# So much for the schedule

Sylhet residents facing more than specified load shedding; BPDB claims it doesn't get enough power allotment

Sunday night was quite shocking for Sylhet residents, as Division-2 of Bangladesh Power Development Board (BPDB) published a load-shedding schedule stating that many areas of the city would face blackouts for 12 to 13

However, a BPDB official claimed to have made a mistake and revised the schedule. But this did not resolve the residents' woes.

Even though the government had instructed to enforce load shedding for one to two hours daily, BPDB in Sylhet published a schedule for three to five hours of load shedding.

But it is not even following the schedule, as residents are witnessing blackouts for more than the stated hours. BPDB officials claimed that they are only getting allotments of around 50 percent of the demanded electricity, and so are failing to provide power as per the

Moreover, they have at least 10 percent lower power allotment when compared with that of all other divisional towns of the country, they said.

The failure to maintain the schedule and excessive load shedding have made residents disgruntled. This dissatisfaction may even lead to protests, said residents.

## DSHE official held over question leak

Nahid, who had worked as an employee at the shop eight months back, was behind the theft. He made a copy of the shop's key and gave it to Aunik to steal the phone sets. The duo, with the help of Nadim, used to sell the phones at cheap prices to customers at Bashundhara City mall.

Besides, the Savar city authorities have been ordered to stop dumping waste into the rivers, he added.

During this time, Manjur also revealed that the river commission is working with a goal to make all the rivers of Dhaka pollution free within 2023.

# **ILLEGALLY IMPORTED LIQUOR** Five containers seized in 3 days

Customs officials seized five containers of liquor imported through false declaration in the last

Yesterday, Port Control Unit of Chattogram Custom House identified the two consignments that arrived at Chattogram port at the beginning of the month, but the importers did not submit any documents to release them. The containers were imported by issuing a false

declaration and fake import permissions (IPs) from BEPZA. From three previously seized containers, customs found about 46,809 litres of liquor worth Tk 44.61 crore that was seized on Saturday at Narayanganj and on Sunday from port.

Salauddin Rizvi, joint commissioner of Custom House, said, "We suspected that the same syndicate is involved with the incidents. We will find out the people

involved, including those inside the customs."

According to the customs documents, newly consignments were imported as polyester varn from China by the name Dong Jin Industrial Company, located at Uttara

The previous three consignments were imported by name of Dong Jin Industrial (BD) Company, Hashy Tiger Co Limited, located at Cumilla EPZ and BHK Textile Limited at Ishwardi.

"We do not know who used our company's identity. We produce artificial hair and hairrelated products for export. However, the customs documents said that seized liquor was imported and declared as yarn although our factory does not need yarn," said Gazi Md Maqsud-ur-Rahim, DGM of Dong Jin Industrial (BD) Company.

Customs officials said the importers take the clearance of other products after checking in four to seven steps. But EPZ products are imported through a one-stop service and are cleared through nominal supervision.

## Spend less on defence, more on climate crisis Foreign minister urges

Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen yesterday urged developed countries to divert five to 10 percent of their defence expenditure to initiatives

for stopping climate-induced displacement. The minister said each year, 6,50,000 people are uprooted from their homes in Bangladesh.

He made the remarks in a policy dialogue organised by International Organization for Migration (IMO) on "Human Mobility in the Context of Climate Change: Towards a Common Narrative and Action Pathway", held in the capital.

"I raised the issue at Munich security conference. The world order will break down if we don't act on this now," said Momen. "In my home-town Sylhet, you will see that
