Bangladesh won't face food crisis unless it's hit by natural disaster
Says food minister

UNB, Dhaka

Food Minister Sadhan Chandra Majumder yesterday said Bangladesh will not face any food crisis unless the country is hit by a natural disaster.

He made the remarks in a discussion on food security held in Barishal Circuit House, said a press release issued by the Press Information Department.

Despite warnings about the world being hit with a food crisis, Bangladesh, which produces about four crore tonnes of rice per annum, cultivates and harvests crops around the year, he added.

He also urged the people to stop the consumption of high-priced rice that appears shiny and silky on the outside but is low in nutrition as it is polished at least 4-5 times.

Alongside raising awareness on food and nutrition, he also requested people to stop wasting food.

The minister had earlier visited Barishal Rice Silo which is said to have a capacity of 48,000 tonnes. The under-construction storage with modern facilities is being built spending Tk 331 crore and is financed by the World Bank.

Russia could plan 'dirty bomb' pretext

Western countries warn of escalation in Ukraine conflict

Western countries yesterday accused Russia of plotting to use a threat of a bomb laced with nuclear material as a pretext for escalation in Ukraine, as Moscow evacuated civilians from a southern city in anticipation of a major battle.

With Ukrainian forces advancing into Russian-occupied Kherson province, Russian Defence Minister Sergei Shoigu phoned Western counterparts on Sunday to tell them Moscow suspected Kyiv of planning to use a so-called "dirty bomb".

In a joint statement, the foreign ministers of France, Britain and the United States said they had all rejected the allegations and reaffirmed their support for Ukraine against Russia.

"Our countries made clear that we all reject Russia's transparently false allegations that Ukraine is preparing to use a dirty bomb on its own territory," they said. "The world would see through any attempt to use this allegation as a pretext for escalation."

In an overnight address, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky said the Russian accusation was a sign Moscow was planning such an attack itself and would blame Ukraine.

"If Russia calls and says that Ukraine is

allegedly preparing something, it means one thing: Russia has already prepared all this," Zelensky said.

"So when today the Russian Minister of Defense organises a phone carousel and calls foreign ministers with stories about the so-called 'dirty' nuclear bomb, everyone understands everything well. Understands who is the source of everything dirty that can be imagined in this war."

Asked about the fact that others did not seem to believe Russia's accusations, Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told a briefing yesterday: "Their disbelief doesn't mean there's no threat ... The threat is evident."

Russia has ordered civilians to evacuate territory it controls on the western bank of the Dnipro River, where Ukrainian forces have been advancing since the start of this month shortly after Moscow claimed to have annexed the area.

The Russian-installed authorities in Kherson announced yesterday that men who stay behind would have the option of joining a military self-defence unit. Kyiv accuses Russia of press-ganging men in occupied areas into military formations, a war crime under the Geneva Conventions.

Kyrylo Budanov, Ukraine's military spy chief, said Russian forces were preparing

to defend Kherson city, not retreat from it, and reported evacuations were part of a Russian information campaign. While Russia is moving financial structures, equipment, vulnerable residents and wounded people from Kherson, he said, it is also reinforcing defences.

"They are creating the illusion that all is lost. Yet at the same time they are moving new military units in and preparing to defend the streets of Kherson," he told Interfax Ukraine news agency.

Since Russia's forces suffered major battlefield defeats in September, President Vladimir Putin has escalated the war, calling up hundreds of thousands of reservists, announcing the annexation of occupied territory and repeatedly threatening to use nuclear weapons to defend Russian land.

This month, Russia has started a new campaign using long-range cruise missiles and Iranian-made drones to attack Ukraine's electric power and heat ahead of winter.

Russian state television is filled with talk shows featuring pundits who are openly cheering attacks on Ukrainian civil infrastructure and call for ever tougher measures to eliminate what they describe as an illegitimate Ukrainian state.

Sitrang whips through south

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Later at night, at least 13 trawlers capsized in the Bay. However, the casualties could not be known immediately.

