5 JMB men to walk gallows

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The JMB attackers detonated bombs at the mosque inside the naval base during Juma prayers on December 18, 2015. The incident left 24 defence personnel and civilians injured. Ten of them were hospitalised.

After nine months of the incident, Chattogram Naval Provost Marshal Commander M Abu Sayed filed the case accusing four JMB men.

According to the case statement, Chattogram JMB’s chief commander

Raisul Islam Khan Noman alias Nafis alias Fardin led the attack. During investigation, police found involvement of arrested Abdul Mannan’s brother, JMB operative Abdul Gaffar.

Fardin died in an explosion in Sherpur of Bogura on April 3, 2016 while making hand grenades.

After a long probe, Osman Goni, the investigation officer and inspector (investigation) of EPZ Police Station, pressed charges against the five JMB men on October 25, 2017.

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teacher in this country should face such harassment. If such incidents do not stop, the future of the country is bleak. This felt like a five-month long storm for me. I was unable to even do home tutoring and the financial distress was piling up. I feel much better after the verdict.”

Hridoy, however, said he had been facing threats from unknown quarters since his bail and a GD was lodged with the police station in this regard.

“I don’t get out of my house unless it is absolutely urgent.”

Shahin Mohammad Amanullah, a lawyer for Hridoy, said the final report in the case said the allegations against the teacher were false.

Plaintiff Asad Mia, who was present in the court during the verdict, said, “The judge asked me whether I have any further complaints. I said I did not. I too am happy that ‘sir’ has been discharged from the case.”

On March 20, when Hridoy was taking a science class, a conversation began between him and his students about science and religion.

Some students later gave a written complaint to the headmaster saying the teacher had “hurt religious sentiments” and on March 22, they began a protest against him at school.

When police came to control the situation, they arrested Hridoy from the spot. The case was filed against him later in the day.

Tunisia journo jailed for comments on president, army

A Tunisian military court sentenced journalist Salah Attia to three months in prison yesterday for public remarks he made about President Kais Saied and the armed forces, his lawyer said.

Attia is the latest in a string of critics and perceived enemies of the president to face prosecution since Saied claimed sweeping emergency powers in July last year.

The military court found him guilty Tuesday of “undermining the armed forces” and “inciting Tunisians to violence”, defence counsel Samir Ben Amor told AFP, adding that he intended to lodge an appeal.

Attia was detained in June after telling Qatar-based international

news channel Al Jazeera that Saied had formally requested the military to intervene against Tunisia’s UGTT trade union confederation ahead of a planned general strike. He said the army had then informed the UGTT of its refusal of the president’s request.

Human rights group Amnesty International condemned Attia’s prosecution for his work as a journalist as a “travesty of justice”.

“Tunisian authorities are perfectly free to dispute and counter what media report about them without arresting and prosecuting journalists,” said Amnesty’s deputy regional director for the Middle East and North Africa, Amna Guellali.

“In any case, no civilian should face trial before Tunisia’s military courts.”

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In a new paper published in the journal Nature Astronomy, scientists said the Ryugu samples could give clues to the mystery of how oceans appeared on Earth billions of years ago.

“Volatile and organic-rich C-type asteroids may have been one of the main sources of Earth’s water,” said the study by scientists from Japan and other countries, published Monday.

“On the way to K2 summit, bodies are treated as landmarks. You will see many of them without heads, legs protruding, and bodies with eyes still wide open as if they are still alive. Among them are some celebrated mountaineers. The mind may dive into negative thinking after seeing such things,” Wasfia said at a hotel in the city.

“It is easy to lose senses at that level of altitude. It is then you need the mental strength to fight off the negative thinking,” the celebrated

Wasfia knew that women climbers die more than their male counterparts on their way down as it is the hardest part.

“I had initiated the seven summits when Bangladesh had turned 40, and I wanted to attempt K2 to mark the golden jubilee of Bangladesh. For this one mountain, I have trained, prepared, and organised for almost 10 years. I owe my success to my team which consists of some of the strongest mountaineers on the planet,” she added.

She said very few mountaineers have made it to the top of K2 in one go. Year after year many world-renowned mountaineers return and still fail to summit.

Almost pyramid-like steepness and unpredictable weather conditions have allowed only some 400 climbers to set foot at its peak, many of whom did not survive the descent.

Wasfia scaled K2 on July 22 along with her team.

Give info on salary, perks of Wasa MD

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should not be declared illegal.

In the rule, the HC also wanted to know why the respondents should not be directed to take steps to remove Taqsem from his position and to recover the excess salary paid to him illegally in the last 13 years. It also asked why they should not be directed to fix the salary and other service benefits of the holder of this post in line with the provisions of the Service Order (Salary and Benefits), 2015 and the finance ministry notification.

Secretary at the ministry of local government and rural development, board of Dhaka Wasa and its chairman, and Taqsem A Khan have been made respondents to the rule.

The HC bench of Justice Md Moziur Rahman Miah and Justice Kazi Md Ejazul Haque Akondo passed the order and issued the

rule following a writ petition filed by Mubassher Hossain, chairman of Consumers’ Association of Bangladesh (CAB), on July 31 seeking necessary directive and rule on the issue.

Appearing for the writ petitioner, lawyer Jyotirmoy Barua told the HC that Wasa as a statutory authority cannot treat its officers and employees differently from other public servants, but Taqsem had been given undue benefits in violation of relevant laws and rules, even though he has failed to discharge his duties.

Around 70 percent of Dhaka city could not be brought under proper sewerage system because of Taqsem’s failure, he said.

Jyotirmoy said the Ministry of Finance on January 26, 2016, issued a notification regarding fixing salary and other benefits of contracted employees in line with the National

Pay Scale, 2015. However, authorities violated the notification’s provisions while fixing the salary and other benefits of the Wasa MD.

Taqsem was made Dhaka Wasa MD in 2009. Despite severe criticism of his role in ensuring quality Wasa services, he was reappointed for a sixth term on October 1, 2020.

Opposing the writ petition, Deputy Attorney General Arobinda Kumar Roy told the court that a commercial contract has been made for the appointment of Wasa MD and his enhanced salaries have already been paid, so the writ petition challenging the legality of the issues is not acceptable.

Speaking to The Daily Star, Jyotirmoy said maximum basic monthly salary of an official of Taqsem’s rank is Tk 78,000 under the service order and finance ministry notification.
