The "Networker Baire" actor loves spending time with his wife, renowned actress Pori Moni. The couple are expecting their first child to arrive very soon.

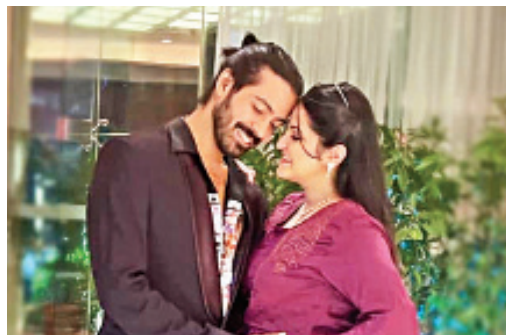

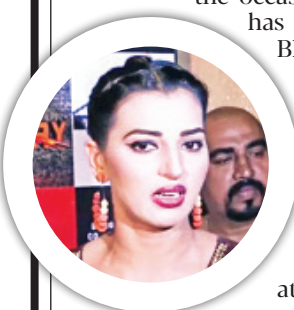


## Barsha responds to criticism about 'Din: The Day'

## Sudden Jamuna erosion makes many homeless

Sudden erosion by the Jamuna river has devoured several homesteads and vast farmlands within a few hours at Mazzan village in Sirajganj's Shahzadpur upazila last week, creating panic among the villagers.

"As I came to know that sudden erosion by the Jamuna started eroding a portion the riverbank in our village, I rushed to my house, but unfortunately couldn't save anything," Rafikul Islam of Mazzan village said.

"When I reached home, I saw it was already on the verge of being eroded, but I didn't dare to go inside," Rafikul said, adding that I lost my homestead, cultivable land and a happy family within few minutes last Friday.

"Two of my four children were playing at the courtyard when my house was devouring. I somehow managed to save my kids, nothing else as the entire house washed away into the river in front of my eyes," another erosion-hit victim Rozina Khatun said.

"Now me and my four children are living in a roadside makeshift shanty, but I have nothing to feed my family as all our food grains, stocked at the house, also went into the river last week," Rozina further said.

Affected villagers said due to the sudden erosion at least 13 houses went into river while another 20 to 25 shifted to other places in last one week.

Sirajganj Water Development Board (WDB) Executive Engineer Shafikul Islam said due to geographical state of the Jamuna erosion is a common catastrophe in Sirajganj during flood.

WDB has already took up a mega project of Tk 600 crore to protect 6.5 kilometre portion of the flood protection embankment in a bid to save Enayetpur, Shahzadpur and Belkuchi upazilas from further erosion, the WDB engineer said.

According to Sirajganj district administration so far around 974 homesteads, at different villages in five upazilas of the district, devoured in the Jamuna during the ongoing flood and the affected villagers need urgent rehabilitation.

During Shazmila's treatment, Kolkata Police had facilitated a "green corridor" (traffic-free streets) for quick supply of 11 units of blood from a blood bank.

Doctors said she died due to excessive internal bleeding following the accident on Sunday. Shirin is currently under treatment at the same hospital.

Two of Shazmila's brothers – one is an officer in the Bangladesh army, the other an IT professional – have been in Kolkata since the accident.

candidate with the fewest votes each time, to whittle the field down to a final two by July 21. The new leader will then be chosen from those two by the 200,000 Conservative party members in the country at large, and be announced on Sept. 5.

While Sunak might be the most popular contender with his colleagues, a YouGov poll of nearly 900 party members found Mordaunt was the favourite, beating any of the others in a run-off. She had a huge lead over Sunak, who fared badly against almost all his rivals, and is now the bookmakers' favourite.

Whoever wins will face a daunting in-tray while having to rebuild public trust bruised by a series of scandals involving Johnson, from the breaking of Covid-19 lockdown rules to appointing a lawmaker to government despite having been told of allegations of sexual misconduct.

