3 'Bangladeshi agents' of betting site arrested

They laundered Tk 4cr in last few months, says CID

Criminal Investigation Department (CID) of police claimed to have arrested three Bangladeshi agents of online-gambling site BetWinner, who allegedly laundered crores abroad.

According to CID, they laundered the money by converting it into dollars through a cryptocurrency exchange platform.

BetWinner is an online-betting site owned and managed by Cyprus-based Marikit Holdings Ltd. It is being operated from Russia, said CID.

The arrestees are Abu Bakr Siddique (30), Abdullah Al Awal, and Toraf Hossain (37). They were arrested from Cumilla's Chauddagram upazila on Wednesday night.

Authorities said Bangladesh has become a popular hub for online betting in recent days. But such sites are illegal in the country.

"People living in rural areas of the country use the site for betting. In the last four months, the gang has laundered Tk 4 crore out of the country," CID Special Superintendent of Police Rezaul Masud told a press briefing at the capital's CID headquarters yesterday.

"BetWinner came to notice during regular monitoring of CID's Cyber Police Centre. Three Bangladeshi agents involved with the site were identified and arrested," he

During the arrest, six mobile phones, several SIM cards and a laptop were seized.

Probe body formed over fire at DNCC building

A nine-member probe committee was formed to identify the reasons behind the fire, which originated at the seventh floor of the 22-storey building which houses the office of DNCC mayor at Gulshan-2 yesterday morning.

The committee headed by DNCC chief estate officer Dr. Mohammad Mahay Alam will also determine the estimate of damage and will provide recommendations about the next course of action.

The committee is asked to submit their report by three working days.

The fire originated around 7:08am on the seventh floor, said Rafi Al Faruk, duty officer of fire

Four firefighting units doused the blaze after two hours' effort. The cause of the fire could not be known immediately, he said.

'Please find alternative to arable land' **Eminent citizens** urge PM in open letter regarding **Mongla Port** project

Thirteen eminent citizens yesterday in an "open letter" to Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina sought her intervention to save about 300 acres of arable land in Banishanta union of Khulna's Dakope upazila from the clutches of a project by Mongla Port authority. As part of the "Inner Bar Dredging of Mongla Port Channel" project, the government took a decision to use about 1,000 acres of land, including 300 acres of arable land, for a landfill with dredged out earth from Pashur river, despite protests from land owners and farmers who depend on the land for their livelihoods.

In 2011 and 2021-2022, arable lands were filled with dredged-out earth in Chila union of Mongla, where no crops have been grown since, they said in the letter.

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Cultivation of Boro doesn't deplete groundwater

Boro cultivation does not deplete groundwater as it requires only 661 litres of water, according to a study.

The study also said groundwater of only three districts -- Rajshahi, Naogaon and Nawabganj were depleted despite a nearly 50 percent reduction of Boro rice cultivation in the last 10 years.

Researchers revealed the analysis at a programme, "Sustaining titled Groundwater Irrigation for Food Security in the Northwest Region Bangladesh", organised Institute of Water Modelling, in collaboration Bangladesh Agricultural University and Commonwealth Scientific Industrial Research

Independent judiciary a pipe dream if judges don't feel free Says retiring judge Krishna Debnath

Justice Krishna Debnath, a judge of the Supreme Court's Appellate Division, yesterday said independence of the judiciary is a pipe dream, unless a judge herself does not feel independent.

"During my 41-year judgeship career, I realised that although independence of the judiciary has been implemented on paper, in reality it is a pipe dream if a judge does not feel free," she said.

She made the comment while receiving a farewell from the attorney general's office and Supreme Court Bar Association at Court-1 of the Appellate Division, on the last working day before her retirement.

Chief Justice Hasan Foez Siddique as well as Appellate Division's Justice Obaidul Hassan, Justice Borhanuddin and Justice M Enayetur Rahim were present in the courtroom, where SC lawyers, law officers and journalists attended.

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