Our correspondents from Patuakhali, Barishal, Khulna, Pirojpur, Bagerhat Cox's Bazar, Noakhali and Chattogram report that all the low-lying areas in the coastal region were inundated amid heavy rainfall and tidal surges.

The situation worsened in the evening -- strong winds and very heavy rainfall here. We are rushing towards the cyclone shelter," Pankaj Shil from Hatiya, a southern island, told The Daily Star.

Aid workers have stockpiled emergency items such as food, tarpaulins and water purification tablets in refugee camps housing more than a million Rohingya in flimsy shelters in Cox's Bazar.

According to the central control room of the fire service in Dhaka,

around 600 roadside trees fell in different districts, blocking roads.

Briefing reporters after an inter-ministerial meeting yesterday afternoon, State Minister Enamur Rahman said, "We gave shelter to 24 lakh people during Cyclone Amphan. This time we aimed to shift 25 lakh people."

"Sitrang has turned into a cyclone and will hit the land in the evening," he said, citing weather experts from the Meteorological Department.

The centre of the cyclone will cross through Barguna and Patuakhali districts, he said, adding that 13 districts of Chattogram, Barishal and Khulna will be affected very badly.

The districts are Satkira, Khulna, Bagerhat, Jhalakathi, Pirojpur, Barguna, Patuakhali, Bholia, Barishal, Laxmipur, Chandpur, Noakhali and Feni. Barguna and Patuakhali could be worst hit.

Assistance has been sought from the armed forces division to help

evacuate people from the remote areas, added the state minister.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina instructed the authorities to take all-out preparations to protect lives and properties from the impending severe cyclone.

The Meteorological Department asked maritime ports Mongla and Payra to raise their alert due to the inclement weather.

Three airlines -- Biman Bangladesh, US-Bangla and Novoair -- cancelled 60 domestic flights to three destinations because of the cyclone.

The airports in Chattogram, Cox's Bazar and Barishal will remain closed till noon today.

The Civil Aviation Authority Bangladesh (CAAB) has decided to shut down all operations of these three airports from 3:00pm yesterday to noon today, according to a press release.

Bangladesh Inland Water

Transport Coronation (BIWTC) yesterday suspended operations of ferry services across the country.

Besides, operations of all types of water transports remained suspended since yesterday morning due to inclement weather, said an official of Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA).

Meanwhile, the Directorate of Secondary and Higher Education directed the authorities to use all secondary school and colleges as temporary shelters in areas to be hit by the cyclone.

In 2020, Cyclone Amphan, only the second "super cyclone" ever recorded over the Bay of Bengal, killed more than 100 people in Bangladesh and India, and affected millions.

Last year, more than a million people were evacuated along India's east coast before Cyclone Yaas battered the area with winds gusting up to 155 kilometres an hour -- equivalent to a Category 2 hurricane.

Addressing members of his party behind closed doors after the announcement, Sunak reportedly received a rapturous reception.

He warned MPs in that meeting that the Conservative party was facing an "existential threat". He also ruled out an early general election.

Scottish leader Nicola Sturgeon, whose nationalist government in Edinburgh wants to hold an independence referendum next year, was among the first to congratulate Sunak.

"I wish him well... notwithstanding our political differences," she said.

"That he becomes the first British Asian -- indeed the first from any minority ethnic background -- to become PM is a genuinely significant moment," she said.

The contest, triggered by outgoing leader Truss's resignation on Thursday, had required candidates to secure the support of at least 100 Conservative MPs by 2:00 pm (1300 GMT) yesterday.

'A big win for us'

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Cup and their only notable victory was in the very first edition 15 years ago against the West Indies in 2007 in Johannesburg. Colin Ackermann played a lone hand for his side, scoring a 48-ball 62, but that never gave chills to Shakib Al Hasan's troops in cold conditions at Hobart. Taskin ended the day just as he had started, with a double-wicket over as he removed Shariz Ahmad and Ackermann in the 17th over.

Meanwhile, the other game yesterday at the same venue between South Africa and Zimbabwe was washed out due to rain.
