BNP working at a synchronous movement

Drafts 9 demands, holds talks with other opposition parties

The BNP has finalised the draft of a nine-point demand, aiming to wage a "simultaneous movement" with different opposition parties and platforms to force the government to step down and pave the way for a free and fair election.

According to the draft, the opposition party demands that the current government hand over power to a neutral one.

The other demands include the dissolution of the existing parliament; reconstitution of the Election Commission; arrest of price hikes of essentials; scrapping of the Digital Security Act, the Special Powers Act and all other black laws; and withdrawal of "false" cases filed against political leaders, ams and journalists, sources said.

"Our talks with different political parties are going on. It is not possible to say exactly when the discussions will end. Basically, they will go on as the movement progresses."

The party also demands that the enforced disappearance victims be returned to their families and those responsible be tried. It seeks formation of a commission to find out those who have laundered money abroad.

The draft was finalised at a meeting of the BNP Standing Committee at BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia's Gulshan office on Monday night. The party's acting chairman Tarique Rahman presided over it through video conferencing.

"We have finalised the draft of our demands through which we will move forward to wage a simultaneous movement. We will hold discussions with the opposition political parties and platforms to finalise the strategy of a simultaneous movement," a BNP standing committee member told The Daily Star yesterday, seeking anonymity.

Act to stop Myanmar's unlawful activities

Dhaka calls upon int'l community

As Dhaka calls upon the international community to use their influence to stop Myanmar's unlawful activities at the Bangladesh border, Naypyidaw continues to blame the Arakan Army and ARSA for the problem.

Summoning the Bangladesh ambassador to Myanmar, Manjurul Karim Khan Chowdhury, on Monday, its foreign ministry said the Arakan Army and Arakan

Rohingya Salvation Army (ARSA) have been carrying out attacks in the border areas deliberately to damage the cordial relations between the two countries.

The development comes after the Bangladesh foreign ministry on Sunday summoned the Myanmar envoy for the fourth time since late August, briefed the ASEAN diplomats in Dhaka the following day and the representatives of the rest of the foreign countries yesterday.

ENFORCED DISAPPEARANCE 'Victims' voices should be heard'

UN working group urges Dhaka to address allegation conveyed last year

The UN Working Group on Enforced or Involuntary Disappearances has urged Bangladesh to respond to a general allegation conveyed last year on the alleged forced disappearance that took place at the hands of the Rapid Action Battalion, and the undue pressure on human rights organisations.

"Attention needed to be given to implementing the recommendations of the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights, and victims' voices should be heard," said Luciano Hazan, chair of the Working Group.

He made the comments at an interactive dialogue of the Human Rights Council held with the Working Group in Geneva on Tuesday, according to the UN meeting summary posted on Tuesday night.

Concluding her visit to Bangladesh on August 17, then UN human rights commissioner Michelle Bachelet highlighted the need for an impartial, independent and transparent investigation into these allegations, accompanied by security sector reform.

Bachelet also said inviting the UN Working Group on Enforced Disappearances to visit Bangladesh would also show a commitment to decisively address this issue.

"As the biggest contributor of uniformed personnel to UN

\$1b WB loan unlikely this fiscal year

Visiting top official of the global lender tells govt

Bangladesh's request for additional budget support of \$1 billion from the World Bank is unlikely to come through this fiscal year, dashing the government's hope of meeting a portion of the budget deficit with cost-effective funding.

The Washington-based multilateral lender conveyed the update during the three-day visit of Martin Raiser, its recently appointed vice president for South Asia, The Daily Star has learnt from people familiar with the discussions, who requested anonymity to disclose sensitive deliberations.

This fiscal year, the country is on course to receiving \$500 million in budget support from the Washington-based lender under two programmes: 'Bangladesh Green, Resilient and Inclusive Development Policy Credit (GRID-DPC)'
