After the wondrous recitations, “Katobar Bhebechhinu Apona Bhuliya” swayed the audience.

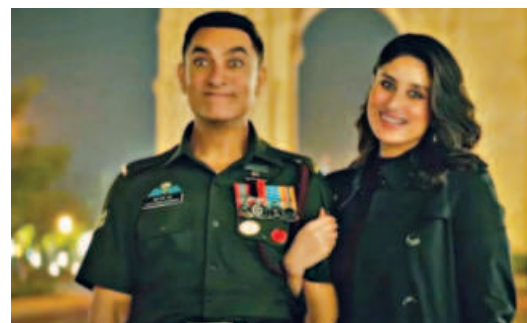
The song was inspired by “Drink to Me Only with Thine Eyes”, composed by acclaimed playwright Ben Jonson.

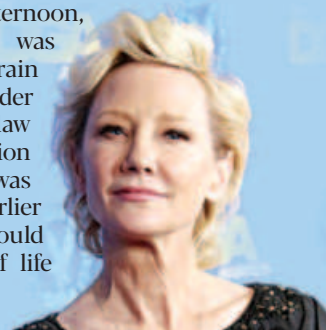
Actress Anne Heche dies a week after car crash

“Donnie Brasco”, “Catfight” and “Psycho” star Anne Heche passed away a week after she was critically injured in a car crash on August 5.

The news was confirmed by a representative of her family to TMZ. “We have lost a bright light, a kind and most joyful soul, a loving mother, and a loyal friend” they said.

On Friday afternoon, Heche was confirmed “brain dead”, which under California law is the definition of death. It was announced earlier that she would be taken off of life support.

Bridge lies without repair for 7 years

Residents of 12 villages under four upazilas of Nature and Naogaon are suffering immensely as the bridge over Panaullah Canal in Nature's Singra upazila remained unrepaired since it collapsed about seven years ago.

As a result, thousands of inhabitants of different villages in Nature's Singra, Naldanga and Sadar upazilas and Naogaon's Atrai upazila are compelled to use a bamboo platform, attached with this broken bridge in Bakhtarpur area, risking their lives.

Locals said the bridge started to tilt about five years ago, and later a large portion of it collapsed on the canal during the floods in 2018.

A JSC examinee died while crossing the broken bridge in 2018, and the number of injury-hit people is increasing day by day, they said,

adding that though accidents are occurred quite regularly, the authorities concerned remains indifferent to the safety of the villages.

However, commuters are using the bridge, risking their lives, as there is no other alternative.

Shahidul Islam of Gopendranagar village in Singra upazila said the bridge over Panaullah Canal under Lalor union is an important way of communication for people of at least 12 villages.

Instead of building new bridge, local administration built a temporary bamboo bridge beside the collapsed bridge, but that too collapsed in 2018, he added.

Sanjay Halder of Bakhtarpur village said after the temporary bridge collapsed about four years ago, local people put a bamboo platform there to make it usable temporarily.

Around 50 pedestrians and rickshaw passengers sustained injuries when their vehicles overturned on the bridge, he added.

Singra Upazila Parishad Chairman Shafiqul Islam said farmers in Chalanbil area are facing huge difficulties when they use the bridge to transport their agricultural goods to nearby markets or other places.

Natore Local Government Engineering Department (LGED) Executive Engineer Shahidul Islam said they sent a Tk 2.5 crore project proposal to their higher authorities in this regard, but later came to know that local public representatives have urged the disaster management and relief ministry to build a new bridge.

Singra Upazila Project Implementation Officer (PIO) Mohammad Al-Amin said a they have floated a tender of Tk 90 lakh for construction of a new bridge.

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emergency surgery and was placed on a ventilator after Friday's assault in which a 24-year-old man, Hadi Matar, rushed the stage where Rushdie was about to deliver a lecture and stabbed him in the neck and abdomen.

According to his agent Andrew Wylie, the nerves in one of Rushdie's arms were severed and his liver damaged in the attack, and he “will likely lose one eye.”

State police said Matar, from Fairfax, New Jersey, had been formally charged with attempted murder, but otherwise provided no information on his background or what might have motivated him.

His family apparently came from a border village called Yaroun in southern Lebanon. An AFP reporter who visited the village yesterday was told that that Matar's parents were divorced and his father — a shepherd — still lived there. Journalists who approached his father's home were turned away.

Matar was “born and raised in the US,” the head of the local municipality, Ali Qassem Tahfa, told AFP.

Rushdie, 75, had been living under an effective death sentence since 1989 when Iran's then supreme leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini issued a religious decree, or fatwa, ordering Muslims to kill the writer.

She will also be visiting the Rohingya camps in Cox's Bazar.

There has also been reports of inadequate engagement between Bangladesh and the UN rights mechanism over the years.

A dedicated office under the UN wing of the foreign ministry was created earlier this year to oversee human rights issues.

The foreign ministry in yesterday's statement said Bangladesh looks forward to a constructive dialogue with the high commissioner for the promotion and protection of human rights.

Bangladesh hopes to benefit from her objective appreciation regarding

the country's achievements despite challenges, it said.

This visit is considered important in order to highlight Bangladesh's national perspective and the “government's sincere efforts” to protect and promote human rights through updating the domestic legal framework, creating awareness and sensitising the implementing agencies.

It is important that the country's economic development amid the pandemic and other evolving crises, its maintenance of peace and security of the people, and constraints like the Rohingya crisis and the adverse effects of climate change, are taken into due consideration when assessing the human rights situation, the statement said.

The ministry further claimed that despite the ongoing pandemic, no one in the country has died of starvation.

“Bangladesh, a country of 165 million, was able to provide almost a million homes to the homeless, and over 10 million families are receiving basic food and essential supplies under its social security protection programme.”

It further said Bangladesh is promoting basic human rights like rights to food, accommodation, development and more.
