

# Obstacles defied, BNP rally peaceful

Won't accept anything but a caretaker govt, Fakhrul tells Khulna gathering

The BNP rally in Khulna was largely peaceful with some incidents of vandalism and activists of the BNP and ruling Awami League chasing each other.

The tension was palpable in the air as groups of AL activists stood at the entrances to the city with sticks and sharp weapons throughout the day.

Besides, there was a transport strike on the roads and rivers for two days ahead of the event.

But thousands of BNP supporters still made it to the rally at Dak Bungalow intersection.

"You people made the impossible possible. I salute you," BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir told the rally in the afternoon.

If the coming election were to be held under a caretaker administration, the Awami League would not even be able to win 10 seats in parliament, he said.

"People will not accept anything but a caretaker government. Why don't you [govt] want to accept this demand? Because you know that you will become nonexistent...," he said.

The AL has turned Bangladesh into hell just so that it can stay in power without people's votes, he said.

While the rally was still going on, the Khulna BNP office on KD Ghosh Road was set on fire allegedly by the ruling party men.

Meanwhile, bus and launch services resumed in the region soon after the rally ended in the evening.

At the event, BNP standing committee member Khandakar Mosharraf Hossain said Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina should answer why load-shedding "returned from the museum".

Goyeshwar Chandra Roy, another standing committee member, said over 200 BNP activists were arrested centring the rally.

BNP Vice-Chairman Abdul Awal Mintoo said the anti-government movement had just started and it wouldn't stop until the AL government was ousted.

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## TRANSPORT STRIKE Rally over, demands gone

While transport leaders held Khulna hostage for the last two days "to wage a war against illegal three-wheelers", their vociferous demands fizzled out around the time the BNP ended its rally.

Launch workers, following suit, had stopped vessel operation to press home a 10-point demand, which included the crucial demand for higher pay.

Not to be outdone by these two, engine-boat owners too took their vessels off service on the Rupsha, demanding that per-head fare for ferrying passengers be raised by a whole taka to reflect the hike in fuel prices.

All three of these apparently unrelated transport organisations called strike in the lead-up to the BNP rally in Khulna.

Right after the rally, buses were back on the roads, launches reved their engines, and engine-boats happily ferried people.

But none of their demands have been met.

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## 'Ensure gas supply, we'll pay more'

Textile industry leaders urge govt

Textile mill owners yesterday said they were willing to shell out 40 percent more for gas if the supply was uninterrupted. Supply disruptions were costing the industry crores of taka, they said.

Spinning, weaving, dyeing, finishing and sizing facility owners currently pay Tk 16.33 for each million cubic feet of gas.

"We are ready to pay Tk 22.83 or 40 percent more per unit of gas to keep the mills running," Mohammad Ali Khokon, president of Bangladesh Textile Mills Association (BTMA), told a press conference at a hotel in the capital.

Since March, the industry has lost orders worth \$1 billion because of disruption in production caused by gas shortage, he said.

After July, production in the mills fell to 60 percent, he added.

The BTMA currently has 1,700 members who invested about \$16 billion in the sector, Khokon said.

Textile mills in many areas of Narayanganj, Madhabdi, Ashulia, Savar, Gazipur, Sreepur, Bhaluka, Chattogram and Cumilla can now operate for only 12 hours a day because of poor gas supplies.

Many entry- and mid-level mills are on the verge of closure, he added.

Devon Conway scored a brilliant unbeaten 92 as New Zealand thrashed champions Australia by 89 runs in a rematch of last year's final, opening the Super 12 stage with a bang at the Twenty20 World Cup on Saturday.

Expatriate New Zealanders turned out in numbers at a packed Sydney Cricket Ground and were treated to fireworks from the Black Caps batters as they blasted their way to 200 for three in their 20 overs after Conway smashed the final ball for a six.

Seamer Tim Southee struck early to remove David Warner and took three for six as the New Zealand bowlers kept up a relentless pressure to dismiss the hosts for 111 in the 18th over.

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## CHINA COMMUNIST PARTY CONGRESS Xi solidifies control

Opposition to Taiwan's independence enshrined into China's constitution

Chinese President Xi Jinping was all set for a historic third term in power as the Communist Party's Congress ended yesterday, but the dramatic removal of his predecessor from the event stole the headlines.

At the end of the week-long gathering in Beijing, China's ruling party approved a sweeping reshuffle that saw a number of top officials — including Premier Li Keqiang — step down, allowing Xi to appoint new allies.

The largely rubber-stamp meeting of around 2,300 party delegates was meticulously choreographed, with Xi determined to avoid any surprises as he enshrined his leadership for the next five years.

However, in an unexpected move that punctured the proceedings at the Great Hall of the People, former leader Hu Jintao was led out

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
