
30pc people facing food scarcity

Finds World Bank survey on Covid impact on Bangladesh

Around 30 percent people in Bangladesh are facing food scarcity though the country's economy made a recovery from the pandemic-induced shocks, says a World Bank

The number of people, who went to sleep hungry,



almost doubled to 13 percent in May this year from 7 percent in June last year, according to the survey.

WB Senior Economist Ayago Wambile presented the keynote paper on the survey at a seminar, organised by Bangladesh Institute of Development Studies (BIDS) in the

Six percent of the people surveyed in May this year said they could not buy food. The figure was 5 percent in June last year. The number of those who didn't eat in 24 hours rose to 2 percent in May this year from 1 percent in June last year, the survey said.

However, there has been a significant decrease in the number of people, who ate smaller meals, over the last one year. It fell to 9 percent in May this year from 17 percent in June last year.

'Ready to pay more'

Businesspeople tell govt, demanding uninterrupted power, gas supplies to factories

Businesses yesterday reiterated their demand for uninterrupted gas and power supplies to industrial units as they are having to operate at half capacity because of the ongoing energy crisis.

In desperation, they even proposed that the government hike power and gas prices to ensure uninterrupted supply to industrial units for continuous

In the last couple of months,

different businesspeople from sectors have held meetings with the government to discuss their demand for uninterrupted gas and power supplies.

Importers, exporters, owners of big businesses and leaders of major chambers and trade bodies again raised the demand at a meeting yesterday with Salman F Rahman, prime minister's private industry and investment affairs adviser, and Nasrul Hamid, state minister for power, energy and mineral resources. Waiting for the lights

Thousands suffer in 2 Sitrang-hit dists amid blackout; bodies of 4 more workers found

Thousands of people in two districts are still without electricity as the authorities concerned are yet to repair the power lines after Cyclone Sitrang hit the country two

In Noakhali and Pirojpur, people have been suffering immensely due to the continuous blackout, which has been disrupting businesses and even hospital

In Noakhali, around 50 percent of the subscribers still did not get electricity as of submitting this report at 9:10pm yesterday.

Dil Afroz Baby, a resident of Chatkhil upazila's Hashor area, said, "We have been out of electricity since heavy rains started on Sunday evening. All the food we preserved in our refrigerator has rotted."

Shakhawat Hossain, a resident of Hatiya upazila's Charkoilash area, said, "We have repeatedly contacted the local authorities concerned. But they could not say when the electricity supply will resume."


Contacted, Nurul Amin, executive engineer of Noakhali's Power Development Board, said they expect the power supply to resume in around 80 percent of the affected areas by Wednesday [yesterday] night.

Likewise, in Pirojpur, many people are suffering in darkness.

Mehedi Hasan, a local from Pattashi village in Indurkani upazila, said, "It has become impossible for us to keep in touch with our relatives as we can't charge our phones or any electrical device anymore."

Traders are in fear of huge losses due to the power outage.

BY-POLLS IRREGULARITIES EC probe finds 100 involved

They include election officials, says committee member; report submission today

Election Commission's probe committee has found that around 100 people, including election officials, were involved in electoral irregularities during the Gaibandha-5 by-polls on October 12.

A committee member said almost all the 100 carried out duties as presiding officers, assistant presiding officers or polling agents appointed by party candidates.

The member said the probe report is almost complete.

The EC formed the committee on October 13 to find out how the irregularities took place and identify those responsible. The irregularities led to postponement of the by-polls.

Asked about the report, probe committee chief Ashok Kumar Debnath, also an additional secretary at the

EC secretariat, refused to make any

"We are working on the report and will submit it to the Election Commission on Thursday [today]," he said.

The committee was given seven working days to submit its report. The deadline was later extended by three working days, which expires today.

In an unprecedented move, the EC stopped the Gaibandha-5 by-election, saying that the situation went "out of control" due to widespread electoral irregularities.

This was the first by-polls conducted by the current EC. Also, this was the first time an EC halted an entire by-election to a parliamentary seat.
