much so that despite having an official figure from the central bank every

week, people are speculating. This begs the question: what exactly is the current reserve position?

"According to the latest available data with the IMF, Bangladesh's gross international reserves is about \$27.5 billion as per international statistical definitions," Rahul Anand, the IMF mission chief to Bangladesh, told The Daily Star yesterday.

But what is gross reserves? It is reserve assets, as per the IMF's balance of payments and investment position manual (BPM6), which is followed faithfully by central banks around the world. But Bangladesh's central bank is yet to adopt it.

Reserve assets consist of gold, cash US dollar, bonds and treasury bills, reserve position in the IMF, special drawing rights holdings -- which is a form of international money created by the IMF and defined as a weighted average of various convertible currencies -- and so on.

The Bangladesh Bank's gross reserves computation though factors

"As per today's position, our reserve is \$34.24 billion and that includes EDF and others," BB's Spokesman GM Abul Kalam Azad told The Daily

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BORO SEASON Govt building fertiliser stock Okays import of 1.8 lakh tonnes

The government yesterday approved import of 1.8 lakh tonnes of fertiliser so that farmers do not face any crisis in the Boro season by the end of December.

The decision was made during a meeting of the cabinet committee on government purchase.

The government has been buying fertiliser for weeks to provide the vital agricultural input to farmers at subsidised rates amid the economic uncertainty.

An agriculture ministry official said the government's focus was on domestic food production because the Russia-Ukraine war created concerns over food security. This is why the government will continue to develop its stock of fertiliser.

It was decided at vesterday's meeting that 90,000 tonnes of urea will be imported from Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates by the Bangladesh Chemical Industries Corporation (BCIC) of the industries ministry.

The urea will cost \$594.17 per tonne, said Additional Secretary Sayeed Mahbub Khan of the cabinet division, adding that urea earlier cost \$625.83 per tonne.

The government will also import 50,000 tonnes of Muriate of Potash (MOP) from Canada and another 40,000 tonnes of Di-ammonium Phosphate (DAP) from Saudi Arabia, he added.

The latest purchase price of MOP will be \$788 per tonne while its earlier price was \$821 per tonne, he said.

On the other hand, the latest price of DAP will be \$725.25 per tonne which was \$826.5 previously, he added.

The convention requires diplomats to respect the laws and regulations of the receiving state. It also restricts them from meddling in the host nation's domestic affairs.
