"Data protection is of serious strategic intent. Data sovereignty is at the very centre of the debate. And the localisation of data is important. Moderating content democratically is important," said Foreign Secretary Masud Bin Momen.

Huma Khan, senior human rights adviser to the United Nations Resident Coordinator Office, raised concerns about a provision in the draft.

The provision would allow the government to direct the DG in charge of this law to take action "in the interest of sovereignty and the integrity of Bangladesh, the security

foreign states or public order".

Huma said, "We have seen how such provisions were abused in the case of the Digital Security Act."

Representatives from the business sector raised concerns about how the provision would affect international business and trade.

Speakers from Mastercard and American Chamber of Commerce commented that the cross-border transfer of financial data is necessary for business.
