Ekushey Padak winning choreographer and dance maestro Golam Mostofa Khan died Sunday night at Combined Military Hospital in Dhaka. He was 82 years old.

After the country's independence, he was one of the integral figures in the popularisation of dance as an art form in the region. The cultural personality passed away after suffering from pneumonia and old age related health problems.

The Daily Star reached out to eminent

dancers from Bangladesh, who shared their respects for the departed figure.

He was a bright star in the skies of our industry. When we began dancing, he was one of the artistes that we looked in awe – he was a blessing for us. His contributions will never be forgotten. He was a hundred percent pure as a dance guru, and moreover, he was always positive in his attitude. May he rest in peace.

Shibli Mohammad:

He was a pioneer of dance in Bangladesh. No

one could even conceive at that time, the fact that a man could take dance as a profession. If he did not take the step, dance wouldn't be as accepted a profession as it is today. He ignored all the criticisms and ridicule to single-handedly fight for what he believed in.

In addition to the termination benefits, the money they are owed also includes the provident fund, created by docking a percentage of workers' wages every month.

Rashid said, "When the provident fund was set up, many workers were wary of the concept but we were told that BEPZA would guarantee the fund, but now that money is gone too."

At the DRU, in a room full of nearly 200 female garment workers, almost everybody failed to get a job after getting illegally laid off from the factory.

The workers were asked to raise their hands if they failed to get employed afterwards—and almost all the hands shot up.

"The factory was established in 1994, and the workers had been there for several years. When they were laid off, they could not find jobs because they were considered too old," said National Garment Workers Federation chief Amirul Haque Amin.

Most of the workers present in the room yesterday were middle-aged and above. It is a common practice in the industry to value speed and younger workers.

"When the factory closed down I was at the end of my work years," said one Jibannahar. "I had worked for 10 years at that factory. I was earning Tk 5,500 monthly, of which a portion went to the provident fund. I also did not get the salary for the last month of work."

According to labour law, if a factory wishes to terminate a worker, then they must give 120 days' notice and also compensate at a rate of 30 days' wages for every completed year of service.

"We had gotten tired of protesting and many moved away," said Jibannahar, explaining why they have been silent for so many years.

Speaking on the issue, DEPZ authorities said it has to be verified whether the claimants were actually workers of the factory.

"They asked us to provide an authentic list of the workers but the authorities should have it. BEPZA keeps workers' list of all factories as part of a rule," said Amin.

BEPZA's Executive Director (investment promotion) Tanvir Hossain said that they have to look into the matter since it is such an old case.

Police also arrested three party men in connection with old cases in Habiganj yesterday.

The arrestees are Hafizur Rahman Khan, president of Gupaya union BNP, Abdul Hamid, its vice-president, and Md Shaheen Mia, a former convener of the unit.

Golam Mortuza, officer in charge of Habiganj Model Police Station, said they were arrested from their homes in separate drives.

He, however, could not confirm if the three had any cases against them.

GK Gaus, senior joint convener of Habiganj district BNP, said, "They [the

arrestees] are not accused in any case. Police arrested them only to create panic among our leaders with an aim to foil our rally."

Meanwhile, unlike the previous divisional rallies, transport owners and workers in Sylhet have not yet called a strike.

Speaking to The Daily Star, some of them, seeking anonymity, said they were waiting for instructions from the central leaders.

A strike, however, is unlikely as a religious gathering of the Anjunmane Hefajat-e Islam Bangladesh is scheduled to take place in the city's central truck terminal from November 17-18.

40,000-strong Facebook fan page for Tunisia's national side, one of the four Arab teams qualified along with Qatar, Morocco and Saudi Arabia.

Qatar "could have offered preferential prices" to fans in the region, Abed told AFP, although Qatar says it has subsidised the cost of accommodation available on its official portal.

Abed was one of several fans contacted by AFP in a straw poll of supporters across the region, whose population is more than 400 million.

World Cups have traditionally attracted more affluent supporters than weekly club football, whose fanbase is often working-class, football historian Paul Dietschy told AFP.

The World Cup in Qatar "reinforces" the universal trend of a growing gap between the rich and the poor, Dietschy said.

Even in oil-rich Saudi Arabia, which has the Arab world's largest economy and shares a land border with Qatar, fans said the costs were prohibitive.

"You have to take out a loan to attend the three [group] matches," said 25-year-old Saudi student Mouhannad, who asked not to be identified by his full name.

According to FIFA, Qatar has topped the list of countries for World Cup ticket purchases, which neared three million.

aggressive actions toward Taiwan, which undermine peace and stability across the Taiwan Strait and in the broader region, and jeopardise global prosperity," the White House said.

Despite the clash on Taiwan, the White House indicated it had found some common ground with China on Russia's invasion of Ukraine -- a high priority for Biden who is hoping to deprive Moscow of its key potential source of international

support.

Xi and Biden reiterated their agreement that a nuclear war should never be fought and can never be won and underscored their opposition to the use or threat of use of nuclear weapons in Ukraine," the White House statement said.

Biden also nudged China to rein in ally North Korea after a record-breaking spate of missile tests has raised fears that Pyongyang will soon carry out its seventh nuclear test.

CTTC officials yesterday disclosed his arrest and involvement in militancy.

Md Asaduzzaman, chief of the CTTC unit, told The Daily Star that Kawsar was a top leader of Ansar Al Islam and several members of the outfit's military wing were active under his command.

Sources said his wife is an intern at the hospital.

Investigators claimed that Kawsar was "responsible for all activities of the outfit in Kishoreganj. He has been involved in militancy since 2013".

"We have got the names of several doctors from Kawsar. They are also working for the outfit," said a top CTTC official, requesting anonymity.

The official added that they were also looking into the activities of his wife.

Kawsar used to conduct a training programme for the outfit members in a house in Kishoreganj.

Ahamedul Islam, additional

deputy commissioner of the CTTC unit, said they came to know about Kawsar's links with the outfit while investigating a case filed with Dakshin Khan Police Station on September 24.

On that day, CTTC arrested Saiful Islam alias Shakil and Rezaul Alam alias Tinku in the capital for their alleged links with the outfit.

Shakil had training from Kawsar, the CTTC official added.

new neurosurgical treatments, said: "This paves the way to more targeted treatments for paralysed patients."

"We can now aim to manipulate these neurons to regenerate the spinal cord."

As part of the clinical trial, the scientists recruited nine participants with severe or complete paralysis caused by spinal cord injury.

The patients received epidural electrical stimulation (EES) treatment – an experimental therapy that helps those regain movement and control that had been lost.
