Once struggling to survive, now full of life

Five years ago, Lalbagh's Hazi Abdul Alim Playground was on the verge of extinction. It housed a garbage dumping station and those who abused drugs. And so, residents had no option for a recreational spot near their homes.

But things have changed for the better.

After the playground, situated just beside Dhakeshwari National Temple, got renovated, it is once again a place for locals to breathe fresh air.

The playground has been modernised under the "Jol-sobujer Dhaka" project of Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC), at a cost of Tk 8 10 crore

On November 16, 2019, then DSCC mayor Sayeed Khokon inaugurated the renovated playground.
This 75-katha field has a place for

adults to play football, net practice facilities for cricketers, 250-metre walkways, sitting arrangement for visitors, gymnasium, cafeteria and library.

Besides, CCTV surveillance and Wi-Fi facilities have added another dimension. DSCC has also set up toilets and water-treatment plants near the mosque. There are even special arrangements for Eid jamaats.

Authorities have ensured that when it rains heavily, all water drains away. A reservoir has been built below the

walkway; it can hold about 5,00,000 tonnes of water. The water will be drinkable after being filtrated. At night, the whole field will be

flooded with light.

There is a small three-store

There is a small three-storey building in the field's corner. It has a library on the first floor, and a gym, coffee house and flower garden on the top floor.

During a visit, it was seen that the field was surrounded by fences. Local youths were playing on the green grass. Many were spending time at the sitting area next to the walkway, and some were just hanging out with friends.

One Covid death reported after a week

Bangladesh registered one death from Covid-19 in 24 hours till yesterday morning after one week, said the health authorities.

Besides, the caseload mounted to 1,953,481 with 34 new cases recorded during the period, according to DGHS. The country last saw two Covid-linked deaths with 31 cases on May 23.

On Sunday, 40 new cases were seen with zero deaths. The daily test positivity rate slightly dropped to 0.63 percent from yesterday's 0.79 percent as 5,362 samples were tested.

Tobacco, a threat to environment: Progga

Anti-tobacco platform Knowledge for Progress (Progga) yesterday said tobacco is highly detrimental to Bangladesh's environment, economy, and society. And yet, the country yields 1.3 percent of the world's tobacco supply.

Arable land being used to produce tobacco poses a serious threat to the country's food security, it said in a press release, a day before World No Tobacco Day.

The World Health Organization (WHO) has set this year's theme as "Tobacco: Threat to Our Environment", to raise awareness among people and policymakers about the environmental impacts of tobacco cultivation.

For Bangladesh, this year's theme is "Tamak Mukto Poribesh, Susasther Bangladesh", says news agency BSS. According to Tobacco Atlas, tobacco

According to Tobacco Atlas, tobacco is responsible for about 31 percent of deforestation in the country, it mentioned.

Progga said 90 percent of all

tobacco production is concentrated in developing countries such as Bangladesh.

Agrochemicals used in tobacco fields often find their way into nearby waterbodies, thus negatively impacting fish diversity. Halda river, the only natural carp breeding ground in Bangladesh, is now facing a similar predicament, says the release.

Discarded cigarette butts have become a major source of environmental pollution in the country.

More than half of Bangladesh's tobacco consumers use smokeless tobacco products, sold in plastic boxes and pouches, regularly. This is not only detrimental to people's health but to the environment as well.

Approximately 4.5 trillion cigarette

Approximately 4.5 trillion cigarette butts, the most littered item in the world, find their way into the environment each year, says the release.

Progga Executive Director ABM Zubair said tobacco is putting immense pressure on arable land, forests, fishing grounds and other limited natural

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
