovered

Police recovered the body of a woman from her house in Kushtia Sadar upazila's Kamalapur area yesterday morning.

The dead was identified as Nujahan Parveen, 42, wife of Nazrul Islam, who is an associate professor at Kushtia Islamic University (IU).

Sabbirul Alam, OC of Kushtia Model Police, said that according to the couple's 13-year-old daughter, Nurjahan and Nazrul were fighting on Sunday night. During the fight, he hit her with a bat.

Several IU sources said the couple would often have such fights and had to be taken to hospital many times as a result.

OC Sabbir added that after continuing the fight on Monday, Nurjahan locked herself in a room at night. She was found hanging from a ceiling fan yesterday morning.

The body was sent to hospital for autopsy. Nurjahan's brother Jahangir claimed she died by suicide as she was beaten. "We will file a complaint with the police."

Speaking to The Daily Star, Nazrul admitted to fighting with his wife. "She also used to hit me from time to time. But I cannot accept that she would die by suicide for this."

Samrat back in jail

A Dhaka court yesterday sent expelled Jubo League leader Ismail Hossain Chowdhury Samrat to jail again after he surrendered before it, seeking bail in a corruption case.

The case was filed against him for siphoning around Tk 222 crore and channelling it to casinos in Singapore and Malaysia between 2011 and 2018.

Judge Al Asad Md Asifuzzaman, of Special Judge's Court-6, passed the order after a hearing and also directed jail authorities to provide him with proper treatment in jail as per the Jail Code.

Earlier in the day, Samrat appeared before the court from BSMMU by an ambulance. On May 18, the HC cancelled Samrat's bail and ordered him to surrender. Following the order, Samrat challenged the order with the Supreme

The chamber judge, however, refused to stay the HC bail order on May 23.

Samrat was released on bail on May 11 after spending over two and a half years in jail in four cases.

Man sentenced to life for rape

A Thakurgaon court yesterday sentenced a man to life in connection with a case filed against him for raping a student of Thakurgaon Polytechnic Institute in 2010.

Md Golam Farukh, judge of Thakurgaon's Women and Children Repression Prevention Tribunal, delivered the verdict.

The court also fined the convict Rizvi son of late Nurul Islam of Karnite village in Thakurgaon Ranishankoil's upazila, Tk 10,000, in default of which he will have to spend six more months in jail.

According to the prosecution, on May 27, 2010, Rizvi took the victim, who used to live in a dormitory for female students, to a local hotel and raped her there.

On May 29, the girl's father filed a case with Ranishankoil Police Station accusing Rizvi.

While the literary genius was recognised as the national poet from the day after his return on May 24, 1972, no government gazette with regards to this recognition was ever issued.

In January 1976, the Bangladesh government granted him Bangladeshi citizenship and on February 21, he was awarded the Ekushey Padak.

Nazrul, a poet, lyricist, revolutionary musician. and philosopher, was born 11th Joishttha in Bengali calendar-year 1306 (May 25 in the Gregorian calendar). He has gifted the nation with at least 2,400 songs, popularly known as Nazrul

Although known for his criticism of imperialism, social and religious taboos, Nazrul also delved deeply into the themes of love. romance and devotion.

Four migrants were found dead and three were missing after their boat capsized off the Libyan coast, the North African country's coast guard said
