1 killed, 20 hurt as **AL factions clash**

A man was killed and at least 20 others were injured in a clash between the supporters of a former union parishad chairman and those of the current one in Faridpur's Sadarpur upazila yesterday.

The dead was identified as Jalal Fakir, 41, a farmer from Niggram village of the same upazila.

During the six-hour-long clash, which started at 7:00am and continued till 1:00pm, around 40 houses were vandalised and one was set on fire.

According to locals, there had been a longstanding dispute between Md Aktaruzzaman, chairman of Krishnapur union parishad, and Billal Fakir, its former chairman, over establishing supremacy in the area

Both belong to the ruling Awami League, with Billal being the general secretary of the union AL.

Md Helal Uddin Bhuiyan, additional superintendent of Police (Bhanga circle), said, "On information, police rushed to the spot and brought the situation under control around 1:00pm. Six people were detained in connection with the clash.

"The number of people involved in the clash far exceeded the number of law enforcers. We tried our best to control the situation. Additional police were deployed as well," he said, adding that no case was filed.

Just the day before, Aktaruzzaman's men attacked Gias Talukdar, 52, supporter of Billal, and had severed his hand from the body.

Gias is currently under treatment in Dhaka.

Following the incident, Billal's supporters attacked an opponent's house, triggering the clash.

Jalal Fakir, the deceased, was initially taken to Sadarpur Upazila Health Complex in critical condition. He was

Says Japanese ambassador

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's visit to Japan by the end of this month will take the bilateral relationship between the two countries to a new height, Japanese Ambassador Ito Naoki said yesterday.

"This is a very significant visit. This is almost to conclude 50-year anniversary of our diplomatic relations. With this visit, we are going to elevate our partnership to a new height," he told reporters after a farewell meeting with Planning Minister MA Mannan at the latter's office yesterday.

Hasina will visit Japan from November 29 to December 1 and hold a meeting with her Japanese counterpart Fumio Kishida. The two nations are likely to sign a number of memorandums of understanding on cooperation.

Japan is a key development partner of Bangladesh engaged in some of the country's major infrastructure development projects, including Metro Rail, Matarbari Deep Sea Port, Third Terminal of Dhaka Airport etc.

Childhood abuse may affect future health: **BSMMU**

Abuse and adversities before the age of 18 are associated with negative impacts on physical and mental health, researchers at Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University said yesterday.

Based on 26 different case-control studies on five themes, conducted over the past five years, they said the torture of children is deep-rooted in be addressed immediately.

The findings of the studies were shared at an event at BSMMU vesterday. "Our studies show

that anyone abused in their childhood is highly likely to suffer from health issues," Dr Md Atiqul Haque, a professor at the Department of Public Health & Informatics, who coordinated the studies, told The Daily

The five themes of the studies were – child rights and protection; online child displays tendency to lean towards abuse; adverse childhood experiences and subsequent health problems; the

role of media in stopping child abuse; and impact of non-communicable diseases on child development.

A study on 1,416 children, aged between 11 to 17, in rural areas of Bangladesh showed that 19 percent of them were subjected to physical abuse, 17 to emotional abuse, and 78 were neglected at home, school, and/or work.

The study also shows that child workers, children with disabilities, and the Bangladeshi society and it needs children living in slums are at a higher risk of abuse.

Another study on 460 children, aged 11-17, highlighted that 33 percent of these children are internet users. Some 59 percent of them had at least one "criminal attitude", while 38 percent had two and 26 percent had three.

Webb reveals blazing hourglass around forming star

The James Webb Space Telescope unveiled its latest image of celestial majesty on Wednesday, an ethereal hourglass of orange and blue dust being shot out from a newly forming star at its centre.

The colourful clouds are only visible in infrared light, so had never been seen before being captured by Webb's Near-Infrared Camera (NIRCam), Nasa and the European Space Agency said in a statement.

The very young star, known as protostar L1527, is hidden in darkness by the edge of a rotating disk

UN publishes COP27 draft climate deal

Text retains 1.5C limit, but many contentious issues remain unresolved

The first draft of a deal being hashed out at the COP27 climate summit in Egypt would keep a target of limiting global warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius but left many of the most contentious issues in the talks unresolved ahead of a deadline.



Egypt's COP27 president urged negotiators to speed up the pace on overcoming their differences, while poor nations slammed the draft for failing to address their need for funds to cope with

damage already being wrought by climate-driven storms, droughts and floods.

"Time is not on our side, let us come together now and deliver by Friday [today]," COP27 President Sameh Shoukry said in a letter to delegates dated Wednesday and published yesterday. The 20-page UN draft for a hoped-for final

agreement repeats the goal from last year's Glasgow Climate Pact to limit warming to 1.5C, and asks countries "to accelerate measures towards the phase down of unabated coal power and phase out and
