In the film, the lead character Shashi Godbole is a small entrepreneur who makes snacks. She is mocked by her husband and daughter for lacking English speaking skills, and ends up taking an English-speaking course where she gains new perspectives. In fact, the writer and director Gauri Shinde was inspired by her mother to write this character. Shinde went on to achieve several debutant awards for the movie.

The most beautiful aspect of the character Shashi, is this very relatability. We see how she is looked down upon by her own family, something which is, unfortunately, very common in this part of the world. Shashi's family never pauses to question why she never had the learning opportunities to begin with. But when she gets the right opportunity and encouragement, Shashi evolves into a confident woman.

Thus, the movie makes its audiences take a pause and ponder about women close to them. It compels them to think if they have been treating their women with due respect, because as the movie clearly proves, love without respect can be even more

suffocating than estrangement.

"English Vinglish" takes a dig into issues of motherhood, that are least talked about in brown households. The dynamics of the difficult teenage years bringing a rift in the parent-child relationship is sensitively crafted in the movie. It is miles apart from the melodramatic portrayal common to Bollywood, and is a genuine depiction of what can and cannot be witnessed in the real world.

The movie questions the role of our surroundings in shaping our identities. Shashi's new atmosphere helps her shed inhibition and self-doubt, and convinces her to love and respect herself. It shows how often women are deliberately worn down, just to break their confidence. The notions and responsibilities centering marriage are scrutinized as well, leaving the audiences thoughtful about the agency and status of women in such traditional setups.

It has been 10 years since we knew the struggle Shashi had regarding her English, which indeed can be a metaphor for the pain she endured in her own home. But if the movie is still relatable, maybe it shows that sadly, we haven't progressed much as a society.

## PM to visit Japan

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As Bangladesh will be graduating out of the LDC status by 2026, it is working on signing a free trade agreement (FTA) with Japan.

"So far this has only been looked at with small samples from Doppler surveys, which typically have found giant planets further away from these red dwarf stars. Until now we have not had a large enough sample of planets to find close-in gas planets in a robust manner."

Some mysteries still surround TOI-3757 b that scientists will have to solve – the biggest being how the planet could have even formed, especially with its low-density. One answer could be that the planet has a lower number of heavy elements in its rocky core compared to other gas giants, which may have delayed how the gas accumulates and lowered its density.

The second factor could be that the planet's slightly elliptical orbit results in substantial excess heating when it gets close to its star – causing the planet's atmosphere to bloat.

"Potential future observations of the atmosphere of this planet using NASA's new James Webb Space Telescope could help shed light on its puffy nature," says Jessica Libby-Roberts, a postdoctoral researcher at Pennsylvania State University.

The research could help astronomers understand what the planets are made of and how they formed and, for potentially habitable rocky worlds, whether they might be able to support life.

## Sitrang causing concern

Maritime ports of Chattogram, Cox's Bazar, Mongla and Payra were advised to hoist local cautionary signal-4.

The cyclone will hit 730 kilometre-long coastal areas in 19 districts of the country with three to five feet high tidal surges, said Enamur Rahman, state minister for disaster management and relief.

It may hit Bangladesh's coastal areas between midnight tonight and evening tomorrow at the speed of 90-100 kilometres per hour, he said while briefing the media at the secretariat yesterday.

"It will not be a 'super cyclone'. But we expect it to affect more areas than any storm in the last three

years," he added.

"We have already instructed district administrators to prepare the cyclone shelters," he said.

Due to deep depression, new moon phase and steep pressure gradient, the low-lying areas of coastal Satkhira, Khulna, Bagerhat, Jhalakathi, Pirojpur, Barguna, Patuakhali, Bhola, Barishal, Laxmipur, Chandpur, Noakhali, Feni, Chattogram, Cox's Bazar districts and their offshore islands and char areas are likely to be inundated by the wind-driven surge height of 3-5 feet above the astronomical tide the Met bulletin said.

Advancing at a speed of 20kmph last evening, the cyclone was located about 700km south-southwest of the Bangladesh coast.

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they would ensure gas supply in the zones where sugar refineries are located," said Shafiquezzaman. "We are conducting drives in markets and legal steps were taken against the dishonest traders."

Yesterday, the Prime Minister's Office also asked the authorities concerned to constantly monitor markets to contain prices of essential commodities, including sugar, their stocks and supplies in the market.

## Railway sues

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Contacted, Station Master Manik said, "I and some other railway officials witnessed the vandalism that lasted for around half an hour."

## Xi secures 3rd term

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alongside him as members of the Politburo Standing Committee – the party's apex of power that rules the country.

Li Qiang – a former chief of staff for Xi who oversaw a gruelling two-month Covid lockdown in Shanghai this year – was named as number two in the Standing Committee.

This means he is likely to take over as premier from Li Keqiang, a former Xi rival who will retire next year.

Close aide Ding Xuexiang and Guangdong party chief Li Xi, a longtime confidante of the president, were among other allies named in the Standing Committee.

Xi was swiftly congratulated by some of China's allies, including Russian President Vladimir Putin and North Korean leader Kim Jong Un. The United States offered no immediate response.

"The new Politburo Standing Committee confirms decisively that Xi has consolidated power at the top of the Communist Party to an extent unseen since the Mao era," said Neil

Thomas, a senior China analyst at Eurasia Group.

Yesterday's announcements came after a week-long Congress of 2,300 hand-picked party delegates during which they endorsed Xi's "core position" in the leadership and approved a sweeping reshuffle that saw Li and other former Xi rivals relegated.

On Saturday the delegates elected the Central Committee of around 200 senior party officials, who yesterday chose the 24-person Politburo and the Standing Committee.

The Politburo will have no women members for the first time in 25 years.

Analysts had closely watched for whether the party charter would be amended during the Congress to enshrine "Xi Jinping Thought" as a guiding philosophy, a move that would put Xi on a par with Mao.

That did not take place, though a resolution did call the creed "the Marxism of contemporary China and of the 21st Century", adding that it "embodies the best Chinese culture and ethos of this era".

## Doctors tell Saudi crown prince to skip summit: Algeria

Doctors have advised Saudi Arabia's powerful crown prince not to travel to Algiers for an upcoming summit, the Algerian presidency said yesterday, amid an absence of Saudi reports confirming health issues.

Mohammed bin Salman "apologised for not being able to participate in the Arab Summit to be held on November 1 in Algiers, in accordance with the recommendations of doctors who advise him not to travel", the official Algerian news agency APS said, citing a presidency statement.

Algerian President Abdelmadjid Tebboune responded during a phone call that "he understood the situation and regretted the crown prince's inability to attend" the summit, expressing "wishes for his health and well-being".

The story did not provide any explanation for the doctors'

recommendations. Saudi officials did not respond to a request for comment.

But Ali Shihabi, a Saudi analyst close to the government, said the concern could be related to an "ear condition".

Prince Mohammed "has an endemic ear condition which makes long distance air travel difficult because the pressure in an aircraft can lead to ear blockage for weeks", he said on Twitter.

"This explains how sometimes last minute he makes travel changes. Nothing major!"

A report on the call between the two leaders by the official Saudi Press Agency made no mention of the summit or any advice from Prince Mohammed's doctors.

It said that during the call "the aspects of bilateral relations between the two fraternal countries were reviewed", and that the two leaders discussed "opportunities for joint cooperation".
