

Tigers look to get T20I plans in order

Bangladesh will take on the West Indies in the first T20I of the three-match series in Dominica with an eye on getting their preparations right ahead of the T20 World Cup in Australia later this year.

With only four months until the mega-event, the series should offer plenty of direction in regards to areas that need improvement, especially after the batters painted a dismal picture during the last T20 World Cup in UAE.

The Tigers did not even fare that well on a cruise that was supposed to relax them after quite a few players fell prey to seasickness. Some even asked for a different mode of transport during a break in the island of Martinique midway through their journey. But that could not be arranged as managing visas and other documents proved difficult since the island is French territory.

BCB CEO Nizamuddin Chowdhury informed The Daily Star yesterday that the players had reached Dominica safely. Team manager Nafees Iqbal later informed that the players were doing well.

While on safer landscape, Bangladesh's T20I fate still appear to be dwindling with top-order, especially the opening slot being one of the issues.

Bangladesh have used three different opening pairs following that World Cup debacle in the UAE, with Munim Shahriar getting his debut against Afghanistan at home while Mohammad Naim Sheikh, Saif Hassan and Nazmul Hossain Shanto have also been used in the opening slot.

Naim was dropped for the Windies tour altogether following poor performances while Tamim Iqbal is yet to reveal his plans on T20Is after his self-imposed hiatus from the shortest format. Bangladesh brought in Anamul Haque for the tour and it may be him or Liton Das that feature as Munim's partner at the top.



The Test series defeat also leaves baggage ahead of the shorter formats, but the Tigers found themselves in a similar position during their last tour of the Caribbean in 2018. On that occasion, they won both the ODI and T20I series after losing the Tests thanks to Mashrafe Bin Mortaza's ability to keep his side's morale high.

Current T20I captain Mahmudullah Riyad has seen his leadership come in question and it remains to be seen who can help the Tigers prepare for the shorter formats this time around.

With the injuries to Yasir Ali and Mohammad Saifuddin, Bangladesh T20I squad has seen the inclusion of Mehedi Hasan Miraz and Taskin Ahmed while Nurul Hasan Sohan has come in for Mushfiqur Rahim, who has taken a leave. Mosaddek Hossain is another one who could feature due to his abilities as a part-time bowler along with his power-hitting capabilities.

Bangladesh have won only one of their last 10 T20Is. As far as preparations go, the series could be the start of the change in the T20 philosophy for the World Cup.

Bangladesh won against Australia and New Zealand at home before the previous World Cup but the pitches in Mirpur made for poor conditions to prepare for T20 cricket, which was evident in the UAE last time around.

The pitch in Dominica will be a bit of mystery considering that the last match there was played five years ago. The Tigers could take heart from their T20I record against the hosts as they have five of 13 matches. They also have happy memories of beating the West Indies twice in Dominica in an ODI series in 2009.

The likes of Shakib Al Hasan and Mahmudullah Riyad got runs during that tour over a decade ago and they might have to do the heavy lifting as Tigers look to get their T20 compass on track.

Rijthoven extends fairytale run

Dutch wildcard Tim van Rijthoven continued his fairytale grass court run on Friday, claiming his eight straight victory on the surface to storm into the Wimbledon fourth round on his Grand Slam main draw debut.

The 25-year-old was ranked 205th in the world and had not won a title even on the Challenger Tour when he triumphed at the ATP 250 grass court event in 's-Hertogenbosch, Netherlands, defeating world number one Daniil Medvedev 6-4, 6-1 in the final.

"From the outside it obviously looks like a fairytale because it came out of nowhere for a lot of people," Van Rijthoven told reporters after defeating 22nd seed Nikoloz Basilashvili of Georgia 6-4, 6-3, 6-4 in the third round.

"Also, the ATP title for me came out of nowhere because I didn't even win a challenger title before. Played some finals. The level there is just also very high.

Van Rijthoven defeated big-serving American Reilly Opelka, seeded 15th, in his previous round and Friday's victory made him the first men's wildcard to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon since Denis Kudla in 2015.

Next up is a potential meeting with six-times Wimbledon champion Novak Djokovic, who meets fellow Serb Miomir Kecmanovic later on Friday.

Cummins lauds 'unplayable' Lyon

Australia skipper Pat Cummins said Nathan Lyon's nine wickets "showed his class" in the team's Friday thrashing of Sri Lanka in the opening Test.

