A realisation on pace unit that strikes a chord

Taskin Ahmed's first two deliveries hit a length and while the first went away from the lefthanded Vikramjit Singh, the second went away just slightly off the deck from the righthanded Bas de Leede and both deliveries made the batters play and got the nick off the bats. Most importantly, both catches were taken, with Yasir Ali diving forward to take a low catch at slips and wicketkeeper Nurul Hasan diving to his right to take the next one as Netherlands were down to two in two deliveries in chase of 144 made by Bangladesh tone had been set, and the fielders had their tails up as Bangladesh made up for any lacking with the bat in the first innings.

The bowling unit held up their end and this time the fielding unit was immense in support of their common cause. The effort and determination went a long way into giving the Tigers a much-needed victory in just the right time -- the very first Super 12 game at this World Cup, defeating Netherlands by 9 runs at the Bellerive Oval yesterday.

"We want to be the best fielding side given we have a young team. We have the belief that we can

save 5-10 runs which can make a big difference," skipper Shakib Al Hasan said at the post-match presentations.

Afif Hossain, running all the way from square-leg after Max O'Dowd had placed the ball in the vacant mid-on region and was going for a double, produced a throw so fast that O'Dowd was at point but Hasan Mahmud caught out in the middle during the ensuing confusion and Shakib did the rest, collecting the ball to take the bails off as Netherlands lost their third wicket. One delivery later in the

same Shakib over, it was Najmul Hossain Shanto who attacked the ball and stopped it from going for four in the cover region. He quickly got back to his feet following the slide and produced a flat throw with Tom Cooper out of his crease trying to run a three.

Shanto did miss a good chance disturbed Tim Pringle's stumps in the next delivery to ensure the dropped chance did not matter much. Taskin ensured Colin Ackerman's departure to end with career-best figures of four

for 25 in T20Is.

Bangladesh have so long put focus on their spin-centredness that fast bowlers were often neglected. The Test matches in recent times showed how crucial pace was to success. Taskin later said the Tests were helpful in his approach from the very first over where he was on a hattrick.

"I stuck to my basics, saw there was movement in the first innings. So, I bowled Test-match lengths," he said. "It's a good win for us and we needed it. We played well as a team, happy to have contributed."

Asked on his work with pace bowling coach Allan Donald, Taskin said working on wrist positions was paying dividends.

"I can move the ball both ways, that was the main focus. worked on that coming into the World Cup," Taskin added as Bangladesh made the start they were looking for.

"We've found talent, Hasan's new, Taskin's developed well in the past few years. We understand the importance of fast bowling now, across formats," Shakib said at the presentation ceremony as Bangladesh now look to make their fast-bowling department come alive.

Glimpses shown but concerns remain

It was proved yet again that early momentum helps Bangladesh as a decent opening stand on Monday prevented any batting mishaps for the Tigers in their Super 12 clash against the Netherlands, which they won by nine runs at the Bellerive Oval in Hobart to kick off their T20 World Cup campaign.

After months of experiments, Bangladesh thinks tank finally went with a conventional opening pair consisting specialist openers Najmul Hossain Shanto and Soumya Sarkar against the Netherlands yesterday and the tactic eventually

Interestingly, the Soumya-Shanto duo was the tenth pair that the Bangladesh team management tried this year in 17 games.

And the 43-run opening stand against the Netherlands was the highest opening partnership for Bangladesh in the last 30 T20Is. Bangladesh did suffer a mini-collapse in the middle but eventually coasted to a competitive 144 for eight in 20 overs.

Soumya was the first to depart, falling after a run-a-ball 14 in the sixth over. Shanto, who looked good during his 20-ball 25, soon followed suit as he departed in the very next over.

The Tigers endured a tumultuous period as they lost a total of five wickets in between 5 to 11 overs and were reduced to a precarious 76 for five.



It seemed like another batting debacle was on the cards when the two in-form batters of the side -- Liton Das and skipper Shakib Al Hasan perished in consecutive overs.

"We kept losing wickets at regular intervals and that wasn't helping us. We knew that a score around 155 would have been a great total and we came up 10 runs short," said Shakib during the post-match presentation ceremony yesterday.

After losing wickets in quick succession, it was Afif Hossain who threw a counterpunch. The young left-hander struck leg-spinner, Shariz Ahmed, for two sixes, rasing hopes of the crowd who had gathered to witness the Tigers play even on a gloomy day in Hobart.

Afif did ride his luck, being dropped on 28. But the left-hander capitalised on the opportunity as he top scored with 38 off 27 balls and also starred in a crucial 44-run sixth-wicket stand with wicketkeeper-batter Nurul Hasan Sohan

But when Afif was dismissed in the 18th over with the scoreboard reading 129 for seven, there were still concerns in the Bangladesh camp about whether the score would reach or go past the 140run mark

Bangladesh's ploy of employing a deep batting line-up worked as Mosaddek Hossain, who came in at number eight, came up with some lusty blows at the death, including a six in the final over, to see the Tigers reach a commendable total.

However, the fact that the fast bowlers, especially Taskin Ahmed, had to step up with some encouraging display to ensure a victory against an associate nation was enough to drive home the point that, despite a decent opening stand and a few knocks in the middle, there still remain concerns regarding the Tigers' batting department.

"Obviously we didn't start well the other night, but we've got great self-belief. 'We know our best is the best in the

world. So hopefully, we can turn it around against Sri Lanka. "(It's) the nature of the tournament. You

lose one game, your back is up against the wall. Hopefully we play well, get past that. Then we move on to England." The Perth-born Marsh said conditions

on his home ground would give Australia an edge over Sri Lanka, who are largely dependent on their spin attack.

"We know these conditions very well. And the stadium should suit us more than them," said Marsh.

spinners Lankan Theekshana and Wanindu Hasaranga played a key part in the team's opening

nine-wicket cruise past Ireland on Sunday. The pair troubled the Australians when they toured Sri Lanka in June but conditions are likely to be different in

"Hopefully spin doesn't play a huge factor in Perth and we can look to really attack them," said Marsh.

"They're two key bowlers and if we can get on top of them then I think we'll be ahead of the game.' Theekshana said Sri Lanka are oozing

confidence after their thumping win over Ireland but were wary of the wounded "They lost to New Zealand and we won, so we have got the confidence more than

the Australian team," Theekshana, who returned impressive figures of 2-19 on Sunday, told reporters. "Always nice to win a game and our hope is always to go for the four teams, so

we have to beat them. "They have very good fast bowlers and spinners also. They are last year's champions, so they have to bounce back if they want to be in the tournament."
