MESSAGE FROM THE AMBASSADOR

99 years ago today Turkish Grand National Assembly proclaimed the foundation of the Republic of Türkiye. We will never forget the helping hand of our Bengali brothers and sisters during these times of difficulty.

Turkish War of Liberation and foundation of the Republic of Türkiye on 29 October 1923 sparked joy and inspiration for other nations. Kazi Nazrul Islam, the National Poet of Bangladesh, expressed his joy in his epic poem titled “Kemal Pasha”. During our Republic Day reception this year we will have a chance to listen to this extraordinary poem recited by eminent Bangladeshi artists.

The signs of respect for Mustafa Kemal was not limited to Nazrul’s poem. His name was given to prestigious avenues in Dhaka and Chittagong and to a high school in Feni. Soon we shall inaugurate the bust of Atatürk and Kemal Atatürk Park in Dhaka just as we have done the same for the Father of the Bangladeshi Nation, Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, in Ankara last December during Mujib Borsho.

Today, rising on the legacy of our Founding Fathers, both Türkiye and Bangladesh are thriving countries. Our current economic and social progress bodes well for a promising future. We will be stronger in every field if we develop our partnership further on this solid foundation.

We are on the right path. Our trade is booming and expected to reach 1.5 billion USD in 2022. This year one of the top destinations for Bangladeshi tourists was Istanbul. Turkish TV dramas are being watched by millions. Turkish Airlines increased the number of their flights to 14 times a week. On the other hand, our investors have already recognized

Bangladesh as a land of opportunities, and decided to expand their investments in key sectors of the economy such as energy, consumer goods and ready-made garments. Businesses from our countries have recently met in Istanbul and identified new avenues of cooperation.

In July this year, we have launched Bangladesh-Türkiye Business Forum (BTBF) in Dhaka. Bringing together six major Turkish companies operating in Bangladesh and eleven prominent Bangladeshi companies, BTBF will promote better economic and trade relations between our countries and facilitate partnerships based on our shared values.

Our shared values date back to the times of Hazrat Shah Jalal. Shah Jalal’s mother was from Konya, a Turkish city where Sufi mystic Mawlana Jaleddin Rumi lived and died. I visited Sylhet several times where Hazrat Shah Jalal’s shrine is revered and visited by millions who respect him and his wisdom. Konya and Sylhet are sister cities, bringing us closer.

On this joyful day, I would also like to highlight another shared value of ours, namely the compassion towards the vulnerable people fleeing persecution and violence. Both of our countries host millions of refugees, 4 million Syrians in Türkiye and over 1 million Rohingyas in Bangladesh. That is why Türkiye is best placed to understand and stand in solidarity with the Government of Bangladesh.

In the years to come, Turkish Government is determined to further develop its partnership with Bangladesh for the mutual well-being of our people.

Long live Türkiye-Bangladesh friendship!

Türkiye stands in solidarity with Bangladesh in responding to the Rohingya crisis

The Republic of Türkiye has spared no effort to provide its humanitarian and development support to the People's Republic of Bangladesh. Turkish Cooperation and Coordination Agency (TİKA) and Turkish Red Crescent offices in Dhaka help coordinate the humanitarian and development assistance in the fields of health, education, and humanitarian aid all around Bangladesh. Since 2012, more than 75 million USD was provided to Bangladesh by Türkiye in humanitarian and development assistance.

When the latest influx of Rohingyas to Bangladesh started in 2017, Turkey was one of the first countries to respond to the crisis. First Lady Emine Erdoğan visited the Rohingya camps and mobilised support. Ever since, Turkey continues its response through TİKA, Türkiye Diyanet

Foundation, Turkish Red Crescent, Disaster and Emergency Management Authority (AFAD), and Turkish Field Hospital, which was founded in the beginning of 2018.

