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No let-up in dengue deaths 5 more die in 24 hours

At least five dengue patients while died 796 were admitted different to hospitals across the country in the last 24 hours till yesterday morning.

The number of dengue deaths now stands at 187 while the total number of cases rose to 45,598.

According to the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS), among the death cases, 115 are in Dhaka, 23 in Cox's Bazar, 20 in Chattogram, seven in Barishal, seven in Khulna, four in Mymensingh, two each in Rajshahi and Narail and one each in Narsingdi, Kustia, Pabna, SEE PAGE 4 COL 2

Disasters affect women, children more: speakers **UN Women Bangladesh launches**

'From Where I Stand'

UN Women Bangladesh yesterday launched a storybook titled "From Where I Stand", paying tribute to the exemplary efforts and leadership of women in tackling climate change-induced disasters from the ground.

They also inaugurated a three-day photo exhibition at the Sculptor Novera Exhibition Room, following a ceremony held around noon at Bangla Academy in the capital. It will remain open from 11:00am to 8:00pm, till November 11.

Speakers at the programme said when a crisis strikes, individuals are more likely to be destitute and have fewer options for expressing their needs and goals. Disasters usually affect women and children more adversely than men due to pre-existing gender inequalities.

For the last five years, UN Women has been working with the government under the National Resilience Program, to sustain human and economic development from disaster-related shocks.

Remarkable and substantial changes have been brought in terms of the role of women in disasters -- from being victims to powerful agents of change in preparedness,

She made the comments at an event, titled, "Orientation on National Action Plan on Women, Peace, Security for members of parliament to accelerate localisation of WPS agendas", organised by Bangladesh Nari Pragati Sangha (BNPS), and

'Pakistan must offer formal apology' Dipu Moni tells event on 1971 genocide

Education Minister Dipu Moni yesterday said Pakistan must offer a formal apology to the people of Bangladesh for the genocide committed by its military in 1971 and arrange compensation for the atrocities.

"It is our logical demand. Voices from inside Pakistan have also been

raised in favour of our demand. In the past, many other countries sought apology for committing genocides elsewhere. Pakistan should do the same," she said.

The minister came up with the demand while speaking as the chief guest at a discussion, titled "We demand United Nation's recognition of the genocide in 1971", organised by Bangladesh Swadhinata Foundation at National Museum.

War crimes trials were held in Bangladesh around four decades after its independence. However, the antiliberation forces are still active in the country's politics, even after five decades of the Liberation War, said Dipu Moni.

The minister also alleged that the anti-liberation forces are aligned with the opposition party.

Swadhinata Foundation's convener retired Justice Mohammad Mamtaj Uddin Ahmed presided over the discussion. "We will have to continue our battle against SEE PAGE 4 COL 4

Be ready for the election IGP tells officers, as law and order may worsen

Inspector General of Police (IGP) Chowdhury Abdullah Al Mamun yesterday instructed field-level officers to be prepared to face challenges centring the next general election, as law and order may deteriorate in the coming days.

The instruction came on the last day of the two-day quarterly crime conference, attended by superintendents of police (SP) of all districts, range deputy inspector generals,

all metropolitan police commissioners, and top police officials.

The event was held at the capital's Rajarbagh Police Auditorium. Earlier on Tuesday, Home Minister Asaduzzaman Khan Kamal exchanged views with the officials at the conference and warned that if programmes of political parties cause public sufferings, law enforcers will take necessary actions.

We are not interfering in any political party's meetings. We will not obstruct their political programmes. But if anyone causes public suffering in the name of political programmes, action has to be taken," said an officer, quoting the minister.

At the conference, several SPs demanded a stop to central procurement of medicines and furniture for around 80 police units, including district police, meeting sources said.

Earlier, heads of units would get around Tk 80 crore annually for procuring medicine for force members and their family, but the immediate past IGP Benazir Ahmed centralised procurement to stop irregularities.

Collecting donation to fund militancy Rab arrests 3 over involvement with militant outfit STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) claimed to have arrested three persons who used to collect money by asking people to help mosques, madrasas and orphans, but would use the donations to fund activities of militant outfit "Jama'atul Ansar Fil Hindal Sharqiya".

At a news briefing yesterday, Rab also claimed to have rescued a woman from Narayanganj on November 5, after coming to know that an operative of the new outfit radicalised her.

The woman, Ambia Sultana alias Emili, sent her son Abu Bakar alias Riasad Rayan for "hijrat" in March to join Jama'atul Ansar, keeping her husband in the dark, said Khandaker Al Moin, director of Rab's legal and media wing, at Rab's media centre in the capital's Karwan Bazar.

In Islam, hijrat generally means "to give up one's own land" or "to migrate from one place to another place" mostly for the sake of faith.
