
No one will be able to suppress this movement of the people. People are fighting for their rights, he added. Fakhrul said it is the Awami League government which is crossing its limits.

"The transport movement had been stopped five days before our rally in Barishal. The launch and speedboat services from Patuakhali to Barishal has stopped. How do you explain it?" he asked.

The AL government is trying to come back to power by holding a fake election again, he added.

He said the crises that have arisen in Bangladesh are entirely due to their (AL) corruption.

Fakhrul said their last divisional rally will be held in Dhaka on December 10.

#### Two trampled to death by elephants in Bandarban

Two people were trampled to death and another was injured in an attack by a herd of wild elephants in Lama upazila of Bandarban yesterday.

The deceased are Amir Ali, 70, and Khodeza Bibi, 65, residents of Sohrabpara in Aziznagar union under the upazila and the injured is Bayati, 60.

UP chair Md Jasim Uddin said a herd of wild elephants coming from a nearby jungle entered Sohrabpara area around 8:00am.

The injured were rushed to Chakaria Upazila Health Complex in Cox's Bazar where Amir succumbed to his injuries, the chairman said. Bayati was shifted to Cox's Bazar Sadar Hospital for better treatment.

Anamul Haque Bhuiyan, in-charge of Aziznagar Police Outpost, said the wild elephants also vandalised establishments of the locals.

### Load-shedding every alternating hour in port city

"Load-shedding starts at 6:00am, then power comes at 7:00am, then again it goes away at 8:00am... and it continues like this.'

This is how Saima Akter, a resident of port city's Askar Dighir Par area, described the situation that has been prevailing for the past one week.

"My one-year-old daughter could not sleep for a moment last night due to the severe heat and frequent load-shedding," she said. "We are facing power outage eight to 10 times a day."

Like Saima, residents of Chattogram city have been suffering due to frequent power outages. People in many areas claimed that the places

witness load-shedding every alternating hour, making it difficult to stay at home both during daytime and at night. Acknowledging the issue, officials of Power Development Board (PDB) in Chattogram said

it had to implement load-shedding to supply uninterrupted power to the industries, as the city is not getting the required power from the

The sufferings of city dwellers worsened as the mercury rose high in the past two days.

The highest temperature in the city was recorded at 31.3 degrees Celsius yesterday, while it was 32.4 degrees on Thursday, said Harun-ur-Rashid, forecast officer of Chattogram Met office.

"The more humid the air, the more people will feel hot," he said.

"When people sweat on a hot day, the air absorbs the sweat if humidity remains low. But when humidity is high, air cannot absorb sweat,' he explained. So, amid this scorching heat, the residents are suffering both indoors and outside due to the outages. Locals of Halishahar, Bahaddarhat, Oxygen,

# The hills raise mangoes the fastest

Says study; findings likely to aid better harvest planning

The common perception about mangoes is that they mature early in the country's north-western districts.

The Himalayan slope in the north sees more acute winters and summers than any other district, and this has fuelled the idea.

But a recent study proved a different theory. The study found that the country's hilly terrain, which is closest to the sea, where there is less difference in temperature, ripens mangoes faster.

After the hills, the fastest rates of maturity were measured in Khulna, Rajshahi and Rangpur regions.

The study also shows that any variety

of mango in the country's northern part takes at least three weeks more to mature

when compared to the hilly regions' rate. The study was published in the MDPI Sustainability journal of

Switzerland on October 19. It was jointly authored by Md Moniruzzaman and Khan Rubayet Rahaman of Saint Mary's University in Canada, Md Sorof Uddin of Bangladesh Agricultural Research Institute, Md Abdullah Elias Akhter of Khulna University of Engineering and Technology, and Akshar Tripathi of Indian Institute of

Technology (IIT) in India. The findings open up prospects for accurate planning and better management

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
