

Dengue kills four more, infects 606

At least four dengue patients died, while 606 were admitted to different hospitals across the country in the last 24 hours till yesterday morning.

The death toll has now risen to 234, while total cases are now 53,413, of which, 19,053 were recorded outside Dhaka.

According to the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS), of the deaths, 140 occurred in Dhaka, 24 in Cox's Bazar, 31 in Chattogram, 11 in Barishal, seven in Khulna, six in Mymensingh, five in Rajshahi, two in Narail, and one each in Narsingdi, Kushtia, Pabna, Bagerhat, Khagrachhari, Bogura, Madaripur and Feni.

A total of 50,828 patients, 17,866 are from outside Dhaka, have already been released.

Some 2,351 patients, 1,093 from outside the capital, are still undergoing treatment.

SSC result on Nov 28

The results of this year's Secondary School Certificate (SSC) and equivalent exams will be published on November 28.

Chief of the Inter-Education Board Coordination Committee Prof Tapan Kumar Sarker said Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina will announce the results on the day.

There will be a press conference, and all details of the results will be disclosed at the event, said Tapan, also Dhaka education board chairman.

Some 2,021,868 students took the SSC and equivalent examinations this year. Of them, 1,5.99 lakh were from nine general education boards, 2.68 under the madrasa education board, and 1.53 lakh under technical education board.

Secondary School Certificate and its equivalent examinations for 2022 started on September 15 this year.

The examinations were supposed to begin on June 19 last, but the Ministry of Education announced the suspension of the SSC and equivalent examinations on June 17 as various parts of the country including Sylhet and Sunamganj were inundated due to severe flood situations.

Generally, the examinations take place in February.

BR seeking more foreign funds for projects

Bangladesh Railway (BR) has sought more funds from European Investment Bank (EIB) to expand lines and procure locomotives and carriages for improved services.

The state-run transport agency placed eight projects before an EIB delegation during a meeting on Sunday in the capital's Rail Bhaban.

The delegation of EIB – which usually co-finances projects in Bangladesh – will discuss the proposals with the organisation's higher-ups and notify its final decisions later, said three participants of the meeting.

Railways ministry secretary Humayun Kabir led BR's side, while Edvardas Bumsteinas, head of Asia and Pacific Division Public Sector Operations of EIB Global, led the three-member EIB delegation, said the participants, requesting anonymity.

EIB has already invested in two BR projects, one for setting up Akhura-Laksam Double Line and another for procuring 200 broad-gauge (BG) carriages.

Of the eight projects placed before the EIB delegation, three are civil projects, while five are

mechanical.

One of the civil projects is for converting 123.76 km of Laksam-Chattogram metre-gauge (MG) double line into a dual-gauge double line, to improve Dhaka-Chattogram rail connectivity.

The project would require \$1797.51 million. The feasibility study of the project has already been completed.

The second project is for constructing the Dhaka-Laksam Chord Line. The estimated cost of the project, for building an 88.5 km new line, is \$3,000 million.

Another project is for converting the 120-km Bhairab Bazar-Mymensingh MG line to a dual-gauge line. The project would cost around \$1,680 million.

Asian Development Bank (ADB) has already expressed interest to invest in the first two projects, which have already been listed in ADB's pipeline.

"The EIB delegation also expressed its interest to co-finance these two projects with ADB," a participant of the meeting told this correspondent.

The five mechanical projects include those for procuring 46 BG

locomotives; 200 MG carriages; 54 MG carriages for tourist trains; 70 MG locomotives; and one to modernise heavy-duty workshops at Saidpur and Pahartali.

Of the five, two projects – for procuring of 200 MG carriages and 70 MG locomotives – were supposed to be implemented with tenderers' finance, implying that the winning contractors will manage loans to fund the projects.

However, BR failed to sign the loan deals for these projects due to various difficulties, which is why they now want to implement these projects by securing new sources of funds, said BR sources.

The project for 200 MG carriages would require \$145 million, while the 70 MG locomotive project would cost \$312.86 million.

The EIB delegation also expressed interest to invest in these two projects, as those are ready to be implemented, said the participant, requesting anonymity.

BR Director General Dharendra Nath Mazumder, who was also present at the meeting, said EIB will inform them about their decision after holding a discussion with its higher-ups.

DU, Dhaka councils of Chhatra League on Dec 2-3

The council of Dhaka University's Chhatra League unit will be held on December 3 in front of the historical arts building of the university.

'Foreign countries reluctant to share information'

ACC chair on delays in money laundering probes

The reluctance of foreign countries in sharing information causes delays in the investigation of money laundering cases, said Mohammad Moinuddin Abdullah, chairman of the Anti Corruption Commission (ACC).

"Countries that are more vocal about transparency issues share less information on money laundering," he said yesterday at a views-exchange meeting organised to mark the 18th founding anniversary of ACC at its headquarters.

"They [foreign countries] made all sorts of queries, delaying the investigation process. Ultimately, it seems like the ACC has not done its work properly," he said.

Regarding money laundering, the ACC boss said they cannot directly seek information from any foreign countries.

When an allegation is raised, the ACC collects primary information from Bangladesh Financial Intelligence Unit (BFIU). After getting that information, the commission begins the investigation, he said.

"We then approach the foreign ministry via home ministry to request authorities of the respective countries to provide information on money laundering. The process is time-consuming. We often give reminders but the countries respond on their own terms," he added.

Meanwhile, ACC Commissioner Jahurul Haque said they cannot investigate all types of money laundering incidents.

Petition challenging Momen's roles rejected

The High Court yesterday summarily rejected a writ petition that challenged the legality of AK Abdul Momen's ministership and him being a lawmaker for his reported "controversial comments".

The HC bench of Justice Md Mozibur Rahman Miah and Justice Kazi Md Ejazul Haque Akondo passed the order, saying that there is no merit in the petition as there is no evidence of Momen violating the constitution.

Addressing a Chattogram event on August 18, Momen said he requested the Indian government to do whatever necessary for the continuation of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's government rule.

"I went to India and said Sheikh Hasina's rule must be continued. She is our role model. If her rule is ensured, our country will stride towards development and become a truly non-communal

Stop 'leasing' Dhaka footpaths: HC

The High Court yesterday directed the government authorities concerned to stop "leasing" footpaths in Dhaka in seven days and take legal action against the offenders.

Chief executive officers of two Dhaka city corporations, additional police commissioner (traffic) and two joint police commissioners (traffic) of Dhaka, and deputy commissioners and officers-in-charge of 15 police stations of Dhaka were asked to comply with the directives.

Besides, the HC ordered the government to constitute a five-member high-powered committee to find out the "leasers", make a list of their names and submit it to the court in 60 days.

The two city mayors and secretaries at the ministries of home, local government, rural development and cooperatives were ordered to form the committee.

The HC also issued a rule asking the officials concerned to explain in four weeks why their
