A legal notice was served yesterday on the authorities concerned seeking Tk 10 crore as compensation for Md Jalal, who had been branded as Joj Miah in connection with the August 21 grenade attack, for violating his fundamental rights.

Supreme Court lawyers Humayun Kabir Pallob and Mohammad Kawsar sent the legal notice to 11 persons -- including former BNP state minister for home affairs Md Lutfozzaman Babar saying that he (Jalal) was wrongfully arrested and kept in custody for four years.

They requested the government to form an inquiry committee to fix the liabilities for violating the fundamental rights of Md Jalal, a man from Noakhali's Senbagh, who was wrongfully arrested on June 10, 2005.

Unauthorised, unprotected

Most level crossings in Brahmanbaria, Narail without gates or gatemen

Fifty-seven of the 79 level crossings on the 73km rail track in Brahmanbaria pose a serious risk of accidents as those are without any gatemen or arrangement for stopping the movement of vehicles and pedestrians during the passage of trains.

The situation is similar in Narail as 38 out of 46 crossings on the 41km rail track stand unprotected.

Besides, 24 more crossings in these two districts are unauthorised and established without the knowledge of the railway authorities.

Locals say these crossings are practically death traps, where accidents are frequent.

On June 4, four passengers of a pick-up van were killed after a train ran over them at Hasnabad Bazar railway crossing near Amirganj railway station in Narsingdi.

According to Railway Police, at least 11 eople have been killed in railway crossings at Brahmanbaria and Narail in recent years.

After visiting Brahmanbaria's Kachhait, Bhadeshwara, Machhihata, Paghachong and Chinair areas, this correspondent saw no gatemen at any of the crossings.

Seeking anonymity, a railway official said most of the roads with unprotected railway crossings are under the Local Government and Engineering Department (LGED).

But LGED does not take any initiative for the safety of these crossings, he claimed.

The Railway Act states that any organisations building roads over rail tracks need to take prior permission from Bangladesh Railway.

The institutions concerned will also have to bear the expenses of setting up gates and wages of at least three gatekeepers and the



the crossing is given from the nearest railway station after railway engineers inspect the

But the railway official said people in charge of building roads on both sides of a rail line often bypass the railway authorities to reduce bureaucratic delays and additional

According to Akhaura Railway Junction Station, only 22 of the 79 level crossings in the Dhaka-Chattagram and Sylhet routes are authorised by Bangladesh Railway.

Al-Aminul Haque Pavel, chairman of Machihata Union Parishad of Brahmanbaria Sadar, said the two rail crossings near Paghachong railway station are unauthorised and have no gatekeepers.

Although students of several schools.

crossing risking their lives, the authorities are yet to take any action, he added.

He also claimed that a written application sent to the railways ministry on the issue has fallen on the deaf ears of the concerned officials.

Stressing the importance of gatemen, shopkeeper Tajul Islam of Akhaura said, "There was a major accident at Gangasagar rail gate in 1997. Five people lost their lives in that accident. After that, gatekeepers were appointed here. Since then the number of accidents has reduced."

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'I want to return home, save me'

College girl, who fell victim to trafficking, pleads in video message from India

"I want to live. Save me. I'm facing inhumane torture, confined to a house in India's Siliguri. I want to return

A college girl was seen pleading in a 4-minute-28second video message that went viral on social media. She has been allegedly trafficked to India from Lalmonirhat's Hatibandha upazila of Lalmonirhat.

In the video, she is also seen saying how she was lured into a relationship and taken to Dhaka. "I got married there, but then I was trafficked to India," she was heard

The victim was an 11th grader in Madhya Gaddimari village. She lived with her brother.

The brother told this correspondent that his sister was lured and kidnapped on December 5 last year. After a month of being unable to trace her, he filed a case with Hatibandha police station accusing five on January 6.

The accused in the charge sheet are Tilak Chandra (20) of Hatibandha's Gendukuri village and Hamidul Islam Hriday (19) of Madhya Gaddimari village.

The police filed a charge sheet in the court accusing two of the five people on May 27.

Contacted, SI Sukumar Roy, IO of the case, told this correspondent that a charge sheet was filed against Tilak and Hamidul, while the names of the others were dropped as no evidence was found against them.

SAFE LEVEL CROSSINGS BR, LGED asked to give suggestions by September 30

As more and more people are losing their lives on unprotected level crossings, Bangladesh Railway and Local Government Engineering Department have been asked to complete an ongoing joint survey and submit a report by the end of next month.

The directive came from a meeting of the railways ministry arranged yesterday at Railway Bhaban, with Rail Secretary Humayun Kabir in the chair and in presence of BR and LGED representatives.

The two state agencies are conducting a survey to give recommendations for making level crossings safer. The survey, started a few months back, is now at the final stage, officials said.

They will state where underpasses or overpasses would have to be built, where level-crossing barriers need to be installed, and which unauthorised level crossings should be closed. On the basis of the report, LGED, which has

built the highest number of unauthorised level crossings, will take a project for implementing the recommendations, they said.

The development came when accidents at unprotected level crossings continue to claim lives, as over 80 percent of the crossings under the country's railway network remain either unauthorised or unmanned.

The issues came to the fore again after 11 people died as a train hit a microbus at a level crossing in Chattogram's Mirsharai upazila on July 29. Two more succumbed to injuries later. According to Road Safety Foundation, this year,

at least 74 people were killed in 35 rail-related accidents at level crossings until July 29. The number is much higher than that of the last two

Out of 1,412 authorised level crossings, 964 are unmanned, according to a document of BR shared at an inter-ministerial meeting last year.

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CHEMICALLY-TAINTED PINEAPPLES The farmers' perspective

Despite being delicious, pineapples grown in Tangail's Madhupur upazila have grabbed media headlines for all the wrong reasons in the last few years.

They have gotten a reputation of being tainted with chemicals, as farmers use excessive hormones to grow bigger fruits and ripe them ahead of time. The pineapple growers have been bashed for

indulging in such an immoral act for some extra cash, but their side of the story is rarely featured. But when this newspaper contacted some pineapple farmers, they claimed that they have no choice but to use chemicals, as wholesalers don't want to buy

naturally ripened fruits since they start rotting en route to the selling destination. However, chemically treated fruits stay fresh for a

few days, a must for vendors. "What can we do if wholesalers don't want to buy naturally ripened pineapples?" said Saiful Islam, a farmer from Madhupur's Beribaid.

When these fruits do ripe naturally, the timing is horrible since we can't find buyers then," he said. So, we ripen a specific amount of fruits by using

chemicals for getting marketers at the right price,' Farmer Shamsul Islam of Aushnara in Madhupur said he wouldn't use chemicals if he got the right price

for naturally ripened fruits. "We incur losses due to lack of proper marketing facilities. The middlemen eat up the profit. The

Due to this reason, farmers have been demanding food processing industries to facilitate storage and transportation.

CONTEMPT OF COURT HC summons Kushtia DC, SP, Brac Bank's MD

The High Court yesterday summoned Commissioner Deputy Mohamamd Saidul Islam and Superintendent of Police Md Khairul Alam, Brac Bank Limited's Managing Director Selim RF Hussain and two others, directing them to appear before it on August 21 for selling properties worth Tk 123 crore at a price of Tk 15 core through an auction violating a stay order.

The two are Abdur Rashid, a businessman who has purchased the properties, and OC Md Sabirul Alam of Kushtia Sadar Police Station.

The bench of Justice Abu Taher Md Saifur Rahman and Justice AKM Rabiul Hassan issued the order and a rule following a petition filed by Shafiqul Islam, proprietor of Biswas Traders, VIP Rice Mill and

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