Britain's economy is facing rocketing inflation, high debt, and low growth, leaving people grappling with the tightest squeeze on their finances in decades. All this is set against the backdrop of an energy crunch exacerbated by the war in Ukraine, which has sent fuel prices soaring.

## Many digital services

For example, on June 7, the surveyors could not get access to SID Meeting Manager, a meeting notification web application of the Statistics and Informatics Division launched in 2018.

The review of data showed many services are no longer operational because skilled manpower was not developed through training before the completion of the projects.

One such project is the e-Government Project developed by the ICT division and planning division for the digitalisation of the government office activities to ensure accountability and transparency.

The report found the project, whose implementation period was from 2016 to 2021, is not sustainable. The project is yet to be fully completed and there is a dearth of skilled manpower in running the online platform.

But the National e-Government Procurement (e-GP) portal owned and operated by the CPTU to facilitate procurement activities by the public agencies is turning out to be beneficial for its targeted users.

The portal, which has seen more than 25.6 lakh visitors so far, seemed complicated at first but now feels intuitive, according to the service recipients.

However, in the case of tender submission in the service, the system becomes slow. Moreover, the design of the service needs to be further improved; the user interface needs to be simplified and there is a need for adequate bandwidth.

Though e-passport has brought convenience to many, some are struggling to request one due to servers often being down and slow progress in the process.

Despite digitalisation, the users said they still suffer from corruption and irregularities in the passport offices.

They are also not happy with the online MRP service of the Department of Immigration & Passports due to slower delivery and ineptness of staff in providing digital services, the report said.

The users said the server of e-dockets and land mutation website is very slow and, on many occasions, their tax filing shows unpaid even after the balance is transferred.

Besides, middlemen in the land offices discourage people from taking services online and disseminating fake information, the report said.

The portal to request for no-objection certificate for multi-story buildings needs upgrading and correction as people are not getting the service despite filling in the information properly.

Those hoping to avail the e-trade licence, a digital service of Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC), are often met with demands for bribes from the employees of the city corporation office, the report said. Otherwise, they make excuses to not provide the service requested online.

Besides, there is a problem with the server and the application form arrives 2-3 days after application. The service recipients said the quality of service needs to be improved and that there should be monitoring.

Since 2013, the government has given scholarships and grants to 1,089 individuals or organisations in the ICT sector for innovative/research activities. But there are no mobile numbers or emails of the grant recipients, the report said.

It is necessary to verify whether all the innovative projects for which the grants were given have actually been completed and whether their objectives have been achieved.

If the projects' objectives are not met, a huge amount of money would have been wasted, the report said.

It takes a while for Hajj pilgrims to get a no-objection letter and confirmation SMS after filling in details on the website. Many get it at the eleventh hour, according to the study.

With the view to monitoring the prices of essentials, the DSCC has introduced a digital price chart at the entrance of all kitchen markets, which all sellers must stick to.

But, according to sellers, no such board can be found. Instead, they write down the prices manually as they wish, the report found.

to rising import payments and declining remittance.

Import payments have gone up since the end of last year because of the rising prices of commodities in the global market.

Between July and May of the last fiscal, imports went up by 39 percent year-on-year to \$75.40 billion, while exports grew 33 percent to \$44.58 billion.

This resulted in a record trade deficit – the gap between exports and imports – of \$30.81 billion, up 48.8 percent year-on-year.

Remittance, the cheapest source of foreign currencies for Bangladesh, fell 15 percent year-on-year to \$21.03 billion in 2021-22.

The country's foreign exchange reserves dropped below \$40 billion on Tuesday after the Bangladesh Bank cleared the import payments to the Asian Clearing Union (ACU).

The country settled import payments worth \$1.99 billion with the ACU last week, which dropped the reserves to \$39.80 billion for the first time in nearly two years.

The reserve was \$46.15 billion in December last year.

The central bank injected \$97 million into the market yesterday to keep the market stable, Md Serajul Islam, spokesperson for the Bangladesh Bank, told The Daily Star.