Lyon bamboozled the opposition batsmen with his off-spin in a match that ended before lunch on day three in Galle, with the hosts bowled out for 212 and 113.

The champion off-spinner pushed past former Indian fast bowler Kapil Dev's 434 wicket tally in the morning to break into the top-10 ranking of all-time Test bowlers.

"Nathan Lyon showed his class, he looked unplayable out there and built off the back of a really good batting day," Cummins told reporters after play wrapped up.

Lyon, 34, led the charge with his five-wicket haul in the first innings and then took four on the third morning to flatten the Sri Lankan batting in their own

den.

He was ably supported by Mitchell Swepson, a leg-spinner, and occasional spinner Travis Head who got his maiden Test wicket and then took three more.

"He's unplayable for left or right handers," Cummins said of Lyon, who has now made 436 wickets across 109 Test matches.

"Sometimes out here, bounce of spinners is spoken about as something that's not desirable, but he showed here with that bounce he was unplayable," he added.

Batsman Cameron Green was named man of the match in a bowler-dominated Test, handling Sri Lanka's spin roster with confidence for a first innings showing of 77.

Cummins said his younger batters like the 23-year-old Green had played in sub-continent conditions before, but that had given little preparation for the turn on Galle's

notoriously tricky wicket.

"I think we had Marnus (Labuschagne), Travis Head, Cameron Green, Alex Carey (but they) hadn't played Test matches in conditions that have spun this much," said Cummins.

"We have a big series next year in India, so this can only help develop and fast-track our batters," he added. "Absolutely you learn so much from these tours."

Green had always been a "fast learner", Cummins said.

"But it's even surprised us how fast he's learnt out there. From ball one, really sharp (with) a really clear method."

Australia were five down for 157 when opener Usman Khawaja departed on day two.

Green put on an 84-run stand with Carey to put the team on course to its 109-run lead at the end of the innings.

The second and final Test begins July 8 at the same venue.

No red ball in my bag, says Buttler

Newly-appointed England limited-overs captain Jos Buttler accepts his Test cricket career is on hold, with "no red ball in my bag", as he prepares to concentrate on white-ball internationals.

Buttler succeeded Eoin Morgan as England skipper in the one-day international and Twenty20 formats after the 2019 50-over World Cup-winning captain announced his retirement from international cricket on Tuesday.

It had been suggested Buttler -- a middle-order batsman in red-ball cricket -- could replace struggling opener Zak Crawley in an England Test side now being captained by multi-format all-rounder Ben Stokes.

And while he hasn't gone as far as Morgan in ending his Test career, Buttler told the BBC at Edgbaston on Friday: "I thought someone had written the wrong story, to be honest. I don't think there is much merit in that (opening in Tests).

"It was Kumar (Sangakkara), wasn't it? Maybe he was just promoting Rajasthan Royals openers!" said Buttler of his IPL franchise boss.

"I've just been enjoying watching the Test side recently. There is no red ball in my bag at the moment."

Meanwhile, England Test captain Ben Stokes will skip the Twenty20 series against India but will return for the one-day internationals.

England host India in three T20s from July 7 followed by three ODIs.



Salahuddin set for fourth term as SAFF chief

Kazi Salahuddin is all set to become SAFF president for consecutive fourth term as the Bangladesh Football Federation president been the lone candidate for the electoral congress of the regional game's governing body to be held at a city hotel today.

As per the new constitution of South Asian Football Federation, the executive committee will consist only seven members -- one president, two vice presidents and four members in which one woman member and one member to represent the SAFF at the Asian Football Federation committee.

"Of seven posts, five had submitted their nominations in five posts -- president, two vice presidents and two members -- one month before but those candidates who submitted their nominations for vice presidents are no longer with the respective federations at the moment and the respective federations [India and Nepal] have already withdrawn and cancelled their nominations," said SAFF general secretary Anwarul Haque Helal.

"I think the rest of three candidates will be elected unopposed tomorrow (Saturday) and the Congress and the electoral committee will decide how to fulfil the vacuum the seven-member committee," said Helal adding the representatives from Nepal, Sri Lanka Bhutan have already reached Dhaka while representatives from Maldives were scheduled to land in early hours today.

Helal also informed one representative from Pakistan was supposed to come as observer but that he did not get the visa.