After the massive fire in the camps on March 22, 2021, the hospital was quickly rebuilt upon the instructions of President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan. More than 30 Turkish medical staff of the hospital continued their services under all circumstances, partnering also with Bangladeshi Red Crescent Society. In the field hospital, so far more than 550 thousand patients, both Rohingyas and members of the host communities, were provided medical services.

Turkish Government also supports Bangladesh at all international meetings for the early repatriation of Rohingyas to Myanmar.

BANGLADESH AND TÜRKİYE A friendship for the ages

Bangladesh and Türkiye’s relationship has been deeply tied together in the history of both countries. This story of friendship and partnership dates back to before both countries had even emerged as modern nation-states.

If one were to look back, they would see that Kazi Nazrul Islam, Bengal’s rebel poet, wrote in praise of Mustafa Kemal Atatürk’s bravery in the Turkish War of Independence: “To chase out the invading aggressor/ We need, indeed, a fearless Kemal/ Kemal, what a wonder you’ve worked!/ Ho Ho Kemal, what a wonder you’ve worked!” (Kemal Pasha, 1921).

After the Independence of Bangladesh, the relationship between the two countries grew even further, as Türkiye recognised Bangladesh as an independent state in 1974. Throughout time, their partnership has continued to be tied deeper. Now, Bangladesh and Türkiye cooperate in many areas including trade, defence, foreign investment and education.

Currently, the two-way annual trade between Bangladesh and Türkiye has crossed the \$1 billion threshold, with both countries aiming to reach the \$2 billion mark in the next couple of years. They plan to do this through increased cooperation among economic actors, simplification of trade rules, and diversification of trade products.

In July this year, the two countries have launched Bangladesh-Türkiye Business Forum (BTBF) in Dhaka which will promote better economic and trade relations between Türkiye and Bangladesh.

The two countries also stepped up their defence ties, with Bangladesh signing several defence purchase agreements with Türkiye in the last couple of years.

According to local experts, Turkish military products will equip the Bangladesh Armed Forces with NATO standard air, land and naval warfare capabilities.

If there is one thing that remains true in this world, it is that the mark of a true ally can be seen during moments of crisis. As such, it is clear to see why Türkiye has been such a great partner for Bangladesh, as they stepped forward with unconditional support to Bangladesh in regards to the Rohingya issue at various multilateral fora such as the UN, ICJ, G20, and OIC.



Turkey has also been providing humanitarian aid—particularly in the field of health, education and rehabilitation—to Rohingya refugees and host communities in Bangladesh. In 2018, a 50-bed field hospital—run by Turkish government organisation AFAD—was inaugurated at Rohingya camp No. 9, in the Palangkhal union under Ukhiya upazila of Cox’s Bazar. The hospital was completely rebuilt after the massive fire in the camps in March 2021. Additionally, a soap factory and sewing atelier employing Rohingyas

are run by the Turkish Diyanet Foundation, a Turkish development organization.

While both Bangladesh and Türkiye are Muslim majority countries, their ties run deeper. People of both nations follow Sufism and there is a wide appreciation of the works of famous Turkish poet and Sufi mystic, Mawlana Jaleddin Rumi among Bangladeshis.

Turkish television programmes are also very popular in Bangladesh. Popular Turkish historical dramas such as “Dirilis: Ertugrul” (Resurrection: Ertugrul) and “Muhtesem Yüzyıl” (Magnificent Century) have even been dubbed in the local language for Bangladeshi audiences.

Turkey is also a popular tourist destination for the people of Bangladesh. This year, Istanbul was one of the top destinations for Bangladeshi tourists.

On average, in recent years, 600 Bangladeshi students go to Turkish universities for their higher education.

The government of Türkiye regularly provides scholarships to Bangladeshi students to study in their most prestigious universities.

There is the potential to take bilateral relations between Türkiye and Bangladesh to even greater heights. New avenues of cooperation should be explored to deepen the ties between the governments and private sectors of both countries. The people-to-people contact between the two nations also needs to be promoted to consolidate the gains from the improved relationship.
