RAHIMA'S 'ABDUCTION' Families of the accused seek fresh probe

The family members of the five accused in the Rahima Begum abduction case yesterday demanded immediate release of their relatives from jail.

Speaking at a press conference at the Khulna Press Club, they also called for a fresh investigation into the case.

The demands came after Syed Mushfiqur Rahman, superintendent of police working at Khulna Police Bureau of Investigation (PBI), said arrestees Golam Kibria and Mohiuddin would be remanded as Rahima in her statement before a Khulna court named the duo as her abductors.

The other accused are Rafiqul Islam Palash, Mohammad Jewel and Helal Sharif. All the five accused are Rahima's neighbours.

Rahima, 55, was allegedly abducted on August 27 from her house in Khulna city's Uttar Banikpara. The next day, her daughter Adri Akhter filed the case with the Daulatpur Police Station, accusing

The PBI is now probing the case.

The family members of the accused yesterday alleged that the abduction was planned and plotted by the abductee and her daughter Mariam Mannan. Rahima went into hiding voluntarily

to get the arrestees into trouble as she was involved in a land related dispute with them, the family members told journalists at the press conference.

The families also claimed that Rahima and Mariam were trying to distort facts by providing false information to leave 5 information to law enforcers. "My husband has not committed any

crime. He was arrested on August 30, about a week before my daughter was born. This left me helpless," said Helal's wife Monira Akhter.

She also said she would take legal action against Rahima once her husband is cleared of the charges.

Rahima was found unharmed on September 24, living as a guest at his former tenant Kuddus Molla's residence in Faridpur's Boalmari upazila, said Abdur Rahman, additional deputy commissioner of Khulna Metropolitan Police, who lead the rescue team to Faridpur.

She, however, didn't tell how and why she travelled to Faridpur, Rahman

On September 23, Mariam identified a body, recovered by police, as her mother's at Phulbari Police Station in Mymensingh.

Russia issues new nuke warning

Wraps up contested Ukraine referendums; Europe suspects sabotage as mystery gas leaks hit Russian pipelines

An ally of President Vladimir Putin yesterday issued a stark new nuclear warning to Ukraine and the West as Russia began releasing results of referendums it bills as a prelude to it annexing four Ukrainian regions.

Moscow's latest broadside came as European countries rushed to investigate unexplained, major leaks in two Russian natural gas pipelines under the Baltic Sea, which posed risks of explosions and the sinking of any ships that enter the area.

The Kremlin, which has blamed technical problems for earlier cuts in Russian gas supplies to Europe, said it

saying who was to blame.

Yesterday's nuclear warning by Dmitry Medvedev, deputy chairman of Russia's Security Council, is one of several issued by Putin and his associates in recent

Analysts say they are designed to deter Ukraine and the West by hinting at a readiness to use tactical nuclear weapons to defend newly annexed territory.

Medvedev's warning differed from earlier ones in that he predicted for the first time that the Nato military alliance would not risk a nuclear war and directly enter the Ukraine war even if Moscow struck Ukraine with nuclear weapons.

"I believe that Nato would not directly could not rule out sabotage, without interfere in the conflict even in this

scenario," Medvedev said in a post on Telegram. "The demagogues across the ocean and in Europe are not going to die in a nuclear apocalypse."

First partial voting results from four regions of Ukraine partly occupied by Russia and its proxies showed overwhelming majorities in favour of joining Russia, Russia's state news agency RIA reported.

It was a widely anticipated announcement after a five-day referendum that Kyiv and the West have denounced as a sham and say they will not recognise. Ukraine urged the EU to impose new punitive sanctions in response to votes it said were carried out at gunpoint in many

School teacher killed in Natore road crash

Rawshan Ara Begum, 40, was on her way to school when the incident happened. Her husband Firoz Ahmed was taking her to

work, at Satoil Government Primary School, on his new motorcycle, said Abu Siddique, officer-incharge of Baraigram Police Station.

She fell off the bike when Firoz braked after seeing a truck coming from the opposite direction. Rawshan got run over and she died at the scene.

The truck has been seized, but the driver and his assistant managed to flee, the officer added.

Man to die for killing 2-yr-old in Sirajganj

A Sirajganj court yesterday sentenced a man to death for abducting and killing a two-year-old boy. Amir Chan, 28, was also sentenced to 14 years in prison and fined Tk 50,000 for abduction and demanding ransom.

In August 2018, the convict abducted a toddler in Shahjadpur upazila, and demanded a ransom

He then killed the child and dumped his body.

President Vladimir Putin on Monday granted Russian citizenship to US whistleblower Edward Snowden, who exposed massive surveillance by the US National Security Agency on Americans and then sought refuge in Russia.

"My 11-year-old nephew Sajib, my wife Sumita and I boarded the poat. There were some 100 to 120 passengers on our boat," he said.

"It started wobbling just after leaving the ghat. The wobbling got worse as we moved a short distance ahead. All the passengers were panicking. At one stage, the boat tilted to one side and water started gushing in and then it finally overturned," Solin said.

"I kept holding Sajib's and Sumita's hands tightly, but both slipped away due to the strong current. I cannot say how I was able to swim to shore," said Solin.

