What was your motivation to begin a travel channel on YouTube?

I have been travelling for a large part of my life. Once I was able to capture these experiences with modern smartphones, it only made sense to put them together into videos I could look back to, so I could cherish my favourite moments. The channel was initially just me making videos for myself and my friends and family. When I started, I did not have any grand ambitions of being influential on social media, and did not think this could ever become a career.
