Covid cases rising

The number of Covid-19 patients has been rising for 10 straight days with the health directorate reporting 71 new cases yesterday.

On June 2, the number of new cases declined to 22 from 34 the previous

Since then, the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS) reported an increasing number of new cases daily.

The positivity rate has also increased in the meantime.

On June 2, the positivity rate was 0.42 percent and it reached 1.14 percent vesterday.

No death, however, was reported after May 30 when one Covid-19 patient

"It has been a trend that a new wave emerges every three months. We saw that the last wave ended in March this year. So a new wave is obvious, though it may not be so serious," Mushtuq Hussain, consultant at the Institute of Epidemiology, Disease Control and Research (IEDCR), told The Daily Star yesterday.

Under this circumstances, he stressed on reminding people to maintain health safety guidelines including wearing masks outside home, wash hands frequently and take at least double dose Covid-19 shots.

The first cases of Covid-19 were reported on March 8, 2020. Since then, more than 19.54 lakh confirmed cases of Covid-19 were reported as of yesterday.

The virus claimed at least 29,131 lives in Bangladesh.

Covid-19 cases have also been rising in neighbouring India and Pakistan.

In India, there has been around 92 percent rise in new cases over the last week until Friday while Pakistan saw 18 percent rise during that period.

Ukraine running out of ammo

Says officials; Zelensky remains defiant as fighting rages in the east and south

Ukraine is running out of ammunition, officials said yesterday appealing for more arms, as fighting raged in the east and south of the country.

However, President Volodymyr Zelensky remained defiant and said Ukraine would prevail in its war with Russia.

'We are definitely going to prevail in this war that Russia has started," Zelenskiy told a conference in Singapore via videolink. "It is on the battlefields in Ukraine that the future rules of this world are being decided."

Ukraine has appealed for swifter deliveries of heavy weapons from the West to turn the tide of the war with Russian forces - which it says have at least 10 times more artillery pieces than Ukrainian

"This is an artillery war now," said Vadym Skibitsky, deputy head of Ukraine's military intelligence. The frontlines were now where the future would be decided, he told the Guardian, "and we are losing in terms of artillery".

"Everything now depends on what [the west] gives us," said Skibitsky. "Ukraine artillery piece to 10 to 15 Russian artillery pieces. Our western partners have given us about 10 percent of what they

Ukraine is using 5,000 to 6,000 artillery rounds a day, according to Skibitsky. "We have almost used up all of our [artillery] ammunition and are now using 155-calibre Nato standard shells," he said of the ammunition that is fired from artillery pieces.

"This is an artillery war now," said Vadym Skibitsky, deputy head of Ukraine's military intelligence.

Vitaly Kim, the governor of the Mykolaiv region on the southern frontline, made similar comments in an interview with

Meanwhile, making a surprise visit to Kyiv, the European Commission chief Von der Leyen yesterday said talks she held with Zelensky "will enable us to finalise our assessment by the end of next week" -- the first time the bloc has publicly given a timing.

Zelensky has been pressing for rapid admission into the European Union as a way of reducing Ukraine's geopolitical vulnerability, which was brutally exposed by Russia's February 24 invasion.

But officials and leaders in the bloc caution that, even with candidacy status, actual EU membership could take years or even decades.

Von der Leyen, appearing alongside Zelensky during her second visit to Kyiv since the war began, did not hold out any promises, noting further reforms were needed.

For his part, the Ukrainian president varned it was a "decisive time" for his country and the EU.

"Russia wants to ruin the European unity, wants to leave Europe divided and wants to leave it weak. The entire Europe is a target for Russia. Ukraine is only the first stage in this aggression, in these

Despite reservations among some member states, EU leaders are expected to approve Ukraine's candidate status at a summit on June 23-24, though with stern conditions attached.

The EU and the United States have strongly backed Ukraine, sending weapons and cash to help it see off Russian unprecedented economic sanctions.

Indian High Commissioner to Bangladesh Vikram Kumar Doraiswami inaugurated a five-storey women's hostel on the premises of Umesh Cȟandra-Nirmalabala Chhatrabas at Chalibandar. It was constructed with a financial assistance of Tk 4.35 crore from India.

The hostel, which will run on a not-for-profit basis by the Umesh Chandra-Nirmalabala Chhatrabas Trust, can accommodate 160 women students, according to a statement of the Indian High Commission.

Thereafter, Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen, LGRD and Cooperatives Minister Tazul Islam, Sylhet City Corporation Mayor Ariful Haque Chowdhury and Indian envoy Doraiswami jointly opened the three other projects.

Those include development of Dhupadighipar, construction of cleaner colony building in Kastoghar, and construction of a school building at Chara Dighi Par.

Sylhet City Corporation implemented the projects following an MOU on construction of the projects, signed in 2017 between the High Commission of India, Economic Relations Division of Bangladesh and Sylhet City Corporation.

Mild heat wave likely to sweep the southwest

A mild heat wave may sweep some areas in the country's southwest, said a Bangladesh Meteorological Department bulletin, which will remain valid for 24 hours till 9:00am today.

"Light to moderate rain or thundershower with temporary gusty or squally wind is likely to occur at many places in Rangpur, Mymensingh and Sylhet divisions and at one or two places in Rajshahi, Dhaka, Khulna, Barishal and Chattogram divisions," the bulletin added.

It said some isolated places in the country's north may experience moderately heavy to heavy rain. However, the day temperature may rise slightly

and night temperature may remain nearly unchanged.

Australia unveiled a substantial compensation deal with French submarine maker Naval Group yesterday, ending a contract dispute that soured relations between Canberra and Paris for almost a year.

Prime Minister Anthony Albanese said the French firm had agreed to a "fair and an equitable settlement" of 555 million euros (US\$584 million) for Australia ending a decadeold multi-billion-dollar submarine contract.

The agreement drew a line under a spat that caused leader-level recriminations and threatened to torpedo talks on an EU-Australia trade

No updated data on city buildings

In a 2020 report presented to the Asian Disaster Reduction Center by the management ministry, the government said that around 250,000 buildings in the three major cities of Dhaka, Chattogram, and Sylhet are extremely

vulnerable to earthquakes. The report said that 24 percent of the buildings in Dhaka, 46 percent in Sylhet and 79 percent in Chattogram were detected as risky.

But all of this data is from 2009. The capital city has been expanding at a rate of 3.3 percent every year for the last two decades.

From 2020 till now, there were 27 small earthquakes in Bangladesh and its immediate surrounding Tripura, West Bengal and Assam. Not one of them was above 5.3 on the Richter

Scale. "The effect of highslip-rate of Duaki fault could be observed as the largest seismic hazard in Bangladesh," said the report.
