Commuters in peril with extra fare on day 2 of price hike

According to the BRTA chart, the fare for the Farmgateto-Victoria Park route was Tk 17. Bihanga Paribahan used to charge Tk 3 extra for this 7.9km route.

After the recent hike in fuel price, the government has increased the bus fare from 2.15 paisa to 2.5 paisa per kilometre. The new fare on the mentioned route enforced from Sunday is Tk 20.

However, the streak of overcharging by Bihanga buses continues, who are now charging Tk 30 on the route.

Bihanga Paribahan is not the only one. Passengers travelling on all public transport have been charged extra

This correspondent boarded an Ajmeri Glory Paribahan bus from Sadarghat to Gazipur's Chandra route and found

passengers were being charged Tk 5 to 10 extra. The fare charts are yet to be hung on the buses even after two days of the new fares coming into effect, and

Laws, mindset and awareness vital Speakers tell event on ensuring women's safety

Alongside formulation and enforcement of relevant laws, a change in social mindset is required to prevent different forms of offline and online harassment against women, participants said at an event yesterday.

Moreover, training and sensitisation of relevant stakeholders, especially law enforcers, and building mass awareness are essential, they added.

Young Bangla, a youth platform of Centre for Research and Information (CRI), United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) and National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) jointly organised the event styled "Policy Cafe" on "Women's Safety in Public Places" at Bangabandhu International Conference Centre in the

At yesterday's event, Israt Farzana, assistant coordinator of Young Bangla, shared the findings of an online survey conducted by CRI in April-May this year covering 24 districts.

Speakers urge ethnic minorities for getting their rights

To achieve their rights, ethnic minorities should come forward and protest collectively, forgetting differences among themselves, said speakers at a seminar yesterday.

They said if the groups become united and continue their protests, their demands will definitely be met

"There are many differences among different groups of ethnic minorities in plain lands, but they will have to be organised," said Haimonti Sarkar, chief executive of People's Union of the Marginalized Development Organization (PUMDO), one of the keynote speakers in the seminar.

Pallab Chakma, executive director of Kapaeeng Foundation, in his keynote speech said ethnic women are the worst sufferers of environmental disasters.

Women of Mro and Tripura

communities were the main rather they take care of them. sufferers when a rubber company set fire to 350 acres of Jhum land, a village forest and garden in April. But the administration did not take any effective measures against the perpetrator, he claimed.

Natural water resources are being dried up, and biodiversity is being damaged due to the indiscriminate lifting of stones from hill streams, Pallab said.

Citing examples of different surveys and research work, he said at least 22,300 acres of the Mro's land have been encroached without their consent, and at least 1,100 Mro families have been evicted from their own places in 30 villages.

He demanded acknowledgment of ethnic people's identity, language and culture in the constitution through its amendment.

Sanjeeb Drong, indigenous community leader, said ethnic minorities do not destroy forests,

Urging ethic minorities to be united, Rashed Khan Menon, parliamentary chairman of standing committee on social welfare affairs ministry, said though ethnic minorities in hill areas are united, the situation of plain land ethnic minorities is even worse.

While talking as chief guest, he said the effort to resolve indigenous issues requires a political solution.

Khushi Kabir, coordinator of Nijera Kori, said commissioners of different commissions are blamed for not doing their work. But it is also true that no logistics are being provided to them to do their work properly.

In Chattogram Hill Tracts, commissioners were being given charge, but they cannot perform their duties properly.

Another activist Mashiur Rahman Khan Richard, who was protesting at Hatirpool, was charged in the same case.


SI Polash Shaha filed the case against 21 named persons and 20 to 30 unnamed persons with Shahbagh Police Station, said OC Moudut Hawlader.



After Neelam Ghar, another century-old building on brink of destruction

It seems like Dhaka is on its way to remove all traces of its glorious past as another heritage building is on the brink of destruction, ready to be lost like many other historical structures of the city.

Locals said present owners of a two-story heritage building located at 20 Pyari Das Road in Bangla Bazar, have started to demolish it a few days back.

But it was stopped when police went there and challenged the move, they said.

The development comes only a month after the demolition of the Neelam Ghar, a centuryold heritage building in Old Dhaka.

But activists are not so hopeful even though the demolition work have stopped.

Taimur Islam, chief executive of conservation organisation Urban Study Group, said they were informed by architect Augustin Anjan on Wednesday morning about the demolition of the over 100-year-old building and managed to stop it with the help of law enforcers from Sutrapur Police Station.

"But from our past experience, we can say that there's no reason to think that it has been stopped permanently. We're certain that they are going to start again today or tomorrow, maybe in the middle of the night. That's what they do," he said.




He also said the initiative is a violation of a 2018 High Court directive that ordered the authorities to stop changing, modifying and demolishing 2,200 British-era buildings named in USG's list of heritage sites in Old

Contacted, Md Momin Uddin, director (zone-7) of Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk). said they sent their local inspector just after getting this information and coordinated with the local police station to stop the work.

"This building is not in the heritage list of Rajuk. But it is listed among the 2,200 British era buildings that the High Court ordered to conserve," he said.
