"The queen sat in a jackfruit orchard and talked to the women of our village. We presented her with a key made of silver which symbolised that the door of the village would always be open for the queen," said Saleha Akhter,

The woman of Bairagir Chala village in Sreepur upazila told reporters that the villagers old enough to remember the queen's visit mourned for her yesterday.

The queen visited the village on November 16, 1983, during her four-day visit to Bangladesh. After hearing about the queen's demise, many villagers yesterday reminisced about how her visit changed the village forever.

The then military government of Bangladesh arranged the visit to show the queen an example of a "self-reliant" village of Bangladesh, Saleha said.

Shakhwat Hossain, who is aged around 60, said, "They brought electricity and built a concrete road at the village before her visit," he said. "They built a building at the Sreepur Railway Station. Other buildings were constructed for the hospital and the upazila parishad office.

"Our village was filled with resources at the time. The farmers had cattle. Our ponds were filled with fish and we had large amounts of crops and vegetables. The queen saw these things."

Former adviser to a caretaker governmentAkbar Ali Khan devoted his life to the welfare of the people and his death is an irreparable loss to the nation, said his colleagues, civil society members and noted politicians before bidding farewell to the economist and writer.

Amid love and grief, colleagues, relatives and eminent citizens vesterday paid tribute to Akbar as he was laid to rest at Mirpur Intellectuals' Martyred Graveyard around 3:30pm after his namaz-e-janaza in the capital's Gulshan.

Before his burial, he was given a state honour the Dhaka district administration.

After the namaz-e-janaza, his family announced that the Qulkhani would be held at Azad mosque after Asr prayers on Monday.

Condolences poured in from a cross-section of people, including former bureaucrats, and different rights organisations.

In a Facebook post, renowned economist Wahiduddin Mahmud said Akbar's active presence greatly enriched the civil society of Bangladesh. He was a skilled government

official, a man of integrity, a researcher, an impartial political observer, a good writer, a teacher and a social thinker.

After attending his namaz-e-janaza, Gonoshasthava Kendra founder Zafrullah Chowdhury said, "In this critical time, it is hard to find people like him who can speak the truth. The nation now needed him very much. But

losing him at this moment is an irreparable loss.'

BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir said Akbar was always connected with people, though he was a bureaucrat.

Earlier in the day, Akbar's colleagues and eminent citizens visited his Gulshan residence.

"He used to think independently, always spoke the truth and thought about the welfare of the people and the country. He lived a successful life," said Matiur Rahman, the daily Prothom Alo editor and publisher.

Cops sue 2,000 over clash with BNP men

Police filed a case against 2,000 people in Rangpur's Gangachara upazila yesterday, after some 40 people were hurt in a clash between the law enforcers and BNP activists on Thursday.

Of the accused, 50 were named and 1,950 were unnamed. Four people have been arrested already, said police.

"The case was filed accusing 1,500 to 2,000 people for attacking police, causing deterioration of law and order situation and obstructing police from discharging their duties," said Hossain Raihan assistant superintendent of Rangpur police (circle-a).

According to police, the upazila unit BNP organised a rally protesting the death of BNP activists in Narayanganj, and a hike in the prices of essentials.

The activists and leaders of the party started gathering at Old Sonali Bank Intersection on Thursday afternoon.

Later, a procession was brought out that started marching toward Gangachara Bazaar. Police, however, intercepted it.

Protesting the police action, brick chunks were thrown from the procession targeting the police,

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Stone Age humans had advanced medical knowledge

Buried in a shallow grave deep within a remote Indonesian cave, archaeologists have found the bones of a young individual they say could rewrite medical history. U s i n g

radiocarbon dating techniques, scientists estimate the body has lain undisturbed for 31,000 years inside the Liang Tebo

cave in eastern Kalimantan province in Borneo, according to research published in the journal Nature recently.

But the most striking aspect of the discovery was that the young man or woman was missing their lower left leg, with signs it had been carefully amputated when the person was a pre-teen or early teen before their death from unknown causes between 19 and 21, researchers said.


The otherwise remarkably intact skeleton was found in 2020 by Australian and Indonesian archaeologists, who say the amputation reveals considerable surgical skill and is the earliest example in the archaeological record, shaking up our understanding of sophistication of Stone Age

INDIA'S EXPORT DUTY HIKE Domestic rice market unlikely to be affected

India's imposition of 20 percent duty on rice export is unlikely to affect prices of the staple in Bangladesh,

according to local traders. They said the duty was imposed only on sunned rice, popularly known as atop chal, which is not widely

consumed here. Bangladeshi traders mainly import parboiled rice from the neighbouring country, they added.

In the capital yesterday, the price of fine rice was Tk 62-70 a kg, down 5 percent from a week ago, while the cheapest coarse rice sold for Tk 47-52 a kg, down 8 percent from a week ago, according to the Trading Corporation of

Prices began to fall after the government on August 28 reduced duty on rice import to around 15 percent from over 25 percent to encourage imports and increase supply to the domestic market.

But India on Thursday imposed a 20 percent export duty on rice to tame prices in its domestic market.

Chitta Majumder, managing director of Majumder Group of Industries, which imports rice from India, said traders mainly import parboiled rice. Since India has not slapped any duty on its export, Bangladeshi market will not be affected.

KM Layek Ali, general secretary of Bangladesh Auto Major and Husking Mill Owners Association, expressed the same opinion.

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
