Mazumder promised to keep me in the follow-up in implementing my six-point demand. I took this decision to keep the country's situation normal and to prevent any third party from taking advantage of my movement to create unrest," Roni said. Roni suspended his movement after

19 days. He, however, said if he sees any irregularities in implementing his demands, he will resume his movement. On July 7, he took to the streets

# 'Make the visa process flexible'

Bangladesh urges India to ease registration for patients

Bangladesh yesterday urged India to show flexibility in the visa regime and wanted New Delhi to address the difference in overstay fine structures applied by the country.

The Indian side was also requested to ease registration requirements for Bangladeshi patients going for treatment at various hospitals

Bangladesh also urged India to ease travel restrictions through all ports for Bangladeshi nationals, according to a statement issued by the Bangladesh Foreign Ministry after holding the third edition of Bangladesh-India Consular Dialogue in Dhaka.

The entire gamut of bilateral consular issues was discussed in depth during the dialogue and the agenda items included expeditious repatriation of each other's nationals, particularly trafficked women and children, smooth issuance of exit permits and granting consular access for a longer period.

At the dialogue, the two sides agreed to expedite the process of consular access, transfer of sentenced persons and visa-related issues among

Both sides reiterated their earlier commitments to share real time information on detainees.

# 38 children drown daily in country

Say WHO, Unicef

As many as 38 children die due to drowning every day in the country, said a joint press release of World Health Organization and Unicef Bangladesh yesterday.

Annually, this accounts for around 14,000 deaths and represents the second leading cause for child (under five) mortality.

In this context, WHO and Unicef have called on the government, development partners, communities and individuals to raise awareness and work to prevent these untimely deaths.

"It is heart-breaking that so many lives are lost each year in this country. We know that these deaths are preventable. We urge individuals, communities and the government

to join us in raising awareness and doing all we can to ensure every child's right to survive and thrive," said Sheldon Yett, Unicef representative to Bangladesh, marking World Drowning Prevention Day (July 25)

Globally, drowning claims the lives of over

2,30,000 people every year.

Nine in 10 drowning cases occur in low- and middle-income countries, with children under the age of five being at the highest risk.

In Bangladesh, where large areas of land remain submerged due to yearly floods, the absence of awareness and swimming skills can prove to be life-threatening, said the press

Children in rural areas who grow up near bodies of water are also exposed to the risk of drowning daily. "We recommend strategies and interventions to prevent drowning continue to promote a multi-sectoral approach," said Dr Bardan Jung Rana, WHO representative to Bangladesh.

## DHAKA AIRPORT THIRD TERMINAL Committee formed to look into 'irregularities'

A parliamentary body yesterday formed a three-member subcommittee to investigate alleged corruption and irregularities centring construction of the third terminal at Dhaka airport.

The parliamentary standing committee on civil aviation ministry formed the committee at its meeting at Sangsad Bhaban.

Awami League MP Anwar Hossain Khan was made convener of the sub-committee. The two other members are Sheikh Tanmoy and Syeda Rubina Akhtar.

Emerging from the meeting, Obaidul Muktadir RAM Chowdhury, chief of the parliamentary watchdog, told The Daily Star that there were allegations of irregularities in the media regarding the construction.

"The parliamentary body has formed a sub-committee to look into that matter," he added.

The sub-committee, however, was not given any time-frame to submit its report before the main committee, meeting sources said. It is alleged that low-quality

products like lamps and electric equipment are being used for the third terminal.