On Monday, their bodies were recovered from the river bank in Basuli village of Khansama upazila, said Rudreshwar Chandra Roy, Solin's younger brother.

Family members and relatives of the people missing were desperately searching for their near and dear ones. They were seen walking listlessly on the bank and around the control room.

'My two little sisters -- Joty and Joya drowned. Joty is two years old and Joya is four. Joty's body was found on Monday. But Joya is still missing," said Santa Roy, 16, a resident of Ghatiarpara village in Panchagarh Sadar upazila.

Immediately after the accident, the district administration formed a five-member probe body led by ADC Dipankar Roy. The body was asked to submit the probe report in three days.

'We have almost completed our work. We hope to submit the report to our higher authorities tonight | last night]," Dipankar said yesterday.

Meanwhile, many people of the area were angry and alleged that authorities concerned did not take any measure to construct a bridge on this river, despite repeated appeals in the past.

"We have been demanding construction of a bridge here for long," said Sakhawat Hossain,45, a resident of Mareya Sardarpara village in Boda upazila.

Braving it all, she is still going strong in the pursuit of the "Sonar Bangla" her father dreamed of.

The eldest among five children of Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and Sheikh Fazilatunnesa Mujib, Hasina was born at Tungipara in Gopalganj on September 28, 1947, the year marking the births of two countries -- India and Pakistan.

In 1968, she married nuclear scientist Dr Wazed Miah.

In 1981, while exiled in India, she was elected the president of the Awami League, one of the oldest political parties in the country. She has been leading the party since then and has taken it to power four times.

Her political career started much earlier though. She was involved with student politics while in college and was elected the vice-president of

the students' union at Government construction of Padma Bridge, which Intermediate College (now Begum Badrunnesa Government Girls' College) for the 1966-67 term.

She became the prime minister for the first time in 1996 and after that, she became prime minister in 2009, 2014 and 2019, becoming the country's longest serving premier.

Hasina placed Vision 2021 in Awami League's manifesto before the national election of 2008 with an aim to transform Bangladesh into a middleincome country. She came up with Vision 2041

before the national election of 2014, this time aiming to eradicate poverty on way to becoming a developed nation by 2041. During her leadership as head of

the government, she took steps to initiate the war crimes trials and also the trial of the Bangabandhu murder

Hasina showed her courage and determination by completing the

many thought a near impossible task.

the storm, came the Russia-Ukraine war, putting the economy on the line once again as the global supply chain was badly disrupted. And she now faces the task of

steering the nation out of the economic downturn to newer heights. At the same time, she will have to prove her popularity in the next parliamentary election, slated for early 2024. In spite of many magnificent

achievements, some controversies and moves take some shine off her glorious legacy. A growing lack of public trust over the electoral system and rule of law is something that has been the biggest criticism in her ongoing 13-year tenure. The weakening of democratic institutions and enacting of various laws that shrunk the freedom of expression and media are some valid criticisms that she cannot shrug off.

Rail can rev up trade with India EXPORT TO OTHER COUNTRIES

in February 1972 while operation of passenger trains resumed in April 2008. Around 120 freight trains now operate between the two countries every

month using five railway interchanges. Trains carrying shipping containers have been bringing goods from India since July 2020, nearly three years after a memorandum of understanding (MoU) was signed between Container Corporation of India Ltd (CONCOR) and

Container Company of Bangladesh Ltd. Even though there were demands, Bangladesh could not export goods by trains due to restrictions in India, a BŘ

However, the Indian authorities following Bangladesh's request, lifted the bar in May this year and informed the BR via the foreign ministry, he said, wishing not to be named.

The railways ministry on September 13 approved the shipping costs, another BR official said, seeking anonymity.

The BR then sent a draft Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) to the ONCOR, he said, adding that the draft was prepared following discussions between the two sides. It is expected that the Indian side will not take much time to finalise it.

"Export to India by trains is going to start after over 50 years of independence. This is huge," the BR official said.

But freight operations across the border are suffering because of a scarcity of locomotives, operators and infrastructure.

"These issues should be addressed to reap the benefit of the new initiative," he India has offered free transit via its territory for export to other countries through certain land customs stations,

airports, and seaports. The neighbouring country made the offer during Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's recent state visit to India.

Moreover, a BR official said the Indian finance ministry in November 2018 issued a circular to facilitate exports of Bangladesh to other countries via India. In June 2020, the effectiveness of the circular was extended until further notice, he said.

As per the circular, transshipment of goods by railways to other countries can be done through Nhavasheva port in Mumbai, he added. Formally known as Jawaharlal Nehru Port, it is the second largest shipping container port in India.

With the arrival of goods worth \$16.19 billion, India was the secondlargest source of imports for Bangladesh in the fiscal year 2021-22. Bangladesh exported garment products, plastic goods and other products worth \$2 billion to the neighbouring country that year, by roads, rivers and air. executive Mohammad Hatem,

president of Bangladesh Knitwear Manufacturers Exporters and Association, described the development as a "very positive one". Businesses currently have to wait

for a long time at the Benapole port to export goods because of the lengthy procedure, he told The Daily Star.

"This is a very good initiative. We have to reap the benefit of such initiatives," he said, calling for improving the railway
