Dengue claims 5 more lives

least five dengue patients died while 284 patients were admitted different hospitals across the country in the last 24 hours till 8:00am yesterday. With the 284 new patients, the total number of dengue cases this year rose to 7,397. A total of 850 dengue patients are still undergoing treatment.

With the new death cases, which is the highest in a single day this year, the total number of dengue deaths rose to 31.

Among the deaths, 15 were at Cox's Bazar, two at Barishal, one at Chattogram and 13 in Dhaka, according to the Directorate General of Health Services.

Meanwhile, a total of 6,516 patients have been released from hospitals, so far this year. Of them, 1,192 are from outside Dhaka.

Cricketer Al-Amin gets anticipatory bail from HC

The HC also asked the pace bowler to surrender before the Nari O Shishu Nirjaton Daman Tribunal-8 of Dhaka in eight weeks.

The bench of Justice Md Rezaul Hassan and Justice Md Atabullah passed the order following a bail petition by Al Amin.

Ishrat Jahan, wife of Al-Amin, filed the complaint with Mirpur Police Station

on September 1. She alleged that he (Al-Amin) tortured and abused her for dowry of Tk

20 lakh. Besides, Al-Amin has forced her to leave the house with her children,

she also alleged in the case. Al-Amin's lawyer M Ashraful Islam said the HC granted bail to his client on the ground that the allegations brought against him are false.

FAKE CERTIFICATES Sabrina challenges lower court verdict

Sabrina Sharmin Hossain, chairperson of JKG Health Care, yesterday challenged the judgment of the lower court that sentenced her to 11 years' rigorous imprisonment in a case filed over issuing fake Covid-19 certificates.

The JKG's chairperson filed the appeal with the Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court of Dhaka, Additional Public Prosecutor Tapash Kumar Pal told The Daily Star.

Sabrina also filed a petition, seeking bail in the case on grounds that she has been in jail since July 12, 2020.

Emergency care can save many lives Health experts stress the need for essential

critical care for critically-ill patients

If essential critical care can be ensured in all hospitals, the lives of many critically-ill patients would be saved, said speakers at a seminar yesterday.

No country is capable of arranging critical care for all patients, but proper management and customisation of existing resources, and training frontline healthcare workers can ensure a robust system, they said at the event at Institute of Health Economics at Dhaka University.

Essential Emergency and Critical Care (EECC) refers to effective and basic care to identify and treat critically-ill patients.

"Providing essential critical care with limited resources is very much possible, and it should be provided in all hospitals across the country," said Prof MA Faiz, former director general of Directorate General of the Health Services (DGHS), while presenting a keynote at the event.

At the beginning of his presentation, he shared the story of a critically-ill malaria patient who was taken to a 250-bed district hospital. With multiple organ failures, including a non-functioning kidney, the doctor had to refer them to another hospital with dialysis facility.

Unfortunately, the patient died around half an hour after starting dialysis. It was too late. Prof Faiz noted that 1,21,090 patients died in 564

hospitals across the country in 2018, according to Health Bulletin 2019, published by DGHS.

Many of them could have been saved if they were given critical care timely, he said.

By examining some basic parameters -- like heart rate, respiratory rate, blood pressure, consciousness, body temperature, and oxygen saturation -- any doctor can provide necessary primary treatment to a critical patient, he explained.

He highlighted four obstacles to providing such care: lack of skilled personnels; limited access to equipment, supplies, and medicines; inadequate

infrastructure; and inequality among government and private hospitals. To ensure essential critical care for all patients,

introduction of the "triage system" can help. The system is used to determine which groups of

patients should receive treatment and care based on their clinical status, prognosis of diseases, and available resources.

Speaking at the event, Prof Ahmedul Kabir, ditional director general (administration) of DGHS, informed that DGHS has been working to introduce essential critical care in two hospitals. The system will be functional in the next 15 to 20

"We have no time to sit idle. We have to start now," Prof Kabir said, adding that patients will receive all services while staying in bed.

While speaking, Prof Robed Amin, line director of the non-communicable disease control unit at DGHS, highlighted the health-education gap among people in the country.

Dr Md Enamul Haque, director general of health economics unit at the health ministry, also stressed on promoting health education.

Dr Hossain Zillur Rahman, executive chairperson of Power and Participation Research Centre, stressed on cost-effectiveness, as well as skill and capacity

OMS rice sale to continue Food minister says they will

carry on programme until market becomes stable

The government will continue the Open Market Sale (OMS) programme as long as it needs to keep the rice market stable, said Food Minister Shadhan Chandra Majumder during a press conference at the secretariat yesterday.

Alongside the OMS programme, the ministry will continue to import rice to tackle a probable Aman production shortfall due to drought, he said.

Shadhan also mentioned they have completed internal procurement of Boro rice and procured more than their

"Our target was 11 lakh tonnes of parboiled rice and 50,000 tonnes of sunned rice. We've already procured 11,21,910 tonnes of parboiled rice and 55,208 tonnes of sunned rice."

Mentioning that the government has decreased the tax rate, he said they have extended the deadline for rice import to December 30 from October 30. We've already issued a gazette notification so that

businesspersons can apply and open LCs by September 30 for importing rice," he said. Under the OMS and FFP programme, one crore

beneficiaries will get rice at Tk 30 a kg under OMS and 50 lakh special cardholders at Tk 15 per kg under FFP.

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'Mariam is waiting for her in heaven'

Says husband of Keraniganj fire victim who succumbed to injuries

Twenty-six-year-old Sonia Akter was yearning to see her four-year-old daughter, who succumbed to burn injuries a week ago, just a few hours before she died in the early hours of yesterday. With 23 percent burn injuries on her face, forehead and

trachea, Sonia breathed her last around 3:30am at Sheikh Hasina National Institute of Burn and Plastic Surgery. Six members of Sonia's family, including her beloved daughter Mariam Akter, were burnt in an explosion,

which was supposedly caused by a gas leak, in Dhaka's Keraniganj on the morning of August 30. The victims were rushed to the hospital that day, where Mariam breathed her last around 1:30pm with

60 percent burns on her body. Sonia's family, however, did not inform her about her daughter's demise, fearing she would not able to handle the shock, which would further worsen her

"After undergoing her surgery, Sonia was put on life support on Monday night. When our eight-year-old son Imran and I met her for the last time, she was still asking about Mariam," said Osman Gani, Sonia's husband. "Now they will finally meet in heaven. Mariam is

waiting for her...," he could not finish the sentence. Sonia's body was taken home without an autopsy.

She was buried after Asr prayers, said Osman's cousin Amin Miah. Five of the injured, including Sonia's mother Begum
