### TERROR CHARGES Ex-Pak PM Imran granted bail by court

Former Pakistan prime minister Imran Khan yesterday accused the government of trying to score a



"technical knockout"

against him, after being granted bail on charges brought under the country's anti-terrorism act.

Khan's court appearance is the latest twist in months of political wrangling that began when he was ousted by a vote of no confidence in the national assembly in April.

The former cricket star retains widespread support, however, staging mass rallies railing against Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif's government and scoring successes in recent provincial assembly byelections.

# SUGAR PRICE HIKE JS body slams two ministers

A parliamentary watchdog yesterday came down heavily on Industries Minister Nurul Majid Mahmud Humayun for the price spiral of sugar despite ample supply of the commodity.

In the last month, sugar imports increased 32 percent while the price of the commodity has held steady in the international markets. And yet, the price of sugar has increased in both the wholesale and retail markets.

For instance, yesterday, sugar was selling at Tk 90-93 a kilogram at the retail level, up from Tk 83-85 last month.

At the wholesale markets, the sweetener is selling at Tk 3,050 to Tk 3,080 a maund (37.32 kg). A month earlier, the price ranged from Tk 2,800

Bangladesh Railway yesterday signed two separate contracts with consultants for two expansion projects, just four months before the project deadlines end.

As per the contracts, a joint-venture of companies will carry out the feasibility studies, detail designs, and prepare tender documents within 11 months.

It means the projects' preparation work will end six months after the original deadlines in December this year.

The consultants would then provide construction supervision services for four years, including a one-year defect liability period, indicating that the deadlines will be extended for over four years.

Mazumder said it was not possible to give details and exact reasons behind the delay but long procedures to get approval from the Indian side was one.

"We are sorry for the delay but the main thing is the contracts have been signed, meaning the physical work of the projects will start now," he told The Daily Star last night.

Meanwhile, project authorities have already placed two proposals for extending the deadlines for one year. The proposals are now pending with the planning Commission, BR sources said.

## BFIU asks banks to give info on Wasa MD's accounts

The Bangladesh Financial Intelligence Unit (BFIU) has asked banks to provide account information of Dhaka Wasa Managing Director Taqsem A Khan by August 29.



The BFIU, designated

for combating money laundering and militancy financing, wrote to the banks on August 24. The BFIU would examine whether the MD had laundered money, said an official of the intelligence unit.

On August 17, the High Court sought information on his salary, bonus, and other benefits over 13 years when Taqsem was the managing director of the state-run water supplier in Dhaka.

The court had asked the chairman of the Dhaka Wasa to submit the information before the court within 60 days.

The HC came up with the directives after hearing a writ petition.

Taqsem was made Dhaka Wasa MD in 2009.

Despite severe criticism of his role in ensuring quality Wasa services, he was reappointed for a sixth term on October 1, 2020.

### Teenager becomes youngest person to fly solo around world

A 17-year-old has become the youngest person to fly around the world solo in a small aircraft on Wednesday after first taking off on March 23, according to Guinness World Records (GWR).

British-Belgian national Mack Rutherford touched down earlier in the day in the Bulgarian capital of Sofia, where his journey began, according to Rutherford's official website and GWR. He first set off when he was still 16.

Rutherford's route spanned 52 countries across five

continents across live continents on a specially prepared ultralight Shark aircraft with cruising speed reaching 300 km/h, according to his website. "I want to use

However, sugar importers blamed the price hike on the depreciation of the taka, which has increased the import costs by 20-23 percent.

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The development in the two projects -- conversion of meter gauge line to dual gauge from Parbatipur to Kaunia and the construction of a double line from Khulna to Darshana -- came at a time when most of BR's 36 ongoing projects are behind schedule.

The two projects worth Tk 5,187 crore were taken up in early 2018 to boost internal and inter-country rail communications. They were to be implemented with Indian lines of credit (LoC).

The BR is currently implementing seven projects with Indian LoCs and grants and all of them are behind schedule.

BR Director General Dhirendra Nath

sought to complete feasibility studies and detailed designs. The costs of both projects will then be revised as they are likely to go up due to the delay in starting physical works. Deadlines will also have to be extended," a top BR official, wishing anonymity, told this correspondent.

The government in May 2018 approved one of the projects to build a parallel line along the Khulna-Darshana line at a cost of Tk 3,506.75 crore. India will provide 77 percent of the cost as a loan.

The project aims to increase transportability via Dhaka-Khulna and Khulna-Chilahati. The existing Khulna-Darshana section of the Dhaka-Khulna line is a single broad-gauge line.

He entered his last leg through the United States, Canada and Mexico before flying back through Europe and landing in Sofia.

# TEA WORKERS' STRIKE Owners of tea estates to meet PM tomorrow

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina has invited all tea estate owners to the Gono Bhaban for a meeting tomorrow.

She would discuss the ongoing crisis over the strike of tea plantation workers, confirmed sources at the Prime Minister's Office yesterday.

Meanwhile, tea-estate workers continued to protest for the 13th consecutive day yesterday demanding a pay hike. Hundreds of workers protested in Moulvibazar, Sylhet,

and Habiganj.

A meeting, scheduled between the labour and employment minister and the agitating workers yesterday was cancelled as the prime minister was dealing with the matter directly, said Mohammad Nahidul Islam, deputy director of the Divisional Labour Office in Moulvibazar's Sreemangal.

Yesterday, multiple groups of workers blocked roads for hours, staged demonstrations and formed human chains in Moulvibazar, Sylhet, and Habiganj.

Several hundreds of them blocked the Dhaka-Sylhet highway in Moulvibazar's Varirpar area for about three hours from around 1:00pm.

At the same time, another group staged demonstrations at Moulvibazar's Rajnagor upazila halting vehicular movement on Dhaka-Bianibazar and Moulvibazar-Sylhet highways.

## Bangladesh's credit rating unchanged

Standard & Poor expects external pressure to ease in a year

Global rating agency Standard & Poor yesterday maintained its long-held credit score for Bangladesh despite the ongoing hiccups in the economy, in a development that will ward off fears of any financial crisis similar to South Asian neighbours.

S&P maintained its "BB-" longterm and "B" short-term sovereign credit ratings on Bangladesh.

In general, a credit rating is used by sovereign wealth funds, pension funds and other investors to gauge the credit worthiness of Bangladesh, meaning it has a big impact on the country's borrowing costs.

Bangladesh's short-term credit rating of "B" means a country is more vulnerable to adverse business, financial and economic conditions but currently has the capacity to meet financial commitments.

The long-term credit rating of BBmeans the economy is less vulnerable
