

'Rajuk lacks resources to implement DAP'

Speakers tell BIP event

The new Detailed Area Plan (DAP) has put forth important proposals to build a better Dhaka city, but authorities will face huge difficulties to implement them due to its lack of capacity, said leaders of Bangladesh Institute of Planners (BIP) yesterday.

"Rajuk does not have the organisational capacity to implement the DAP. So, strengthening its capacity and coordinating with other organisations is a must for proper implementation," said BIP President Fazle Reza Sumon at a press conference at the organisation's conference hall.

Sumon, who chaired the programme, said the government had taken different plans before, like Strategic Transport Plan, Revised STP, and DAP-2010, but none of them have been implemented properly.

Ignoring the plans, different ministries carried out development works. Dhaka's present situation is the result of not implementing the plans, Sumon said.

BIP demanded the government take immediate steps to implement the DAP properly and update plans every five years.

Different government agencies will have to refer to DAP properly when forming their own plans, said Sumon.

It is essential to make it obligatory for every government agency to take NOC (no objection certificate) from Rajuk before planning and implementation, he said.

Shahidul Alam shares his ordeal at Gyantapas lecture

"I cannot use a phone for my safety, or ride my bicycle, which I have ridden for 50 years," said photojournalist Shahidul Alam at a lecture session in the capital yesterday.

"I cannot go alone anywhere anymore. I have come here today with a companion," said Alam, while speaking at Bengal Shilpalay.

The lecture session was organised by Gyantapas Abdur Razzaq Foundation.

Alam said he has been under pressure from the authorities and as a result has had to take these measures.

"Last year, when we held a press photo contest and the winning photo was on the theme of enforced disappearance, we received many calls from the law enforcement," he said.

He also spoke about how this has hampered his mobility and his photography to some extent.

"After I was picked up, all of our corporate clients left us, and a client told me that it is not safe for him to take my call," said Alam.

He said law enforcers have not submitted any charge-sheet against him even though four years have gone by following the filing of the case.

Development organisations in Bangladesh need to come up with newer ideas and solutions to fight future challenges, like impacts of the climate crisis, said speakers yesterday, while celebrating Manusher Jonno Foundation's (MJF) 20-year journey.

They said these organisations play a complementary role to the government by implementing various activities, while upholding social harmony, equality and basic rights. They stressed that continuous government support in this regard is crucial.

MJF organised the celebration programme at the auditorium of the capital's Liberation War Museum, where alongside eminent people, members of its many partner organisations spoke about achievements and future targets.

Starting its journey in 2002, MJF has so far reached about 30 lakh poor and underprivileged people across the country by creating a network of over 400 partner organisations in 330 upazilas of 52 districts.

Of the various other achievements, MJF has assisted four lakh people come out of

poverty, 6.5 lakh women be economically empowered, and stopped about 50,000 child marriages.

Speaking at the programme, Hossain Zillur Rahman, executive chairperson of Power and Participation Research Centre, said it is important to keep finding the people who have been left behind.

He said whether the environment in which MJF and many other organisations in Bangladesh are operating is easy or difficult is contextual, but what is crucial is the commitment and will to continue the journey.

"Human rights are non-negotiable; women's empowerment is non-negotiable; inclusivity is non-negotiable," he said, adding that these are not going to be achieved overnight.

Brac Executive Director Asif Saleh said NGOs play a vital role in long-term development, working with the government.

He said climate-change adaptation is essential for the people of Bangladesh, and NGOs will need to play a big role in this regard.
