Iranian filmmaker Morteza Atashzanzam will file a complaint against Ananta Jalil for breaching contract for "Din: The Day".

The director announced the news on his Instagram post.

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Rights Commission to be effective, instead of keeping it as a mere bureaucratic organisation.

"The serious allegations demand full investigation. People have the right to know the truth even if it is a matter of unease for the government," he said.

During her visit, Bachelet recognised the country's remarkable socio-economic progress, and advancements in gender equality and education.

The Chilean official however stressed on bolstering the independence of institutions like the National Human Rights Commission, Election Commission, and the judiciary, and training of law enforcers to improve governance and inclusivity.

On the Rohingya issue, Bachelet said conditions in Myanmar are not yet right for their repatriation. Mizanur said that could give a wrong signal to the Myanmar junta and she should have instead made a strong call for Myanmar to guarantee Rohingya rights and take them back.

He said the UN human rights chief's call for widening civil society space and media freedom was absolutely correct as the Digital Security Act has caused an atmosphere of self-censorship.

Eminent jurist Shahdeen Malik said it seemed that the government does not believe that the citizens of the country have the ability to see and learn of unlawful things, and thinks that the international community is also blind and devoid of any understanding of what is happening

in the world.

He said Bachelet was president of Chile, where some of the most horrendous human rights violations were committed and many of the perpetrators were brought to justice. "We hope our government will pay heed to Bachelet's suggestions."

He said the perpetrators of human rights abuses may think they are above the law, but every country, sooner or later, must bring such perpetrators to book.

Perpetrators of heinous crimes in many South American countries in the last quarter of the last century are being tried, he said, urging the government to initiate legal processes as recommended by Bachelet.

"If the government fails to do so, I am sure subsequent governments in 10, 20 or 30 years will certainly do it."

## BB asks MDs

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"We have asked them to identify the officials responsible for this. On top of that, the banks have to state the motive behind gaining of the excessive profits," he said.

In the last couple of months, a good number of banks made profits through unethical means as they purchased dollars at a lower rate from exporters and sold those at a much higher rate to importers, another BB official said.

Until August 14, importers had to purchase each dollar for up to Tk 120 while the exporters sold each dollar for as low as Tk 93. Thanks to the large gap between the buying and selling prices, the banks between January and June made up to seven times the profit they made during the same period last year, according to the data from the balance sheet of 11 banks.

On Wednesday, banks offered a greenback for Tk 105 to Tk 106 to importers.

Banks in the country have to sell and buy dollars based on the inter-bank exchange rate set by the central bank. The USD traded at Tk 95 on the platform on Wednesday.

As per the banking norms, lenders are allowed to offer Tk 1 less from the interbank rate while buying dollars from exporters. They can sell greenbacks, adding Tk 1 to the inter-bank rate. Banks have been following this norm for years until April, when instability in the forex market deepened.

BB on August 14 asked banks to follow a rational difference, not more than Tk 1, between the buying and selling rates.

The country's foreign exchange market has been facing challenges since the end of the last year because of the pandemic and the war between Russia and Ukraine.

Higher imports, lower-than-expected export receipts and falling remittance have sent the reserves below \$40 billion.

## BNP seeks probe under UN

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around 600 political leaders and activists, civil society members and labour leaders were made victims of enforced disappearance in the country.

Asked about some Awami League leaders' comments that most of the BNP's statements on enforced disappearance were political, Fakhrul said, "This is natural that they will not admit it."

Referring to AL General Secretary Obaidul Quader's statement that the UN has no jurisdiction in any internal issue of Bangladesh, the BNP leader said, "It seems that such incidents took place in the country... Netra News report has proved that the entire state is involved in this crime."

Fakhrul said that there is no atmosphere for holding talks in the country and it would not happen

until BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia is "released" and cases filed against her are withdrawn.

He also said a dialogue with the ruling AL will not be possible until the incumbent government steps down and dissolves parliament.

UN Human Rights Commissioner Bachelet on Wednesday expressed concern over the allegations of enforced disappearances, extrajudicial killings and torture in Bangladesh.

Speaking at a press conference at a city hotel, she recommended an impartial, independent and transparent investigation into these allegations, expressing her office's readiness to provide advice on how such a mechanism could be designed in line with international standards.

Bachelet left Dhaka early yesterday wrapping up her four-day visit to Bangladesh.

## 3 BCL men arrested

"The girl's family used to shelter some Chhatra Shibir men. Some of us beat him up while alerting him about it," he said.

He went into hiding after the case was filed.
