Edward M Kennedy Jr was emotional, feeling the presence of his father when he touched the banyan tree that the then US senator Edward M Kennedy planted on Dhaka University campus 50 years ago, as a symbol of freedom and democracy.

The tree was a replacement for the one that was blown up by the Pakistan army, as the Bangalee students would gather there and demonstrate against Pakistan's tyranny.

"My father thought something needs to be done. Political dissent and discourse were important. He hoped the new tree will come as a symbol of friendship between the people of the US and Bangladesh, as well as a tribute to those who struggled for independence," Kennedy Jr said.

He was speaking to the students, academics and civil society groups at the Nabab Nawab Ali Senate Bhaban, after taking a tour of the campus in the morning yesterday, on the third day of his eight-day visit to Bangladesh, marking the 50 years of diplomatic relations between the

# Three-wheelers now join strike bandwagon

Three-wheeler workers in Barishal have now called for a two-day strike till November 5, when the BNP is scheduled to hold its rally in the city.

Earlier, the bus owners there declared a strike from November 4 to 5.

The two organisations -- bus owners and three-wheeler workers -- declared the strikes demanding administrative actions against each other.

The bus owners demanded the removal of unauthorised three-wheelers from roads, while the three-wheeler workers wanted an "end to the harassment by bus owners". However, BNP leaders think the strikes are only meant to foil its November 5 rally.

On October 24, Barishal District Bus Malik Group submitted a memorandum to the Barishal divisional commissioner, stating it would hold the strike if unauthorised three-wheelers are not removed from the highways by November 3.

Six days later, Barishal Zilla Mishuk-Baby Taxi-Taxi Car and CNG-run Three-Wheeler Sramik Union called for the strike to press home their five-point demand, including

an "end to harassment by bus owners". The announcement was made on October 30 through press statement, signed by its President Kamal Hossain Mollah and General Secretary Mushfiqur Rahman Dulal. In the statement, the organisation urged all to suspend

operations of three-wheelers on all routes of Barishal from November 4 to 5. Meanwhile, Moniruzzaman Faruk, convener of Barishal city unit BNP, said, "The government is playing a key role in enforcing the strikes, with a target to foil our rally. But its ill-attempts will not be successful. Thousands of our

partymen will join the rally on November 5." The BNP yesterday got verbal permission from the Barishal district administration to hold the rally at the SEE PAGE 6 COL 4

# Karnaphuli most defiled

CPD analysis reveals

Mismanaged plastic waste of the metropolis has turned the Karnaphuli, on whose banks the country's key sea port is located, into the top plastic-digesting river.

Around 40 percent of the mismanaged plastic ended up in the waterbody, a key river in the Chattogram region. It is followed by the Rupsha river in the southwest of the country, which swallows up to 31.7 percent of plastic waste.

The Chattogram Port Authority had to recently halt a dredging project halfway due to massive layers of polythene at least seven meters high.

A secondary data analysis by Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD), as part of its CPD-Green Cities Initiative Research, was revealed yesterday.

Other rivers choking from plastic pollution include the Kirtankhola (7.1 percent), Sandha (6.5 percent), Nar (4.1 percent), Meghna (3.3 percent), Kaliganga (2.5), Baleshwari (2.0 percent), Sugandha (1.8 percent), Galachipa (1.2 percent), Payra (0.7 percent), and Bishkhali (0.2 percent).

The CPD analysis said mismanaged plastic waste is a significant source of contamination in the country's water system, adding that around one million metric tons of it is generated every year around Bangladesh's

Syed Yusuf Sadaat, research fellow at CPD involved in study, told The Daily Star that 646 tonnes of plastic waste are produced every year in Dhaka alone.

Of those, 48 percent goes to landfills, 37 percent is recycled, 12 percent ends up in rivers, while the remaining three percent is littering the roadsides.



"The situation worsened as Bangladesh, being a deltaic landscape, receives a portion of plastic from neighbouring countries. The scenario could get disastrous without political commitment to reduce plastic pollution," he said.

The study further said excessive consumption and indiscriminate disposal of single-use-plastics, such as plastic bag, clear plastic thin wraps, coffee cups, and lids, Sadaat said, adding how the Covid-19 pandemic intensified the use of those.

The canals that lead to rivers crisscrossing the cities carry the domestic waste, which is largely made up of polythene and plastic.

Meanwhile, industrial pollution has also been taking a toll on the river.

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## 'Country needs peace and unity'

### Says Lula after winning Brazil presidency; Hasina congratulates

Brazilian president-elect Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva called for "peace and unity" after narrowly winning a divisive runoff election yesterday, capping a remarkable political comeback by defeating farright incumbent Jair Bolsonaro



who has yet to accept defeat. The victory marks a stunning turnaround for the charismatic but tarnished leftist heavyweight, who left office in 2010 as the most popular president in Brazilian history, fell into disgrace when he was imprisoned for 18 months on since-quashed corruption charges, and now returns for an unprecedented third term at age 77.

All eyes will now be on how Bolsonaro and his supporters react to the result after months of alleging without evidence -- that Brazil's electronic voting system is plagued by fraud and that the courts, media and other institutions had conspired against his far-right

"This country needs peace and unity," Lula said to loud cheers in a victory speech in Sao Paulo.

"The challenge is immense," he said of the job ahead,
